HOW ABOUT 'Dem Boys! No, we're not talking about the Dallas Cowboys. We're talking about the Friona Chieftains. And the Bovina Mustangs. And the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

Ron Carr pointed out last week that three of the four Parmer County schools would be represented in the football playoffs, and Farwell finished with a winning record-just happened to be in with the likes of Springlake, Kress, etc.

This must be an all-time

record, to have three county teams still playing football past mid-November in the same year. We're quite certain that it's the first season that both Bovina and Friona have entered the

playoffs in the same year.

It's just the fifth playoff year for Friona in the 35 years Ye Editor has been on the scene. The Chieftains had made it three times earlier, in 1944, 1952 and 1957.


The maize crop was probably the one row-crop that could have done better, and of course the winter wheat came up considerably

Natural Gas Price Increases Cause Rise In Customers' Electric Bills

Escalating prices of natural gas monthly bills." used to generate electricity are the primary cause of a request Southwestern Public Service Company filed recently with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for increases in the "fuel-cost recovery" portion of electricity

The average Texas residential customer of SPS, using 800 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month, would see a bill increase of about \$1.96 on the monthly bill from January through June 1997, said Gerald Diller, SPS vice president, rates and regulation. However, beginning in July, the increase would drop to 79 cents

"Even with this fuel cost increase," Diller said, "SPS's residential rates would continue to be the lowest among all the investor-owned utilities in Texas."

of two components, he explained. One component is an underrecovery of actual fuel costs over the past nine months, which would be recovered in the January-June period. The second component is the expected ongoing increase in prices of natural gas.

"The actual increase in individual customer's bills will vary, depending on the individual customer's use of electricity," Diller said. "All of our Texas retail customer classes, including industrial and commercial classes, would see similar increases in

The trend in prices for natural gas has been "significantly upward during the past year, and is expected to continue upward," Diller said. "We negotiate the lowest fuel costs we can, in order to keep electric energy competitive and reliable. But we cannot totally control the costs to us of the fuels we must use to generate power and energy. Thus, this increase."

Diller emphasized, "Despite fuel-cost changes, we are determined to keep our rates low. And we have

been successful. We have dropped our prices twenty per cent in the past eleven years. SPS rates are twenty per cent below the national

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

Out Here

On the eve of one of Texas' most reverent annual rituals, spotlights will soon shine on an exalted group of young men.

Depending on your perspective these are young men, boys, or as a good bubba might say, "our kids are pretty good this year."

I am talking, of course, about the high school football playoffs and the young men (boys, kids) who have earned the right to the further glory and the spotlight of playoff competition.

Squarely in the middle of these Friday night matches stands the most exalted young man in this territorial competition: the high school quarterback.

Like him or not, he leads the team. The coaches think he is capable or else he wouldn't be playing.

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And the fans? Well, he's our kid, our quarterback, and we'll shout encouragement and sometimes even tell him how to play. When he does something wrong we will tell him about that too.

If he gets hurt, we'll watch in silence until we are sure he is okay, then we will cheer when he goes back in. We'll feel better because our quarterback is back.

It's okay if we talk about him but you better not criticize our kids. And so it goes in high school football.

I have interviewed Parmer County pioneers who settled the land 80-90 years ago. Talked to a few bubbas that still remember their high school playing days and now their sons are playing.

So I decided it would be fun to interview two young men who carry that responsibility known as high school quarterback into the playoffs this Friday.

First I have to tell you that it does not take long to interview someone who has been on the planet less than twenty years. I have underwear and socks older than these two young men.

Tony Wayne Beauchamp is a 16-year-old junior at Bovina High often this year to Friona senior

School. (He hated for me to put running back, Shane Blackburn. his middle name in. Sorry Tony.)

He was born in a Lubbock Hospital and has lived in Bovina all his life. He enters Friday night's 2A Bi-District game against Idalou at 6-1 and 180 pounds.

He is an obvious choice for All District honors at quarterback and is an outstanding defensive back too.

Kyle David Grimsley is an 18year-old senior at Friona High School. (He didn't mind using his middle name.)

He was born in the hospital at Hereford but has lived all his life in Friona. He enters Friday night's 3A bi-district game against Denver City at 6-1, 182 pounds.

He is an obvious choice for All District honors at quarterback and is an outstanding defensive back too.

The similarities between these His teammates know him, fine young men do not end there. Though they have not met, their rise to high school quarterback is remarkably similar.

Neither particularly wanted to be a quarterback when they started their careers in the seventh grade.

Both describe themselves as "little" in those days in spite of their 6-1, 180 size today.

Kyle says he was so little he couldn't see over the line back then. Tony says he was always little and skinny.

Both have teammates today that they have been playing football with as long as they can remember.

In Friona elementary, Kyle and his pals would organize "playground" football and get the girls to form run-through lines and cheer as they went back to class.

Tony would play with the likes of childhood friends Luke Steelman and Albert Larrea. On the way to their 8-2 playoff season this year, Tony completed 16 passes for 6 touchdowns to Steelman, while he handed off to Larrea on 124 carries for 827 yards and 60 points.

In 7th, 8th, and 9th grades, Kyle played back-up quarterback to childhood friend Shane Blackburn. In their JV year, Shane was injured, Kyle took over, and has been quarterback ever since, handing off

Both young men maintain their academic status on the honor roll, with A's and B's.

As a part of their football lives, there are frequent meetings with players and coaches. Bovina players meet twice a week, Mondays and Thursdays, without coaches,

The Chieftains meet on Thursday nights after practice, without coaches, to eat pizza, watch film, and talk over the next game.

Kyle and his two back-ups, Aaron King and Jesus Mata usually meet with Coach Morton for 15 minutes during lunch.

Do you get to call any of your own plays, I asked. Kyle and Tony were quick to react with a "not really." Both QBs can call audibles after reading the defense, however I got the impression that they needed to have valid explanations for Coach Morton and Coach Ortiz in the event they change a play.

Kyle said once he was trying to "coach" Angel Vega and Quint Ellis on how to run a slant pattern without getting hit.

Apparently the coach took a dim view of Kyle's coaching attempts on that occasion. "What did the coach say, Kyle?'

With an understanding grin, the young field leader said, "He let me

Both Tony and Kyle have been

the season, Kyle took a hit to the helmet, but stayed in for the twopoint attempt. At the line of scrimmage his

teammates say he called off a snap count that none of them had ever heard before. When the ball was snapped, no

one knew what to do. Quint Ellis quickly ran into the end zone, Kyle threw him the ball. Two points. From the stands it looked like a perfect play. Kyle still doesn't remember it.

Last Friday against Amarillo Highland Park, Tony took a late hit after a handoff and spent the rest of the third and fourth quarter trying to figure out where he was.

Coach took him out for one series, but he convinced them he was okay and finished the game, engineering a fourth quarter touchdown drive. Final score: 13-12, Bovina.

Both young men have reason to be proud of their performances this season, leading the Mustangs and Chieftains to the playoffs.

Last year, sophomore Tony quarterbacked a 1-9 season and came back for 8-2 this year. Quite an accomplishment for a 16-year-old

As for Kyle, in spite of his super season, he is still bugged by his fumble in the Littlefield game that ended a tying scoring drive by the Chieftains. It was the only loss of the 9-1 Chieftain year.

One of his goals now is to meet Littlefield again in the playoffs.

So Friday night, 7:30 p.m., these two outstanding young men will take the field amid the cheers and the pressure.


All eyes: fans, coaches, media, and fellow players, will be on lots of Texas kids like Kyle David Grimsley and Tony Wayne Beauchamp.
