

> dent, but to "Harry S. Truman the man." Mr. Truman, he said had committed "an evil deed, with out precedent in American his tory." And, said Randall, the pre sident had acetd "without the slightest shadow of legal right." Randall criticized Mr. Tru man's figures on steel profits, saying that the government tak-es two thirds of it in taxes. And he said that, before the Tuesday midnight deadline, the companies increased their offer by three cents and proposed a 12 and a half cent wage boost, plus fringe bene-fits. only to have the CIO steelworkers refuso

Randall challenged the presi dent's so-called "inherent powers' to seize the steel industry. His words echoed the arruments advanced earlier yesterday before officiate.

Federal Judge Alexander Holtzoff in Washington. Holtzoff upheld the scizure without ruling directly on the issue, and denied an in dustry request for an immediat temporary order against govern ment control.
