

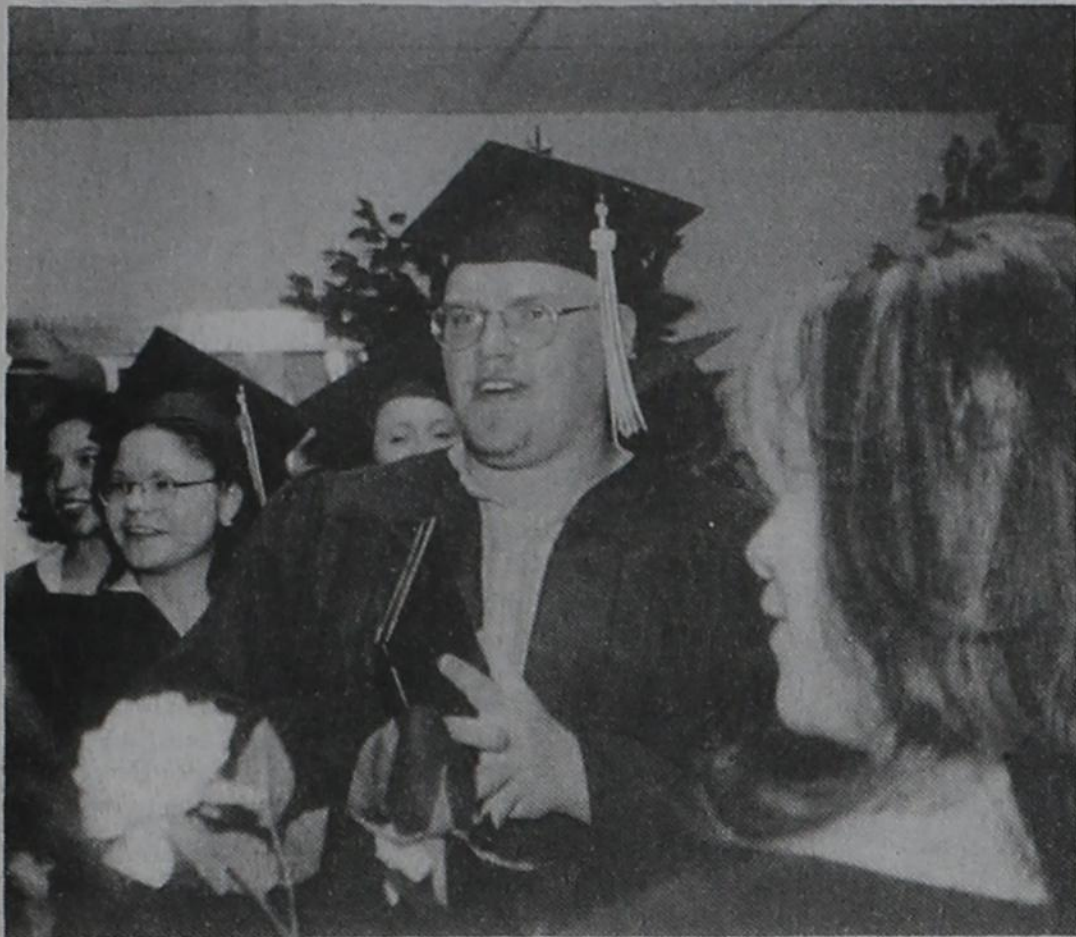

THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD

Area Gets Nice Shower On Tuesday

A nice evening shower measured .53 inches in Friona's official guage Tuesday evening.

The line of thunderstorms came from southeastern New Mexico, and took a northeastern path across the area.

Added to a "heavy dew" of .03 inches on June 2, this brought the month's total rainfall to .55 inches, and pushed the year's total to 9.38 inches.

The temperature officially reached the 90-degree mark for the first time on Thursday, June 3. It hit that mark another couple of days during the past week, when highs ranged from 84 to 91.

On the night of June 2, which was the anniversary of Friona's big tornado of 1995, the immediate area was spared, but the old White's Elevator into the Lazbuddie community was battered by hail up to the size of baseballs.

The Dimmitt area was also pelted with hail that night. It may be recalled that Dimmitt likewise had a tornado on June 2, 1995. Last week, a funnel cloud was spotted about eight miles east of Nazareth.

Police Seek Two In Local Robbery

Police Chief Leon Saddler and Parmer County Sheriff's deputies are seeking two Hispanic males that robbed the Bovina Allsup's store about 3 a.m. Tuesday.

Allsup's clerk Kevin Dixon was in the store's cooler when he heard the front door buzzer. As he exited the cooler he was confronted by two Hispanic males, one armed with a knife and the other threatened to display a gun.

Dixon handed over an undetermined amount of cash from the register. The two fled in what police describe as an older white Dodge work van.

Chief Saddler and the Sheriff's office say they have some evidence and a few leads they are following up.

I would like to take this opportunity to greet all of the citizens of the City of Bovina. My name is Ed Barrett and I am the new city manager of Bovina.

District Indicates 3.59 Feet Drop In Parmer County Water Levels

According to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock, Parmer County ground water levels declined

an average of 3.59 feet in 1998 in 97 privately owned wells in the observation network maintained by the district in its 546,603 acre service area within the county. This represents a decrease of 294,345 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in Parmer County.

A table listing observation wells in each county within the District and the water levels at one-, five-, and 10-year intervals is shown above.

Ground water levels within Parmer County declined an average of 2.38 feet annually during the 10-year period from 1989 to 1999. An average annual decline of 2.98 feet was recorded during the five-year period from 1994 to 1999.

Ground water declines within the High Plains Water

District service area ranged from 0.05 of a foot in Randall County to 3.59 feet in Parmer County.

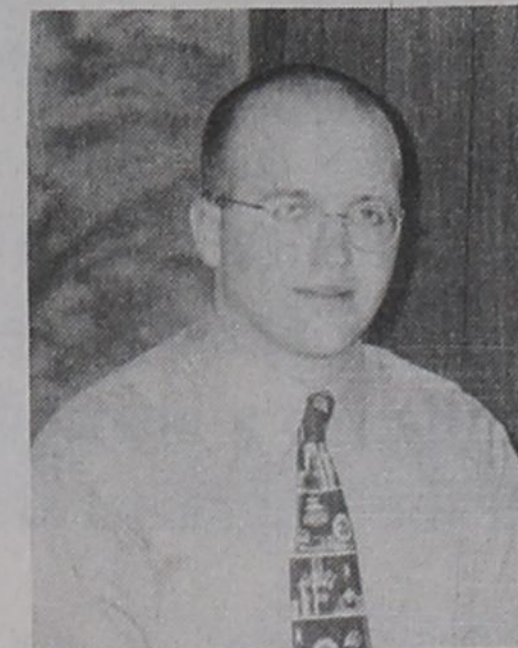

greatly reducing the typical liability which exists in traditional employer-employee agreements.

Avoid Irrigation Tailwater Waste

Up until the recent welcome rains, many High Plains producers were busy applying last-minute pre-plant irrigations to wet the soil profile for 1999 planting. Unfortunately, some of this ground water was escaping from fields as irrigation tailwater, and that is against both State Law and High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 rules.

Water District rules define irrigation tailwater waste as "ground water pumped for irrigation that escapes...onto land other than that of the owner of the well unless permission has been granted by the occupant of the land receiving the discharge. This permission must be in the form of an agreement signed between the parties on a form acceptable to the Water District. Potential parties to such an agreement are warned that it may obligate the provider to provide a specified supply of water into perpetuity and/or the recipient to accept runoff in whatever quantities at whatever time the provider chooses. Provisions of any agreement entered into must comply with (Water District) Rule 1(h)(5)."

Rule 1(h)(5) defines water waste as "wilfully or negligently causing, suffering, or permitting underground water to escape into any river, creek, natural watercourse, depression, lake, reservoir, drain, sewer, highway, road or road ditch, or onto land other than the owner of the well."

Allowing this water to escape not only contributes to unnecessary depletion of the ground water stored in the Ogallala Aquifer, but it erodes topsoil and causes safety hazards.

When reports of tailwater waste are received, Water District personnel investigate the water waste and document it with written memorandums and photographs. In addition, they contact the landowners and/or operators and ask these parties to stop the water waste. Follow-up investigations are conducted to make sure the water waste has been halted.

"We prefer to work with the farmer and address the problem; and in most cases, that works," said Ken Carver, High Plains Water District assistant manager. "If the waste doesn't stop, then we

have no choice but to seek an injunction from the courts."

Under an injunction, continued tailwater waste is considered Contempt of Court and carries a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and/or a six-month jail sentence per occurrence. If violations continue under the injunction, the District Court may also order the County Sheriff to padlock the water well to prevent further water waste. Violators can also be held liable for damages resulting from their water waste, such as accidents on flooded roadways, property damage, or crop damage.

"There are many physical methods available to help control or prevent irrigation tailwater waste, but the individual operator is the key to whether or not water is wasted. Careful management of irrigation water eliminates tailwater waste," said Carver.

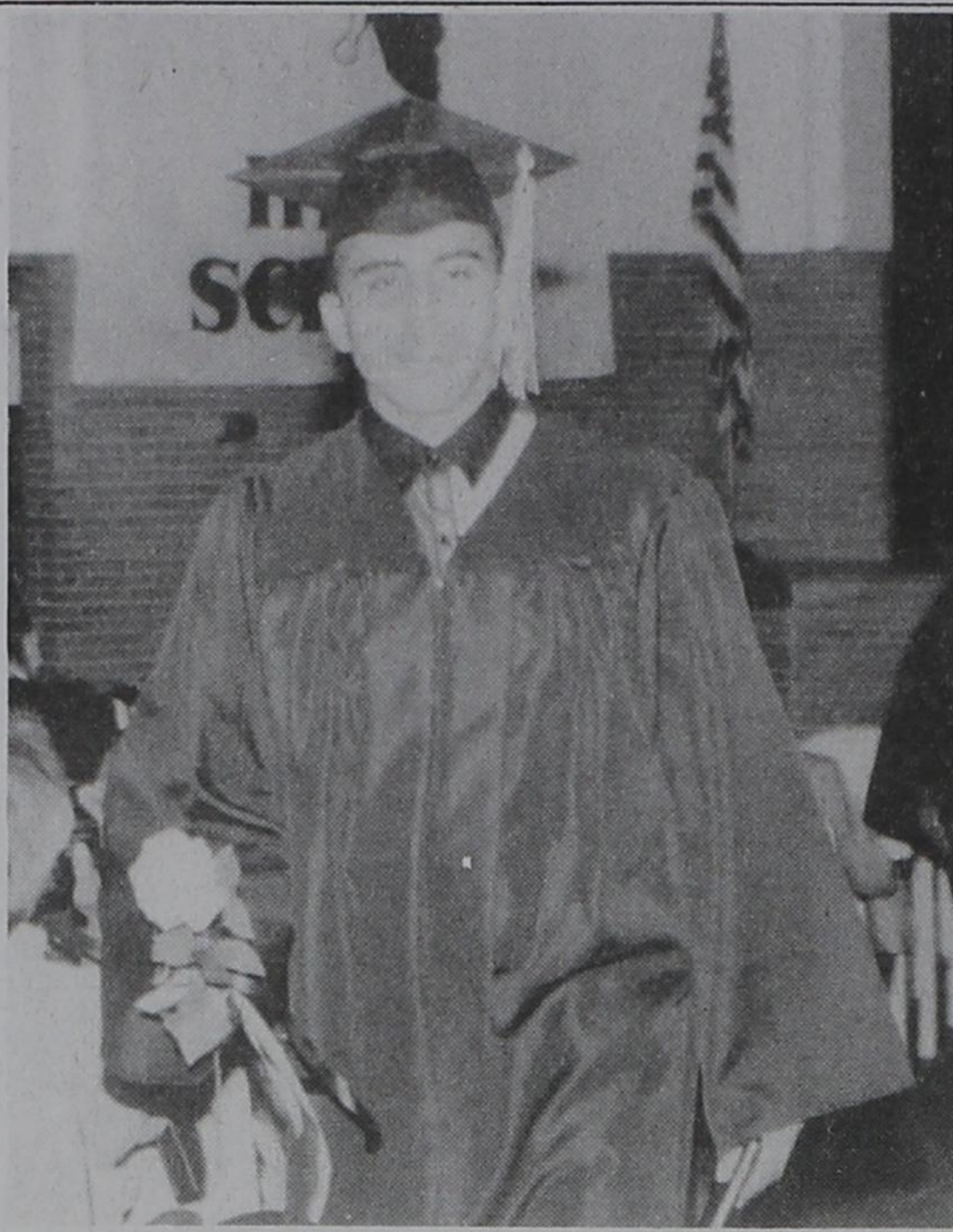
Tailwater abatement methods include reducing row lengths, terracing, and installing borders at the end of the field.

Surge irrigation systems, which alternate water flow between two sets of furrows in timed cycles, can be set to automatically cut back irrigation set times at the time the water is expected to reach the end of the field. Use of surge valves has proven to be very effective in halting irrigation tailwater waste.

Tailwater return pits or modified playa basins have been used in the past to collect the runoff water. Water collected in the tailwater return pits can be reused to irrigate crops.

Use of a Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler system is a good tailwater management practice, because the movement speed of the center pivot can be adjusted to match the water application rate to the soil infiltration rate. Use of furrow dikes under the pivot to collect the water and hold it in place can also increase irrigation application efficiencies.

PHH Museum Shows Cotton Farm Artwork

In keeping with its 1999 agricultural theme, the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum has installed in its Graphics Gallery fourteen lithographs about cotton farming by Texas artist, Merritt Mauzey (1897-1973). The lithographs were used as illustrations in Mauzey's children's book, *Cotton Farm Boy*.

Having been a cotton farmer many years, the Clifton, Texas-born Mauzey "bade farewell to the farm" and moved to Sweetwater, Texas, in 1920, saying he was "tired of snakes, self-sucking cows, cannibalistic hogs, grasshoppers, (and) army worms." In 1927 he moved to Dallas where he worked for a cotton exporter and rekindled an interest in art.

Mauzey took night classes with Frank Klepper and John Knott, sketched outdoors and painted a night. He exhibited his works based on rural life at the Texas Centennial Exposition (1936), the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition (1937), and at the Art Institute of Chicago, Delphe Studio and the Whitney Museum in New York. Mauzey was a charter member of the Lone Star Printmakers in 1938 and began specializing in lithography. In 1946, he received a Guggenheim fellowship, the first Texas artist to be selected for the honor.

In 1955, Mauzey published *Cotton Farm Boy*,

the first in a series of six children's books for which he drew lithographs and wrote the text. American print expert Carl Zigrosser called Mauzey's work "the translation of cotton into art."

The 14 lithographs on exhibit at PPHM are presented courtesy the Museum of the Southwest, Midland, Texas, which has an extensive Mauzey collection, most of which was donated by the artist. A volume of *Cotton Farm Boy*, lent by the Cornette Library of West Texas A&M University, is also part of the installation. The exhibition will run through August 22.

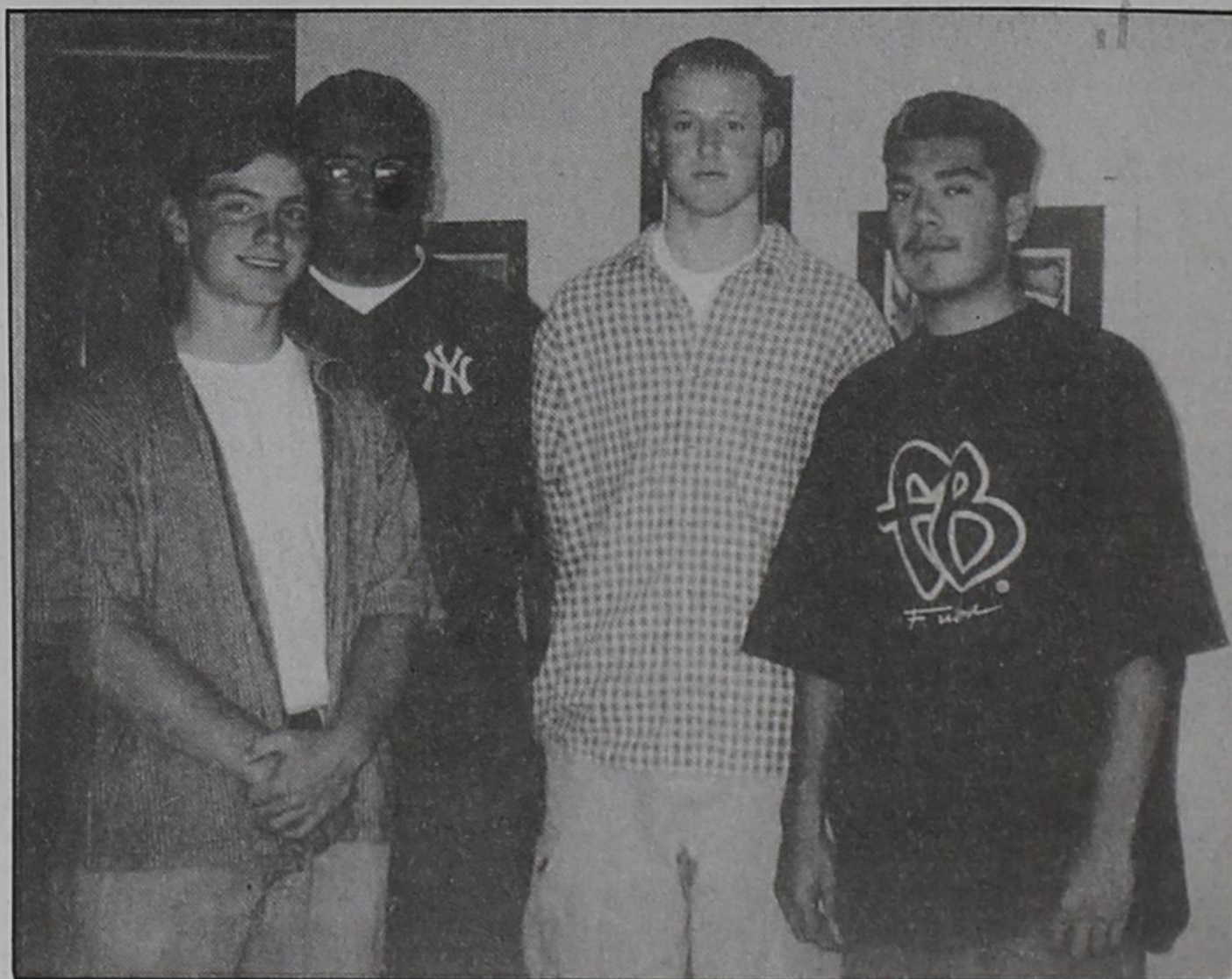

er, wildlife conservationist, and conservation homemaker. Additional awards were presented for outstanding posters and essays on soil and water conservation by youth in the area.

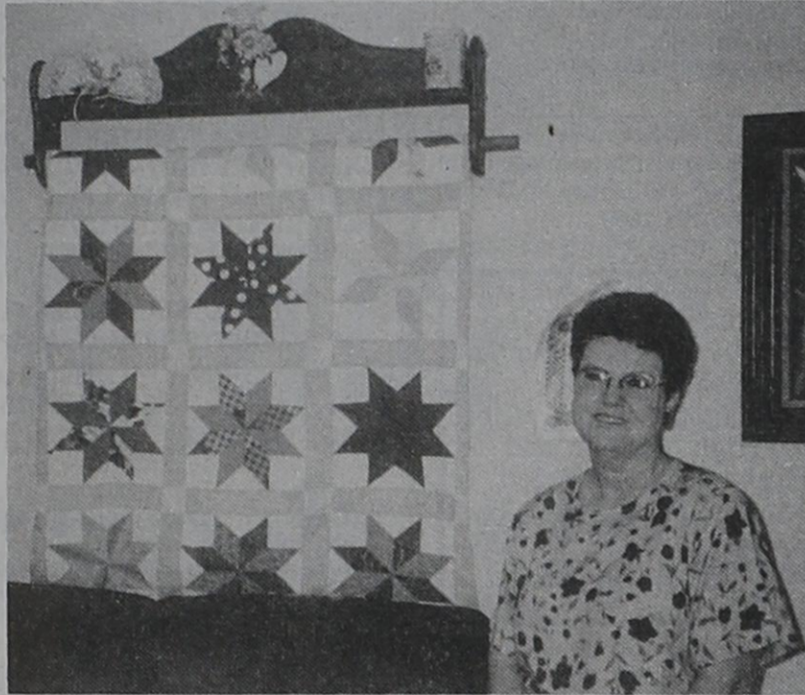

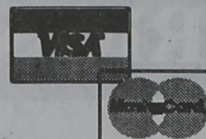

Water District Advises About Well Dangers

The safe rescue of a 17-month-old boy from a water well near his Mulvane, Kansas home on May 13 should remind everyone of the dangers associated with open, abandoned wells, according to High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 officials.

News reports state that the child fell into the narrow well and became trapped about 16 feet below land surface. Rescue workers dug a 21-foot-deep hole parallel to the well, then dug a tunnel over to the boy before bringing him safely to the surface. The boy suffered only minor injuries after being trapped in the well for about five hours. This incident was reminiscent to one in 1987 in which 18-month-old Jessica McClure was rescued from a well in Midland.

"Once again, we have had a near-tragic reminder of the dangers associated with open wells," said Ken Carver, High Plains Water District assistant manager. "We are so thankful that this child was safely rescued. Even though this took place out-of-state, this should serve as a reminder for landowners everywhere to make sure all open wells on their property are properly covered."

Locating and getting open, abandoned wells properly covered is an important function of the High Plains Water District. Since the District's creation in 1951, more than 1,100 open, abandoned wells have been properly covered.

An open or uncovered well is defined by the rules of the High Plains Water District as "any artificial excavation drilled or dug for the purpose of exploring for or producing water from the underground water reservoir, not capped or covered as required by the rules of the District."

Rule 16 of the High Plains Water District details the conditions under which

open or uncovered wells are to be covered. "Every owner or operator of land within the District upon which is located any open or uncovered well is, and shall be, required to close or cap the same permanently with a covering capable of sustaining weight of not less than four hundred (400) pounds, except when said well is in actual use by the owner or operator thereof; and no such owner or operator shall permit or allow any open or uncovered well to exist in violation of this requirement."

If the well is to be capped temporarily, the cap should either be welded or bolted to the casing or have a permanently-attached weighted pipe extending no less than three feet into the well casing. The weighted pipe should be no more than two inches smaller in diameter than the well casing. The cap attached to the weighted pipe should be of sufficient size that no opening will appear when the cap is shifted from side to side. Children cannot easily remove this cap, nor can animals, pollutants, or discarded items enter the well.

If the well is to be permanently plugged, then all removable casing shall be removed, if possible. The well may then either be filled with cement to the land surface or filled with bentonite mud and followed by a cement plug extending from land surface to a depth of no less than 10 feet.

If the well site is to be completely destroyed, then the concrete pump base and casing are to be removed. The hole should then be filled with heavy mud and capped with a layer of cement from 10 feet below land surface to two feet below land surface, which should be below plow depth. The site should then be topped and mounded with earth.

"If you have an open, abandoned well on your property and you have been

intending to cover it, please do so today. We don't want a similar accident occurring in the Texas High Plains region," said Carver.
