East Texas Flood Threat Diminishing

The threat of floods along East Texas rivers has lessened the past 24 hours and a serious threat of high water has passed.

Weathermen say that lowlands on the main stem of the Trinity River at Trinidad may be flooded as the river now stands at 31 feet and may reach a crest of around 32 feet by Tuesday. The flood stage at this point is 28 feet. But they add that nothing will be endangered there except possibly cattle grazing on the lowlands and residents have ample time to get their livestock out of the danger areas.

And the Trinity has just about reached its crest at Rosser. Water stands at 24 feet and is about "at a stand" weathermen say.

However, the river is well out of banks at Rockwall but the water is falling rapidly and unless more rains occur it will be back within its banks by Monday.

The threat of floods on the Cypress and Sabine Rivers running through East Texas has lessened, weathermen say.

U. S. Air Raid Warning Bettered

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—Congressional sources have revealed that America's air raid warning network is being extended by the use of radar bearing "picket" planes.

The plan involves use of patrol planes carrying radar equipment on flights from advanced American air bases, presumably including airfields in Alaska and Greenland.

The purpose is to extend the range of the nation's radar umbrella far beyond the continental boundaries. The effectiveness of ground-based radar is generally limited because its waves move in a straight line and are blocked at the horizon by the curvature of the earth.

New Type Anti-Aircraft Gun To Be Used In Korea

WASHINGTON, April 26, UP—An anti-aircraft gun capable of shooting down the fastest and highest flying planes is now ready and soon will be used in Korea. Army Ordnance Chief Major-General Elbert Ford says the gun, which is almost fully automatic, "surpasses anything that Russia has as far as we know."

Jehovah's Witnesses Refuse Medical Aid To Dying Girl

QESSA, April 26 (UP)—A family of Jehovah's Witnesses in Odessa is blocking the medical treatment of their critically injured 20-year-old daughter. The family said it is against their religious principles to allow a blood transfusion which might save the girl's life.

The girl is Grace Marie Oliff, who received severe head and body injuries in a two-car crash last Sunday. And a doctor, who refuses permission to use his name, is standing by her side even though he is being obstructed from

WAF Sergeant Ends Battle Over Ticket

FT. WORTH, April 26 (UP)—Mrs. Orville Farmer a sergeant in the Women's Air Force at Carswell Air Base in Ft. Worth, has paid a \$10 traffic fine she said she didn't intend to pay earlier in the week. Her attorney, Spencer Shropshire, said Mrs. Farmer paid the fine because Carswell officials "don't care" for the publicity the case has attracted.

The woman has refused to pay a traffic ticket she got March 25th for running a red light. And her first trial ended in a hung jury. Mrs. Farmer's husband said his wife was also influenced in paying her fine by the heavy cost of the court fight.

Supreme Court Probably Hear Steel Seizure

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—Observers here seem certain that the Supreme Court eventually will have to rule on President Truman's seizure of the steel mills, one of the most critical issues in American history.

But meantime, industry officials think they'll get an injunction against Mr. Truman from Federal Judge David Pine. He heard their arguments yesterday, and Pine seemed astonished at government contentions that the president has unlimited emergency powers with which the courts cannot interfere.

Full Dress Truce Session Opens Tonight

FANMUNJOM, Korea, April 26 (UP)—Allied and Communist truce negotiators in Korea have scheduled their first full-dress session in more than two months.

All yesterday proposed that the full delegations take over in what's reported as the gravest crisis of the long negotiations.

The Reds accepted the proposal. And tonight both top-level delegations will meet in Fanmunjom for the first time since February 19th. They will take up the issues of a prisoner exchange and truce supervision, on which subcommittees and staff officers have been unable to make any progress.

Machinery For New Factory Is Now In Transit

Eastland's new garment factory is to be realized in the very near future, stated Herbert Tanner, Chamber of Commerce manager, today. "Machinery has been shipped and should arrive in Eastland about the middle of next week," he said. "Installation will begin immediately."

"The Pullman building on East Main has been completely overhauled," he said. "A new hardwood floor has just been completed, and the building renovated and repainted. It will be modern throughout."

San Francisco Churches Merge

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26 UP—The Presbyterian churches in San Francisco have voted to merge, and the union is described by one of the church pastors as a demonstration of "Christian Democracy." One congregation formerly was all-white and the other all-Negro, but from now on the two groups will worship together.

Mississippi Is Moving South; Big "Mo" Calm

The muddy Mississippi River flood crest is surging downstream from Dubuque, Ia., after leaving more than 1000 persons homeless in the dikeless Iowa City. Flood waters up to six feet deep cover a 100-block area of Dubuque, and although the river is falling, it is expected to menace the city for another six or seven days. The flood crest is due next at Clinton and Sabula, Ia. At Fulton, Ill., just across the river from Clinton, a dike burst yesterday and muddy waters flowed over a lowland area.

The destructive Missouri River flood crest is nearing the end of its most disastrous rampage in history. The bloated river, after a three-week tour of destruction from Montana to Missouri, is dropping steadily at Kansas City and army engineers said it probably will be back to bank-level late tomorrow. However, they warn that havoc still can be expected as the river courses the final 375 miles to west Alton, Mo., where it joins the Mississippi.

George P. Morris Area Pioneer Dies Suddenly, Friday

George Petty Morris, 70, who lived on Route 3, north of Ranger, died of a heart attack at his home about 6:00 p.m. Friday.

Norris was born December 19, 1881 in Mississippi. He had lived here since he was one year old. He was married in 1937. Mr. Morris was in the farming industry.

Funeral services for Mr. Morris will be conducted at 2:30 p.m. in the Second Baptist Church of Ranger, with Reverend Jasper Massee, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, and Lonzo Sides, of Bullock, officiating. Burial will be in the Macedonia Cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. G. P. Morris, three daughters, Mrs. T. I. Collins, and Mrs. C. D. Stagger of Ranger, and Mrs. L. A. Carroway of Ft. Worth; and a sister, Miss Kate Morris of Ranger. Eight step-children and 16 grandchildren also survive.

Aspirants Stump States In Hope Gaining Members

Republicans in four states held state conventions Saturday to pick delegates to the national convention.

They will select a total of 46 delegates, and Senator Robert Taft probably will get most of them.

Utah is putting up 14 delegates. Utah Senator Wallace Bennett, a Taft man, predicts that the Ohion will win at least 12.

Arizona selects 14 delegates to the GOP national convention.

Governor Howard Pyle says most of the sentiment in his state also is for Taft. The governor also predicts that Arizona will vote Republican this year, for the first time since 1928.

Taft himself is in Arkansas, making his bid for the four delegates to be selected at the state convention in Little Rock Saturday afternoon. In a keynote address to Arkansas Republicans, Taft emphasized that he believes in states' rights. He said that "if it weren't for the doctrine of state's rights," Congress would be passing laws to run school boards and would be directing city and county governments.

In Colorado, Taft faces a fight. State Republican leaders are divided between the Senator and General Dwight Eisenhower, and the Eisenhower forces say they will get most of the 14 delegates to be chosen in Colorado. Four already have been picked.

Eisenhower, himself, ignored politics Saturday, paying his farewell today to the little nation of Luxembourg. He was the guest of Mrs. Perie Mesta, American minister to the Duchy.

But, the General's campaign manager, Senator Henry Lodge of Massachusetts, promised at home that Eisenhower would be completely frank in discussing political issues when he gets back to the United States. Lodge says, however, that Eisenhower will not make any "whistle-stop tour" before the GOP national convention.

Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia, Kefauver's opponent in the 6th Florida primary, is concentrating on states' rights. Russell told an audience at Atlanta he would fight any federal infringement on the rights of states and any plan—to quote Russell "which would lead our country down the road to socialism."

Presidential hopeful Estes Kefauver is campaigning for delegates in Ohio. In an early morning speech at Fremont, the Tennessee Democrat called for "an end of sectionalism" and a re-adoption of the concept that all are citizens of the same country.

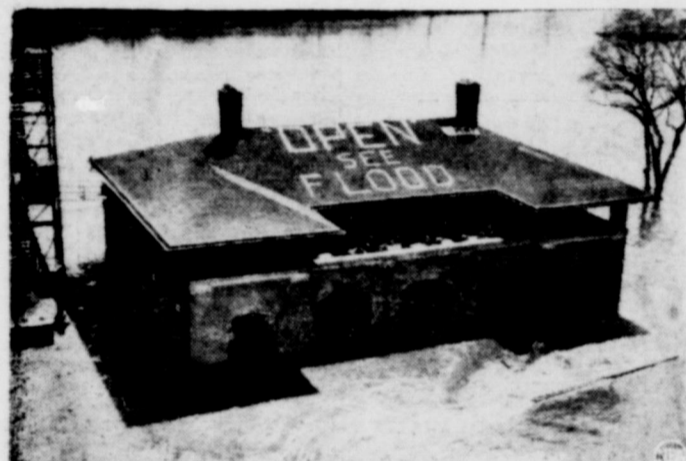

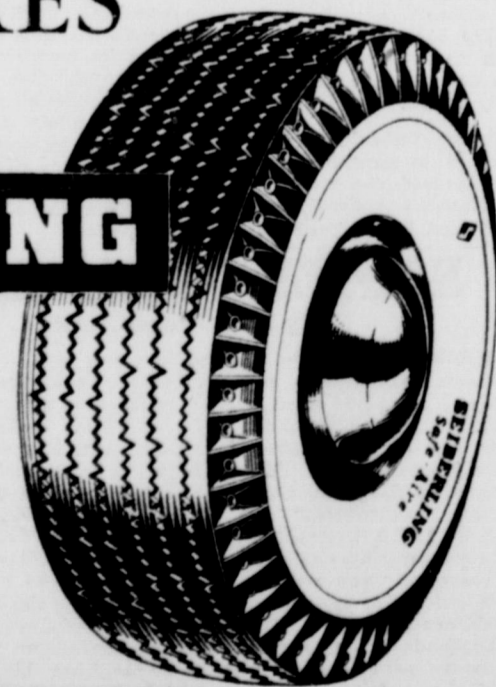

May Baskets Come To The Dinner Table

May Day is sure to bring gay little baskets to your front door. And, Mother, why not let your family find a surprise at dinner. Make your main dish Meat Baskets with Creamed Potatoes.

According to home economist Reba Staggs, to prepare these edible baskets combine 3/4 pound of ground beef (enough for six cups) with 1/4 of fine dry bread crumbs. Moisten with 1/2 cup of milk and season with 1 teaspoon of salt and 1/4 teaspoon of pepper. Line ungreased muffin pans with the meat mixture to a depth of about 1/4 inch. Next, fill the baskets with creamed potatoes and they're ready to cook. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 30 minutes.

Or change about and serve creamed meat in potato baskets. French fried noodle baskets or pastry baskets are other choices. Filling suggestions include creamed ham and pimiento or mushroom, creamed chipped beef with peas and creamed lamb or canned luncheon meat.

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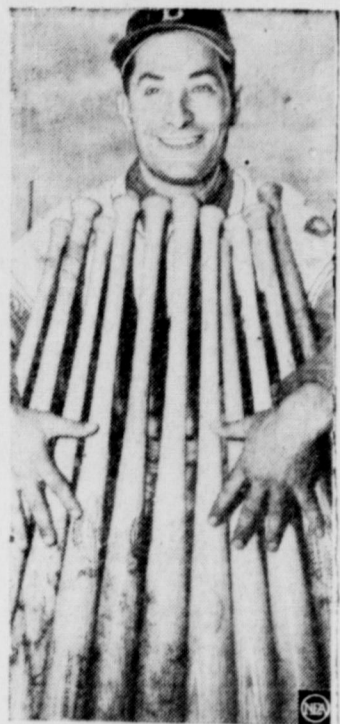

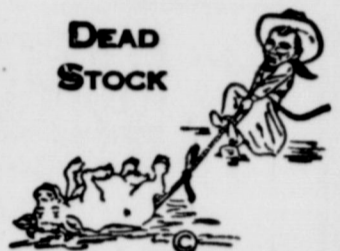
