"Anyone who has been in work covered by social security continuously since 1950, and who reaches age 65 after April of this year will be eligible for old-age benefit payments if he retires after that date," says McNatt.

He points out, however, that it will not be possible for him to get the highest benefit payments provided for those insured on the basis of earnings after. 1950.
