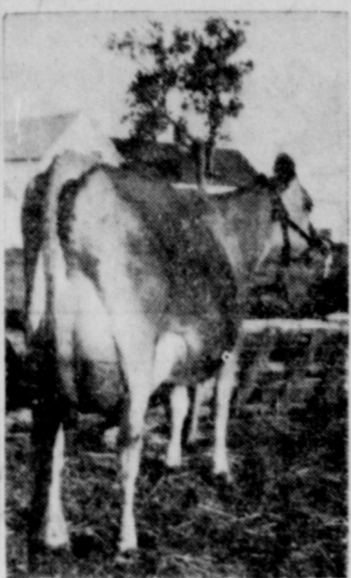

470664, a Jersey bull in artificial breeding service at the North Texas Artificial Breeding Farm near Dallas. J-2 has sired many blue ribbon heifers.

Smith's feeding program begins the day the calf is born and ceases only when he sells an animal, which isn't often. With good care his heifers are large enough to breed artificially by the time they are fifteen months old.

He believes a cow needs special care during pregnancy. She is building a husky calf and she will deplete her own body to do so if she isn't fed a good ration. Then after calving she begins her flush period of milk production and, shortly after she is again with calf, there is a continuous heavy drain on a good milk cow. There is no time that a dairyman can afford to neglect a cow, Smith believes.

In his own words, "You can't starve a profit from any animal." Summarized Smith's story is this. It takes good breeding, proper feeding at all ages, and good care and management to produce a good profitable dairy herd replacement.

tion from that City and the airplane hangers have been fixed up ready for the show.

Broken window panes have been replaced, a wash rack and a judging arena has been constructed and other improvements and changes made to accommodate the animals. Show officials have expressed thanks and appreciation to the merchants for their contributions, to oil firms for the pipe and especially to volunteers who furnished the labor and technical "know-how" in the welding and other construction work in getting the building and grounds in shape.

Juniors comprising members of the 4-H, FFA boys Clubs will compete with the adult exhibitors for the prize money, except in the fat animal classes.

All of the judging will be held on Saturday starting at 8:30 a.m., and finishing up at around 4 o'clock that afternoon, after which the animals will be released. Out of the county judges have been secured for the different divisions of livestock it was explained.

The fat animal classes, such as fat steers, lambs and barrows are open only to Junior exhibitors. They are to be judged on a packer basis.

Dairy animals are to be judged on a classification basis. Both packer and classification basis means they are to be judged against the ideal animal for that class instead of against each other it was said.

The Horse Show is to be divided into the Quarterhorse division and the Palomino division it was said.

Expired Parking Meter Tickets

Effective immediately, if an expired parking meter ticket is put on a car or truck you are driving, the time the ticket is issued will be shown on the ticket. The fine for this violation is \$1.00. However, if you come to the City Hall on the day the ticket is issued, or if the ticket is issued after the City Hall office is closed, if you come to the City Hall office on the next business day, and pay 25c for this violation the fine will be paid. If you do not follow this regulation, then the fine for this violation will be \$1, and if not paid within two weeks after date of issue same will be turned over to the City Attorney for collection.

We feel this new regulation will assist all of us in the use of our parking meters.

Until new tickets can be printed we will continue using the old tickets, but the above regulations will apply immediately.

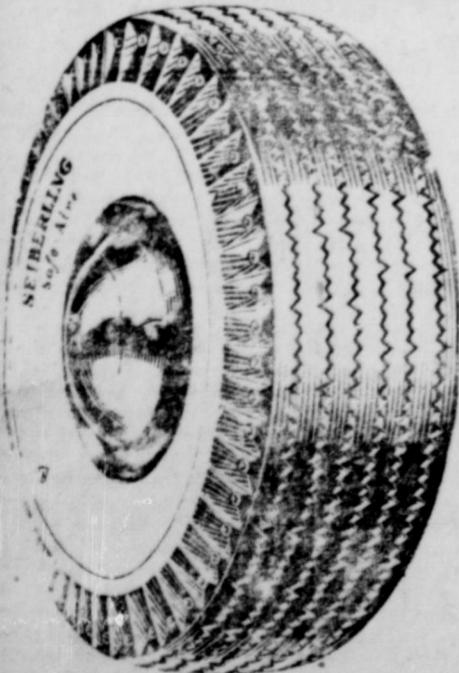
