### Around The Square

With Mack

We are always happy when we hear good news. And we are happy when someone says something complimentary about us. This applies to individuals and cities.

In Thursday's Abilene Reporter-News the following editorial appeared. Many of our readers also read the Reporter-News, but for those who do not, we reproduce the editorial here. It reads: "Congratulations to Eastland and Ranger on a remarkable demonstration of civic enterprise in tackling the water problem: head-

"The two Eastland County communities combined in the Eastland County Water Supply District, Tuesday voted \$1.5 million in bonds to build a dam at the junction of Colony Creek and Leon River, build a filtration plant near the lake, and hook up both cities with pipe lines. The vote was all but unanimous—1,383 for, only 32 against.

"Cisco, one of the pioneers in water development with its 'Eg Dan', could join the new water district later if it sees fit or circumstances make it advisable. Olden, lying between Eastland and Ranger, will be permitted to tap the pipeline.

"The Leon River, once called De Leon, is one of the longest minor streams in Texas, and a holy terror in flood. A huge government dam is being erected north of Belton, several miles from the river's junction with Little River, just above the latter stream's confluence with the mighty Brazos.

"The new Eastland-Ranger dam will impound about 28,000 acre feet of water, as compared with the 72,000 acre feet of Abilene's Lake For Hill Phantom, and will provide ample water resources for the area for some years to come. It should also provide a measure of protection for overflow lands downstream.

"The compact between Eastland and Ranger offers a good example of what can be accomplished when lively communities throw in together to solve the water problem jointly. There have been many examples of this sort in West Texas in recent years, and it is all to the good.

"The long drought has driven home to West Texas cities and towns the grim fact that without adequate water supplies their size and development, to say nothing of their prosperity, are strictly limited, and only bold and imaginative action can get the job done."

The water is needed, and will likely spell economic independence for both cities. But this election has done more than produce water. It has cemented the two cities together in a friendly bond. All have learned that we may do better while working in harmony with those about us. If it is good for Ranger it is good for Eastland and vice versa.

By working together we may australize our county, and by so doing supplement our economy now so dependent upon agriculture, with all its blights and heartbreaks. "Civilization Begins and Ends with the Plow" is an old slogan of the Texas Farm & Ranch. We must have agriculture to survive, but a few scattered factories, here and there, will come in mighty handy when drought and pestilence start working havoc.

### Both Parties Plan County Conventions

County Democratic Precinct Conventions will be held at the various 26 voting boxes in Eastland county on Saturday, May 3, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. At these meetings delegates will be chosen to go to the County Convention, which meets in the County Courtroom in Eastland at 2 o'clock, on Tuesday, May 6th.

Here delegates will be chosen to the Democratic State Convention. Precincts are to have one delegate for each 25 votes cast in the last gubernatorial election. The county may elect one state delegate for each 300 votes or major fraction thereof, cast in the last general election for governor.

Republicans will hold their county convention on Saturday, May 3rd, at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce offices.

The mooted question this year seems to fall back on party pledges and instructed delegates. As the matter now stands it is unlikely if "party pledges" will be required, and the Texas Democratic delegation will in all probability go to the National Convention uninstructed.

The brothers, 19 year-old Bill Shipman and 16-year-old Jimmy Shipman, disappeared on an outing on the lake Wednesday. They are the sons of Doctor and Mrs. Joe Shipman of Vernon.

The boys had gone to Lake Kemp on the Waggoner State Ranch about 12 miles from Seymour to try out their new boat. They were last seen turning into an inlet on the lake about 11 a.m. Wednesday. Their empty boat, which normally carries only one person but which was occupied by both brothers and stowed with a quantity of gear, drifted ashore later Wednesday.

### Allies Want Full Dress Truce Meet

UN truce negotiators have asked the Reds for a full-dress meeting of top truce delegates tomorrow. The surprise request was announced shortly after the senior officer talks on prisoner exchange were recessed indefinitely at the request of the Allies.

The move came on the heels of a Communist charge that the Allies want to keep 100,000 of the 170,000 Red prisoners they hold. There's no indication of why the UN has asked for a top level meeting, or whether the Reds will agree to it.

### Victim Has More Tales Than Cash In \$7,200 Loss

FT. WORTH, April 25 (UP)—A Comanche, Okla. oilfield supply dealer who has told Ft. Worth police a number of stories the past few days about a "kidnapping-robbery" has finally been straightened out.

Ozra Rather first turned up at the sheriff's office last Monday and told a tale of being robbed of \$7,200 dollars and being held captive five days by two men. But Wednesday, he changed his story about the money was stolen from his car during the five days he spent with two men in a beer drinking and dining spree.

Yesterday morning however, he was back with the original story about being robbed and kidnapped. But later in the day, he admitted again that the kidnapping story wasn't true. He told deputies the money was taken from the glove compartment of his car while he and two men he met in Ft. Worth were drinking. Rather said \$3,000 dollars of the \$7,200 he collected in Ft. Worth on a business deal was involved in a partnership with a Dallas man.

### Gulf Coast Area Faces Oil Strike

The Texas Gulf coastal area may still be tied up by an impending oil strike although negotiations are continuing unintermittently. J. Elro Brown, district representative of the Oilworkers International, said there is no indication that a settlement will be reached before the Wednesday deadline. He said neither side has made concessions in the long dispute. The workers are holding out for a 25c hourly wage increase and the companies are sticking to their original offer of between nine and 10c.

Negotiations are going on at the Sinclair Plant in Houston, the Pure Oil Refinery in Port Neches and the Gulf and Atlantic Refineries in Port Arthur. And tomorrow, meetings are set up for the Magnolia Plant in Beaumont. The strike, if called, will idle some 25,000 oilworkers in the Texas Gulf Coast area.

### Easter Seal Returns Are Very Slow

"Although Easter has come and gone it isn't too late to send a contribution to help crippled children", Martin M. Ricker, Executive Director of the Texas Society for Crippled Children, stated. The Texas Society sponsors the annual Easter Seal Campaign, mailing thousands of sheets of colorful seals to homes throughout the state.

"The returns to date have been a little slow in coming in but we are confident the public will support our program this year as they have for the past nineteen years", he said.

The Society, through its county affiliate, sponsors nineteen treatment centers where children afflicted with all types of crippling diseases may receive physical, occupational and speech therapy free of charge.

Contributions may be sent to "Crippled Children, care of your local post office."

### Townsend Found Guilty; Given Jail Sentence

R. D. Townsend was given a 6-months jail sentence in District Court today, on a charge of Negligent Homicide. The case was first tried some three months ago and resulted in a hung jury.

Evidence showed that Townsend, driving a truck, near Cisco, struck and killed Harrell Dwan Bisbee, a young school boy.

### Charley Lucas Has New Well At His Station

Charley Lucas has just completed a good water well near his service station on East Main. Mr. Lucas plans to wash all cars that come his way, and the City may miss his patronage for all time to come, so far as car washing water is concerned.

The well is 30 feet deep and has an abundant supply of good soft water, he says.

### Three Airlines Protest Order Banning Service

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—Three United States air line companies have asked the U. S. Court of Appeals in Washington to set aside a recent order which stopped a new service planned by the carriers. The air lines are Eastern, Braniff and Trans World. And supporting their request were petitions from Miami, Tampa, Houston, Dallas, Amarillo, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Oakland.

The three lines had planned to start a new southern transcontinental air service that was scheduled to start April 14th. The order was issued April 10th at the request of National Air Lines. National pleaded it would suffer serious injury by the interchange agreement among Eastern, Braniff and TWA to operate one place coast-to-coast service.

# UN Calls Full Scale Truce Meet Sunday

### Senator Proposes Probe Truman's News Security

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—Sen. Blair Moody of Michigan says he will press for quick action on his proposal to investigate government security policies, and their effect on "the free flow of news."

He wants Chairman John McClellan, Arkansas Democrat, to call a meeting of the Senate Governmental Operations Committee to consider undertaking the investigation. He says McClellan indicates he's favorable to the idea.

Moody, who is a member of the committee, said he's hopeful of getting quick action.

The former Washington correspondent introduced his resolution yesterday. It would provide for a small group of Washington reporters to function as an advisory council to the Senators conducting the investigation.

Moody said any probe should "certainly" cover President Truman's security order of last September. That authorized all government agencies, whether or not they were directly connected with national defense, to classify documents as "secret" or "confidential."

### Government Will Survey Flooded Area Housing

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—The government has ordered a survey of housing problems confronting homeless flood victims in the Missouri and Mississippi River valleys.

Raymond Foley, Housing and Home Finance administrator, said homeless flood families seem to be cared for presently. He said the survey will determine long-range needs for replacement or rehabilitation of flood-damaged housing.

So far President Truman has allocated \$1,600,000 from his disaster fund for flood relief in the Missouri and Mississippi River valleys.

At the same time, the chief of the Army Engineers said the disastrous river flood could have been prevented if two dams had been completed.

Lt.-Gen. Lewis Pick says the dams at Garrison, N.D., and Fort Randall, S.D., are part of the Pick-Sloan Flood Control Plan and could have been finished by now if funds had been made available.

### Austin Residents Still See Pink

AUSTIN, April 25 (UP)—The unexplained "pinkish" objects were reported over Austin again last night, but some folks said today they were nothing but seagulls.

Sergeant E. V. Rossignoli said he observed the first batch of "pink somethings" Wednesday night. He said they were seagulls flying about 100 feet high and the color came from red neon light reflected off their bodies.

However, six persons last night reported two groups of pinks both traveling at extremely high speed. The objects were also reported in Fort Worth Wednesday night. But weather bureau officials said they saw nothing unusual in the sky.

### Allies Gave No Reason For The Surprise Call

Something is up in the deadlocked Korean truce talks.

The U-N has called for a full-scale meeting of top armistice negotiators of both sides on Sunday. The request was made to the Communists a few hours after the latest round of discussions ended at Pazwanjom, without progress.

So far, there is no reply from the Reds.

The allies gave no reason for asking for the meeting of top brass. However, it appears that they may be preparing for a strong effort to get the Reds to agree on an armistice.

The three issues blocking the signing of a truce are the exchange of prisoners-of-war, the Communist nomination of Russia as an Armistice supervisor, and the Communist demand for airfield construction during a truce.

Today Communist negotiators broke the strict censorship that has kept the prisoner talks secret. And later the U-N revealed that the Communists still refuse to give in to demands for voluntary repatriation of prisoners.

Of the 132,000 Red prisoners in Allied hands, U-N spokesmen say only 70,000 want to return to their homes behind the Iron Curtain.

The Reds charge the Allies are deliberately refusing to return some 100,000 prisoners held in U-N camps.

### SENATOR COMMENTS

Senator William Knowland says the United Nations would be making a grave mistake to allow the Chinese Communist to build "commercial" air fields in North Korea.

The California Republican says there have been reports that the United Nations is prepared to do some yielding to Communist demands for the right to build airfields south of the Yalu River in Korea.

### Red Cross Asks Additional Aid

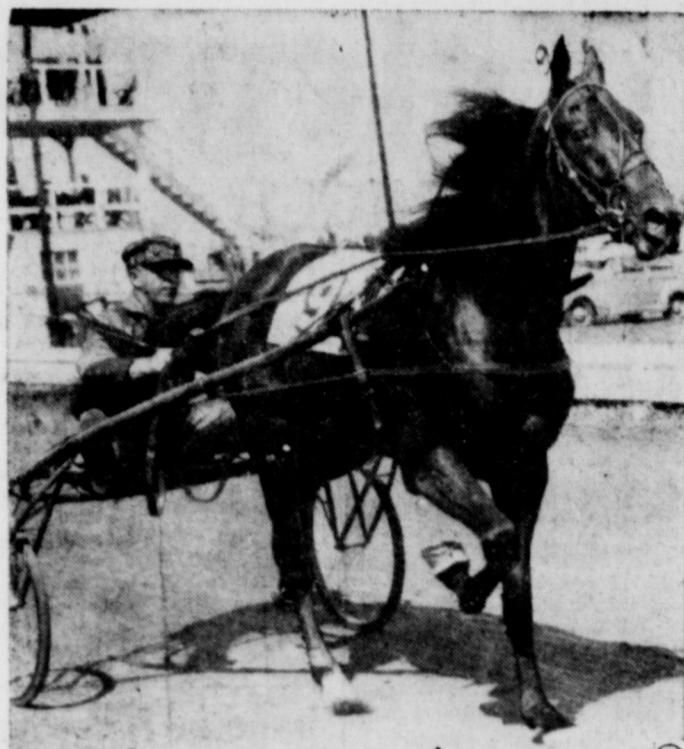
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Japan Will Seek Big Loan From U. S. Soon

### Gives Two Menu Ideas For May Entertainment

The month of May often brings with it more entertaining than usual. There's the bride-elect you want to fete, the graduate or it's the last club meeting of the year. Whichever is the case, tasty, gay and attractive refreshments are in order.

For these occasions a luncheon planned around a sandwich-leaf is ideal. To make this attractive serving cut the crusts from a loaf of bread, then cut the loaf into 3 or 4 lengthwise layers. Butter the inner sides of the slices and spread the first layer with deviled ham, mixed with mayonnaise, on the second arrange thin slices of tomato; the third spread with a combination of pimiento cheese, crisp bacon bits and chopped ripe olives. These layers may be varied. Ground ham, tongue, liverwurst and many other meats are excellent. When you have the layers put together, frost the top and sides with cream cheese, moistened with cream or whole milk.

Wrap the loaf with a moist tea towel and chill well until you are ready to serve. Then garnish with pimiento, stuffed olive, parsley or water chest. For serving fun, slice the loaf at the table (with a sharp knife) and serve on individual plates. Your refreshments will be completed with coffee and dessert.

More on the hearty side come entree meat salads. Reba Staggs, home economist, suggests a Fruited Ham Salad that is as refreshing as its name. To prepare, cover seedless raisins with orange juice and let stand 20 to 30 minutes. Then toss with diced cooked smoked ham, diced celery, orange sections, diced unpelleted apple and green pepper. Moisten with mayonnaise and serve in crisp lettuce cups. Join with potato chips, hot rolls, chocolate refrigerator cake and coffee.

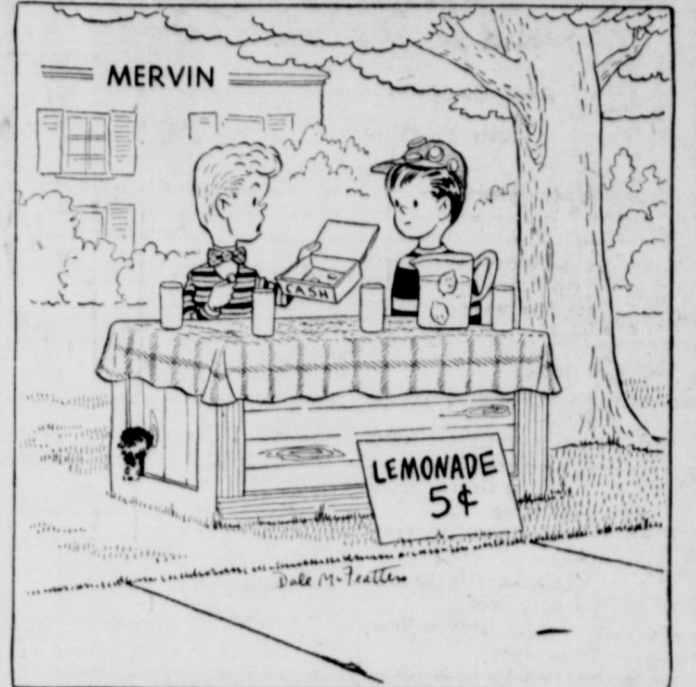

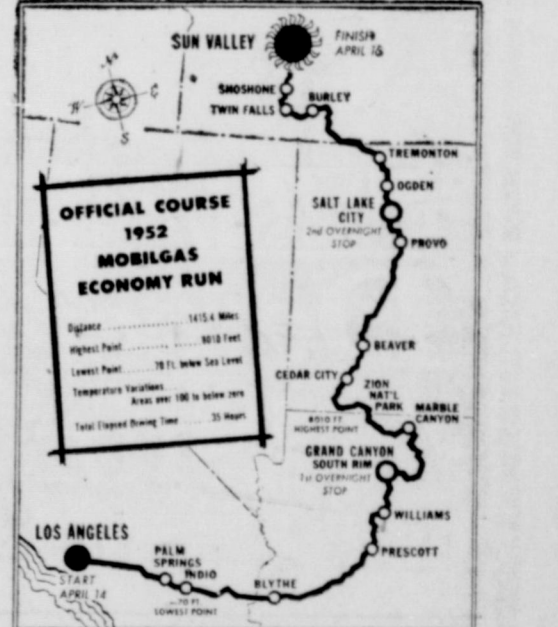

### Acquaint 'Em With This New Lamb Roast

Introduce a new meat cut to your family every week. This plan is great for breaking meal-time monotony. And, often, it proves to be a thrifty move, too.

Have you served stuffed lamb shoulder? For this cut ask your market man to bone a square cut lamb shoulder, then sew around the outer edge, leaving one side open for stuffing, points on meat expert Reby Staggs. This gives you a flat cushion-like roast. The stuffings are many and varied. Mint is always a lamb favorite; so add chopped mint leaves to your regular bread stuffing. An apple-rasin stuffing is another that's proudly served with lamb. Other choices include rice and mushrooms, sausage, celery, or just plain bread stuffing.

With the meat stuffed, you'll

want to skewer or sew the opening together, then it's ready to cook. This stuffed roast is prepared the same as any other roast. Place it on a rack (with the fat side up) in an open roasting pan. Do not add water and do not cover the pan. Cook in a slow oven (300 degrees) for 30 to 35 minutes per pound.
