Gulf Coast Area Faces Oil Strike

By United Press The Texas Gulf coastal area may still be tied up by an impending oil strike although negotiations are continuing uninterrupted. J. Elro Brown, district representative of the Oilworkers International, said there is no indication that a settlement will be reached before the Wednesday deadline. He said neither side has made concessions in the long dispute. The workers are holding out for a 25¢ hourly wage increase and the companies are sticking to their original offer of between
