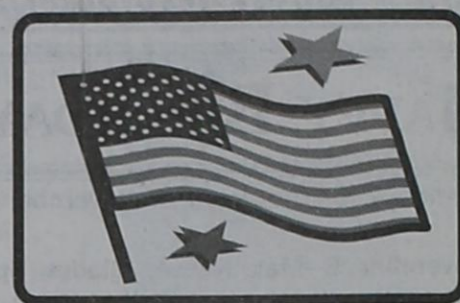

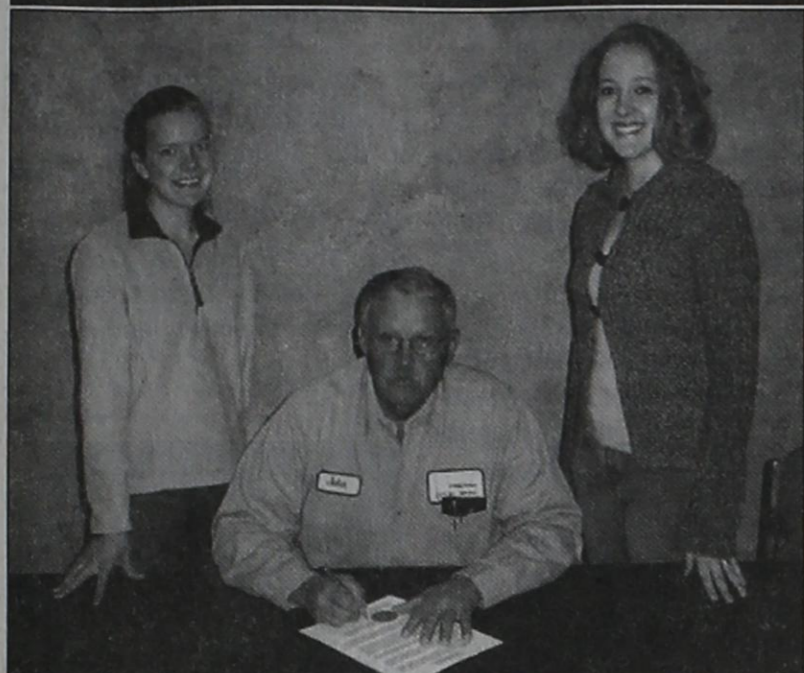

Posting the Colors: FHS Band to Salute Veterans

The public, and all Parmer County veterans, are invited to the Friona High School gymnasium Tuesday, November 11, at 9 a.m., for an inspirational musical salute led by the local VFW Post and the Friona High School band.

Band director Tim Youree started the annual celebration a few years ago as a way for students to appreciate and honor the sacrifices made by our veterans. The program will include patriotic music, a flag ceremony, introduction of veterans, student tributes, the playing of TAPS, and retiring of the colors.

A reception and refreshments will follow the ceremony in the high school cafeteria. Everyone is invited to attend and support the efforts of the band students who have practiced hard to provide an inspiring program.

Parents, Seniors To Be Honored Friday

Parents and seniors will be honored in pre-game ceremonies Friday at Chieftain Field, when the Chiefs host Abernathy in the 2003 season finale.

Kickoff (referees permitting) will be at 7:30 p.m. Pre-game ceremonies begin at 7 p.m.

The Chieftains' third district loss at Lockney last week knocked them out of playoff contention, so the main thing at stake Friday will be pride.

Missing the playoffs will be the first time for FHS after seven consecutive seasons of post-season qualifying, and eight times in the previous nine years.

Abernathy, on the other hand, has a shot at making the playoffs, so Friona could have a say as to who gets into the playoffs and who doesn't.

The Antelopes (5-4, 2-2), bring a fast, tough runner in senior tailback Jared Brock. Brock gained almost 1,300 yards a year ago in only eight games.

Abernathy's quarterback is Derrick Brown. Coach Bob Ferguson said that Brown anchored Abernathy's sprint relay last year, so he will be a threat when he keeps the ball.

Concerning last week's game, Ferguson said "Momentum is such a big thing. Our kids can play, but they're not going to break long runs like Mark Ford. We have to 'plod along' to make our yardage."

"Abernathy will spread you out and try to run around you," Ferguson added.

Two players were hurt at Lockney, Chris Carillo with a concussion, and Rudy Gonzales (shoulder). Neither one is expected to play, as Ferguson will probably allow some of his younger players see some action rather than get someone hurt worse.

Frye To Re-Up: Party Chairs Needed For 2004 Election

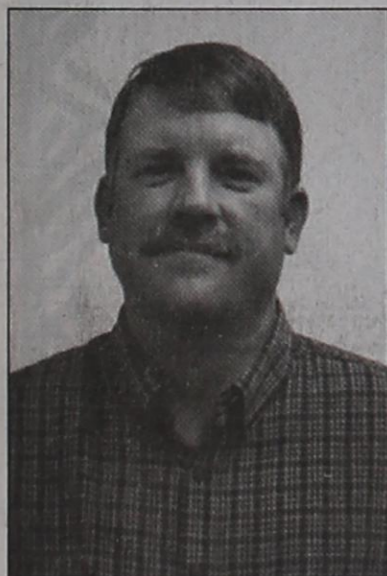
If you are interested in serving as county chairman for either the Republican or Democratic parties, County Clerk Colleen Stover would like to hear from you. At press time, neither party chairmanship was filled and the date of the upcoming primary election depends on party chairmen.

According to Mrs. Stover, the filing date for county commissioner election begins December 3, 2003. The primary election, which is usually held in March, may have to be delayed until as late as July, she said.

The election on November 4, 2004, will be a local and national election, including the office of President.

Precinct One County Commissioner Kirk Frye has announced his intention to run for re-election. Frye is serving his first term as county commissioner. Terms are for 4 years. Frye is an area farmer, married to Annette, and they have three children, Kandace, Miranda, and Kirby.

The filing fee for county commissioner has increased to \$700 unless a candidate is eligible to get on the ballot by petition. Information concerning applications for the county election can be obtained by contacting the County Clerk's office.

The Friona High School sophomore class is hosting a Chili Supper on Friday, November 7, before the Abernathy football game.

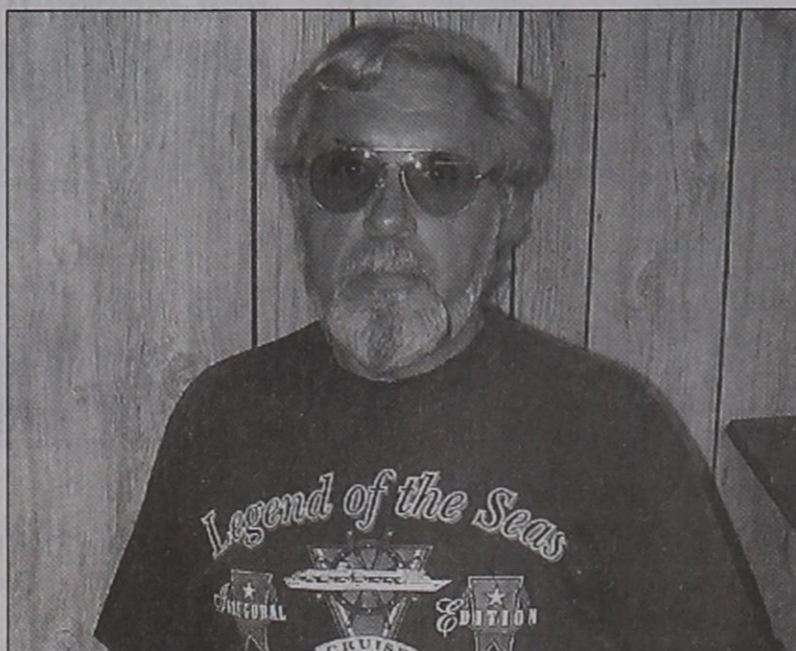
They will be serving from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. in the Friona High School Cafeteria.

Lt. Morris Case Delayed Again

Friona Police Lt. Jerry Morris will have to wait another month to find out if he is guilty or innocent. Morris has been on unpaid administrative leave pending assault charges filed by a Hereford couple. A Texas Ranger investigation resulted in misdemeanor charges being filed in County Court.

The court date was scheduled for Tuesday, November 4. A Monday trial ran over into Tuesday so his court appearance was changed to Wednesday, November 5. But that changed again when out-of-county prosecutor Roy Carper could not meet the Wednesday date and the judge was not going to be available Friday.

So County Judge Bonnie Clayton Heald set a new court date for Morris of December 5. Carper, from the Midland-Odessa area, was hired by County Attorney Charles Aycock to prosecute the case.

Jose's Balloon Goes To Horse Valley, Pa.

(Editor's Note: Friona elementary students released red balloons last Friday for Red Ribbon Week. The following account of one of the balloons was furnished by Wade Fowler, editor of the Perry County Times in Pennsylvania. The story and pictures were published in the Pennsylvania paper this week.)

A red helium-filled balloon carrying an important message from 8-year-old Jose Rivera had a busy weekend.

Sometime on Sunday the balloon touched down in Horse Valley, more than 1500 miles from its point of departure. "I choose to be drug free" read the message on a rolled slip of paper attached to the balloon with black yarn.

Jennifer Reynolds, Jose's third grade teacher, explained that the balloon release was the culmination of Red Ribbon Week, during which a lot of healthy living advice, including anti-drug information and tips on conflict resolution, was imparted to the 100 or so third graders at Friona Elementary School in the Texas Panhandle.

The balloon was released at 2:15 Central Time Friday, October 31 and had made it

all the way to Horse Valley on the Perry-Juniata County line by 11:30 a.m. Sunday, November 2. That's when Mel Wasylake found the balloon and the message it carried in a bog near his home while he was out searching for white-tailed deer signs in advance of hunting season.

When exactly the balloon touched down is open to conjecture, but it's clear it made record time as it raced north and east. Assuming it landed just minutes before Wasylake found it, the balloon would have averaged about 40 mph on its trip north.

"I didn't think it would make it that far. It's just great," said Rivera, the oldest of Alma and Juan Rivera's four children.

Jose counts soccer as his favorite sport and is the goalie for his school's team. And as for his pledge, Mel Wasylake will be holding Jose to it. "In these days when so much negative stuff is happening to children, it's nice to stumble onto something positive," said Wasylake, who refinishes furniture for a living.

"I choose to be drug free," he repeated, with some wonder in his voice, as he waggled his index finger. "That's good stuff."

College Entrance Exams Set Nov. 10

Amarillo College will be at Friona High School Monday, November 10 at 12:25 p.m., to administer the Accuplacer which is an acceptable assessment for the Texas Success Initiative. Seniors who are planning to attend a two-year or four-year public college in Texas are required to take an entrance exam.

In the past TASP was the preferred assessment. However, now the Accuplacer may be used for both initial testing and retesting parts of the TASP that have not been passed. Students who plan to become

teachers must contact the college they plan to attend to be sure the Accuplacer is acceptable for their program.

Accuplacer will be administered on the computers in the FHS computer lab. Testing fees are as follows: first time testing \$20.00; retest fees for reading \$5.00, math \$5.00, and writing \$12.00.

Since there are a limited number of computers in the lab, students are encouraged to sign up in Mrs. Gallman's office as soon as possible. Juniors may take the test, but priority will be given to seniors.

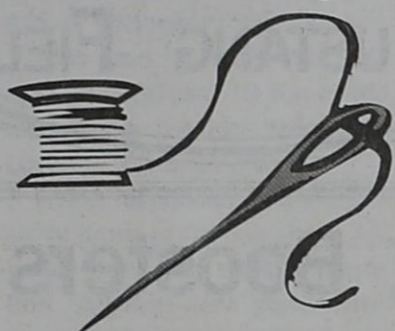
Hours for the Methodist Country Store will be 10:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The store will feature crafts, baked and canned goods,

Tickets will be available at the bazaar and the quilt will be given away at 1:30 p.m., November 15.

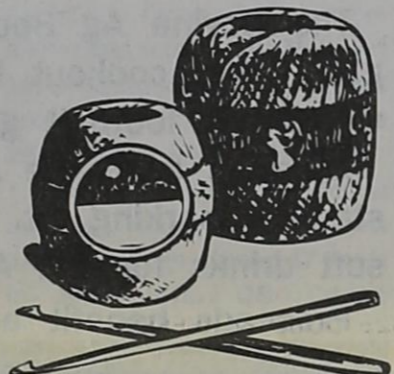

Alex is a 2003 graduate of Friona High School.

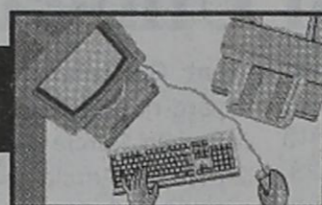
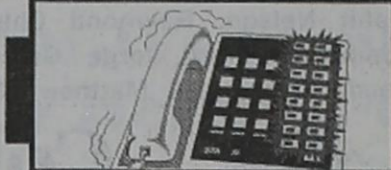

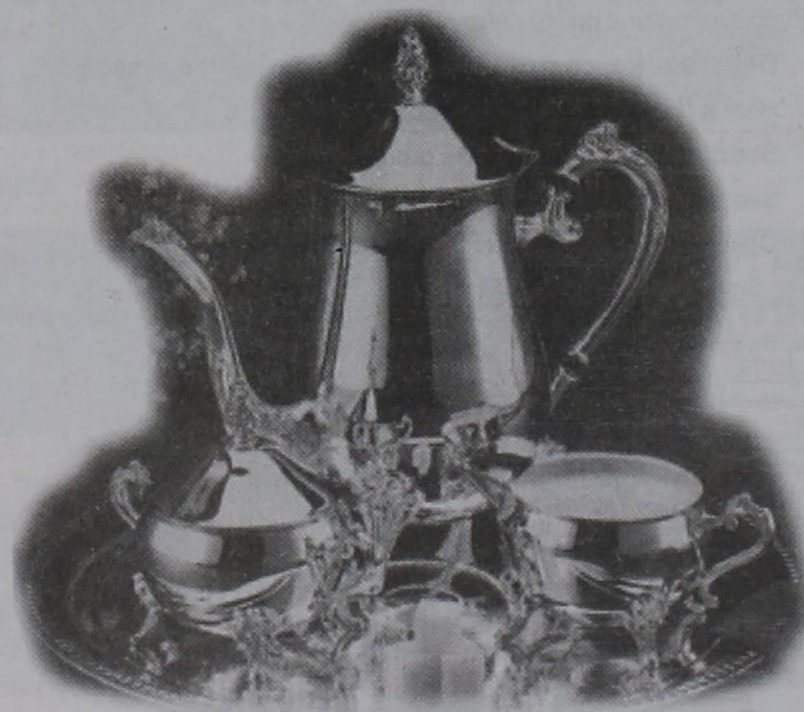

Colts Still Unbeaten

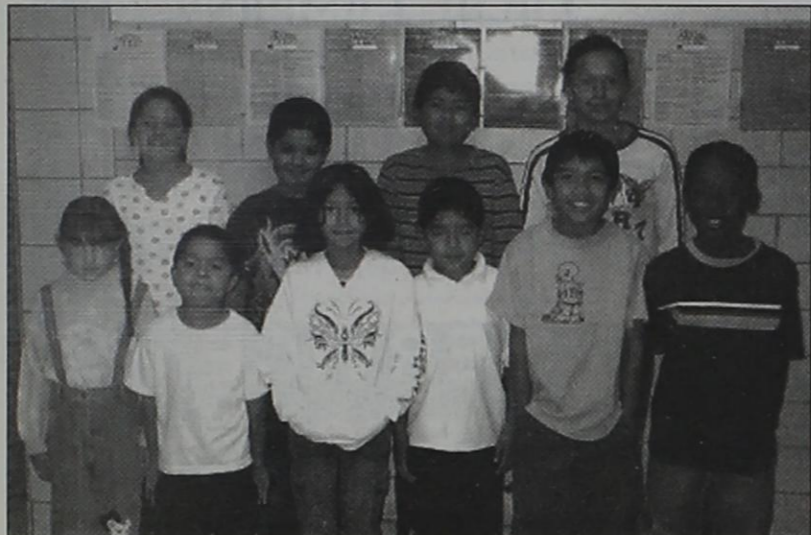


The Bovina 8th grade Colts continued their win streak by beating the Nazareth 8th grade 24-6 on October 23.





Lockney Crushes FHS; Keeps Playoffs Alive

The Lockney Longhorns crushed the Chieftains, 55-14 in Friona's last road game (and a late one), 55-14 last Friday night at Lockney.

It was Lockney's largest win margin over FHS in the 25 times the teams have met on the gridiron. And the senior 'Horns gained a bit of revenge for the 45-0 loss they suffered two years earlier to Friona at Lockney.

AND—for the second time in three weeks, no officials showed up for the game. Kickoff was delayed until about 10:15, and the game wasn't completed until after midnight.

The long delay didn't bother the Longhorns, especially running back Mark Ford, who rushed for 293 yards and scored four of Lockney's touchdowns.

Ford gave his team the early lead on a 68-yard TD run in the first period. The kick failed, but Lockney had a 6-0 lead.

Friona responded, and impressively drove to the Longhorn 13, before the drive stalled. Coach Bob Ferguson sent place-kicker Antonio Monreal into the game to attempt a field goal, but a high snap ruined the effort, as well as the Chiefs' attempt to get on the scoreboard.

A few minutes later, Friona held the 'Horns and forced a punt. Lockney's center had a bad snap, and Friona got the ball on the Longhorn 34 yard-line.

Brock Field hit David Davila for a 14-yard gain to the Lockney

20, and things again looked good for Friona.

But two plays later, Field was hit on a rollout play, fumbled and the Longhorns recovered. That was the last play of the first quarter.

Lockney took advantage of a short (20 yards) field, taking five plays to score. Ford again got the TD, on a six-yard run, as he kept his feet churning after being hit behind the goal-line. A run try for points was stopped, but the 'Horns had upped their lead to 12-0, 1:23 into the second quarter.

Three plays gained only six yards for the Chieftains, who had to punt.

Lockney handed the ball to Ford on third down, and the speedster not only got the first down, but ran it in from 36 yards out for the 'Horns' third score. LHS ran the PATs, to hike their lead to 20-0 with 7:27 left in the half.

Freddy Reyes ran eight yards after Sergio Saenz returned the kickoff to the 28. But Fields' pass on third down was ruled a lateral, and was covered by the Longhorns.

Three plays later, Ford raced 49 yards before being forced out at the Friona eight. Another three plays found the 175-pound junior crossing the goal-line, and Lockney had hiked its lead to 26-0 at 3:29 prior to halftime.

Friona was again three downs and out, and the Longhorns took advantage, driving 47 yards in six plays. QB Cagen

Cummings passed 15 yards to Kirk Wilson, Ford ran for two PATs, and Lockney enjoyed a 34-0 halftime lead.

Lockney had the ball to begin the second half. On their first series, Friona linebacker Ben Santiago caused a fumble, and recovered for Friona at the Lockney 28.

The Chieftains didn't squander the opportunity this time. QB Brock Field took the ball on an option play, turned upfield, and churned 28 yards for Friona's first touchdown. In spite of a high snap, Monreal was able to get his kick over the crossbar, and Friona was on the scoreboard, trailing 34-7 with 2:49 gone in the third.

Following the kickoff, Michael Rodriguez, Olton senior, didn't let Friona celebrate for long. The 210-pound running back crashed through the line and raced 72 yards for a touchdown. McCarter finally did the only thing Lockney hadn't done up 'till then, kicking a point, for a 41-7 score.

Field was shaken up on Friona's series, and Olton took advantage of a good punt return. Seven plays later, Rodriguez got his second TD, and a second PAT made the score 48-7.

Eugene Gonzales finished Lockney's scoring with a 46-yard run for a 55-7 lead.

The Chieftains showed some character, driving 77 yards to get on the scoreboard again. Saenz ran 19 yards to the Friona 45. Reyes gained 25 yards on a good, tough run to Lockney's 29.

Two plays later, Field hit Ruben Alvarado for a 16-yard gain, and then hit the 180-pound senior from seven yards out for the TD. Monreal's kick became 55-14 with a minute left to play.

"We played another solid game on both sides of the ball, with good special teams performances. Anytime you are able to hold the other team scoreless, it is always good," said Coach Rex Cumpton.

Friona led Lockney in first downs, 17-11, yards rushing, 264-158, yards passing, 37-33, and in total yardage, 301-191.

"Our offense is getting better and more productive each week, and a punt return for a score is a great bonus," Cumpton added.

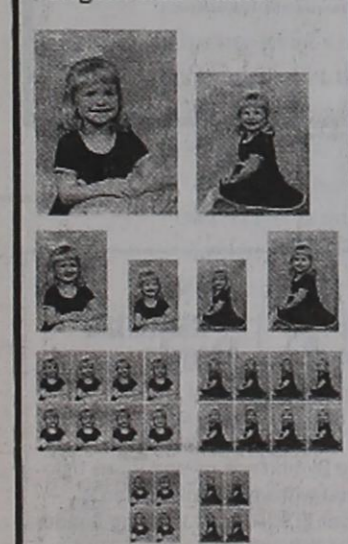

This reporter could remember only one other time when a game was delayed for that reason, in 41 years covering Friona football.

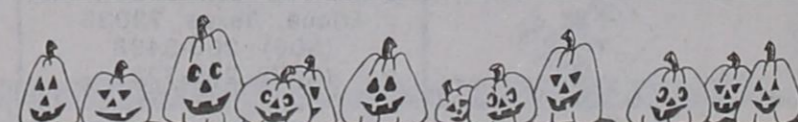
Then, last Friday, it was announced to the assembled crowd that the game at Lockney would be delayed, for the same reason—no officials scheduled.

other pictures.

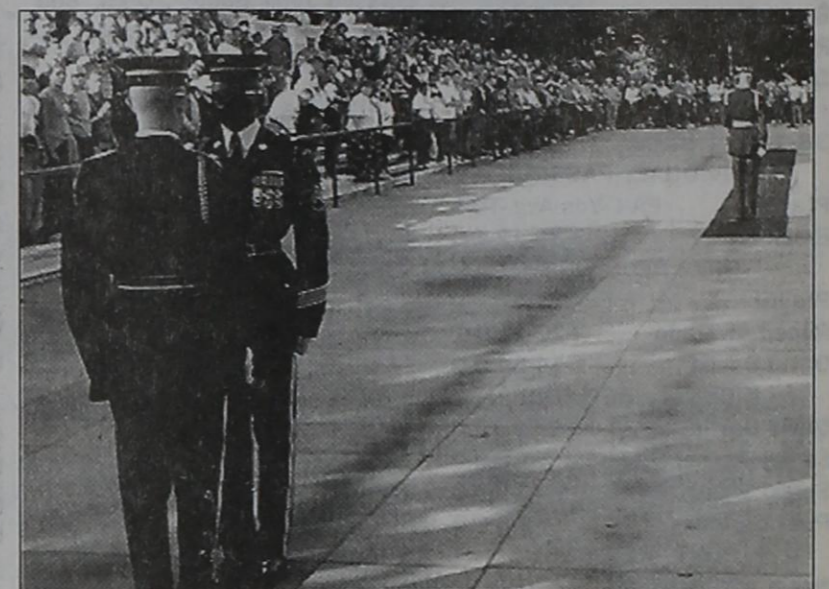

Lazbuddie Wins 1st Place

The 2003 Lazbuddie Robotics Team went to Lubbock for the area West Texas Boosting Engineering, Science and Technology (BEST) competition on Saturday, October 25, 2003. Twenty-five teams from 1A-5A junior high and high school teams participated.

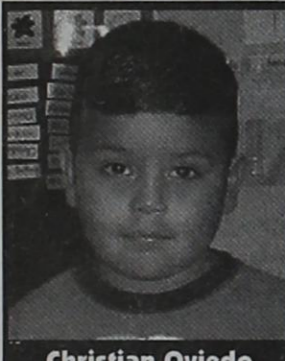
Lazbuddie won 1st place BEST Team and will be advancing to the state and national competition at Texas A&M University November 21 and 22.

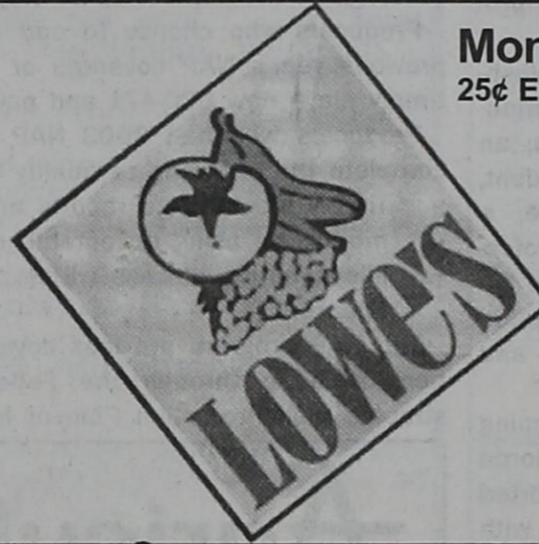
through mid March 2004, but early orders are recommended to ensure variety selection.

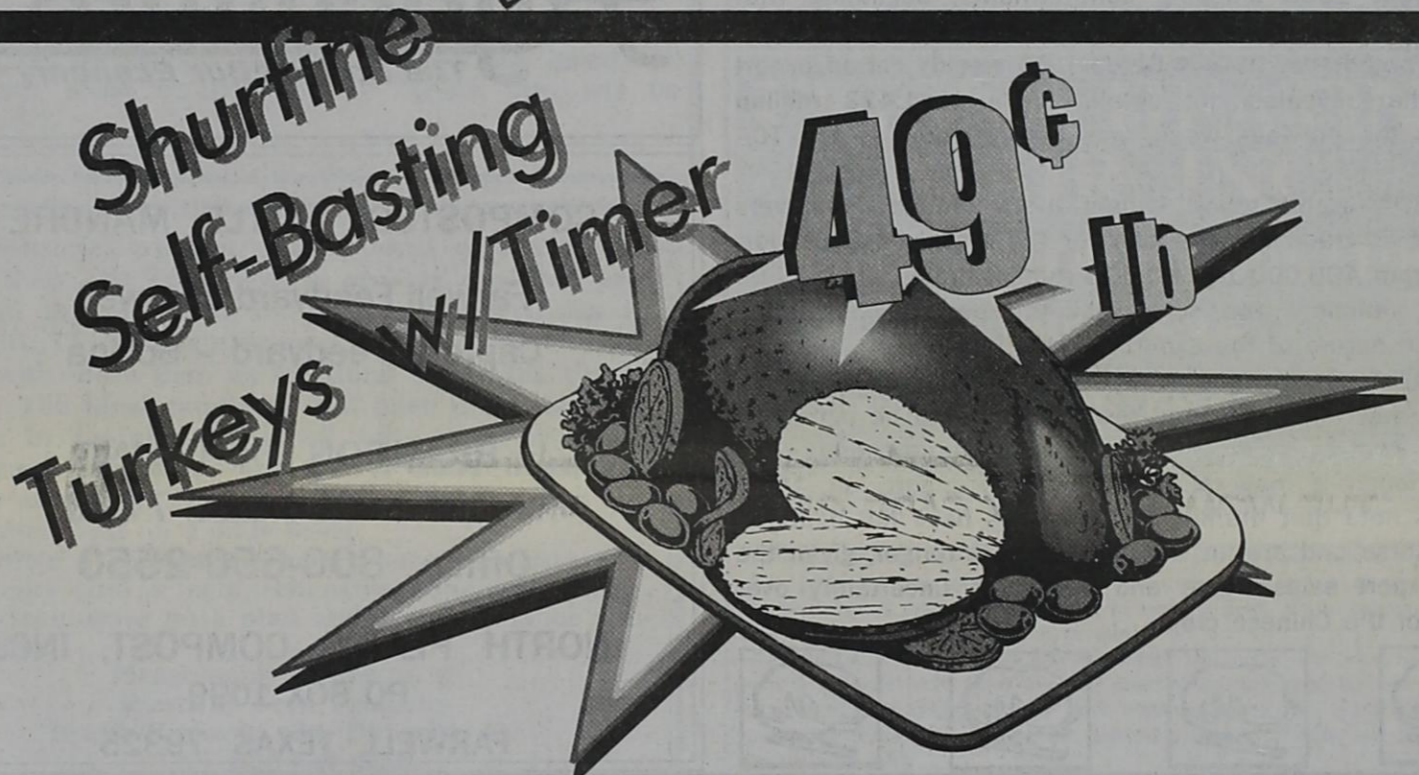

West Texas Flow Meeting Held October 30

LUBBOCK, October 31, 2003

By Shawn Wade

The Texas Cotton Association's 2003 West Texas Cotton Flow Marketing meeting provided High Plains cotton merchants, shippers and transportation suppliers an opportunity to get a better picture of the rapidly accelerating 2003 cotton marketing season.

One of the most anticipated parts of the meeting is the annual crop update, presented by Dr. Randy Boman, Texas Cooperative Extension Cotton Specialist for the High Plains. Dr. Boman reported that through the end of October roughly 10 percent of the area's estimated 2 million bale crop has moved through the Lubbock and Lamesa USDA Cotton Classing Offices.

Estimates of the area's overall harvest progress stand at roughly 25 percent as the combination of favorable harvest weather and improved cotton prices have encouraged producers to move forward with harvest operations.

Other presentations at the TCA meeting included a Washington Update from American Cotton Shippers Association, Executive Vice President and Chief Counsel, Neal Gillen; an ACSA Update from the organization's 2nd Vice President, John Mitchell, of Cargill Cotton, Cordova, Tennessee; a presentation from Texas Tech Agricultural Economics Professor, Dr. Sam Mohanty, entitled, "A Global Perspective on the Cotton Market"; and a panel discussion which included reports from the warehouse, railroad, steamship, truck and shipper segments.

Also released at the meeting was the 2003 shipping commitments report, by month, for West Texas/Oklahoma cotton. TCA Executive Vice President, Bob Poteet, reported that current 2003 shipping commitments, beginning with the month of November, totaled 688,831 bales.

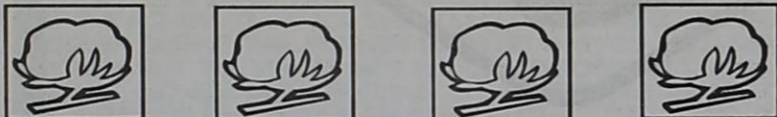
Poteet noted that USDA's October 30 weekly cotton export report, that revealed net upland sales of 1.428 million bales for the previous week, was not reflected in the TCA report.

The USDA export report caught many industry observers off guard as trade expectations for the weekly sales report ranged from 400,000 to 600,000 running bales.

Market reaction was somewhat unexpected considering the bullish nature of the export number.

Instead of pushing the recent upsurge in cotton futures prices to new highs, the end result appears to be a market correction that many in the trade have been expecting.

Even though it may take a few days to sort out, trade observers note that market fundamentals have not changed for the worse and are, in fact, somewhat stronger, given the recent export sales figure and continued uncertainty over the size of the Chinese crop.



2004 NAP Sign-up Deadlines Approaching

LUBBOCK, October 31, 2003

The Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) provides growers with much needed protection against crop losses that result from natural disasters on crops for which no federal crop insurance is offered.

Sign-up deadlines for some crops are rapidly approaching and producers are encouraged to complete their paperwork in a timely fashion to be eligible for NAP benefits in 2004. Contact the county Farm Service Agency Office for more information.

Producers who already have coverage on 2003 NAP crops may choose to continue coverage on the same crops in 2004 if the application service fee is paid by the application closing date. A new CCC-471, application for coverage, does not require a signature when applying for continuous coverage of the same crop or crops.

Producers who choose to add or delete a crop from the previous year's NAP coverage or change crop shares, must timely file a new CCC-471 and pay a service fee.

Producers who had 2003 NAP coverage are reminded to complete the following to qualify for benefits:

- Timely file acreage reports and keep track of harvested production using acceptable methods.
- File a notice of Loss within 15 days of when a loss is apparent.

The NAP program provides coverage similar to the protection available through the Federal Crop Insurance Catastrophic Risk Protection Plan of insurance.

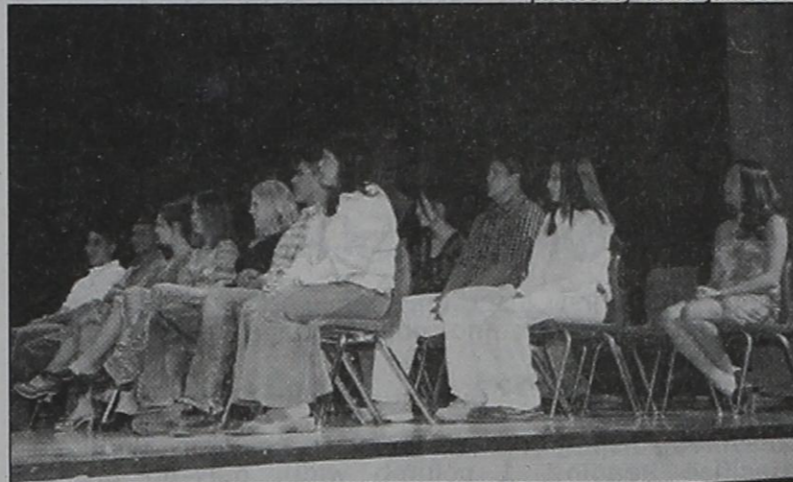

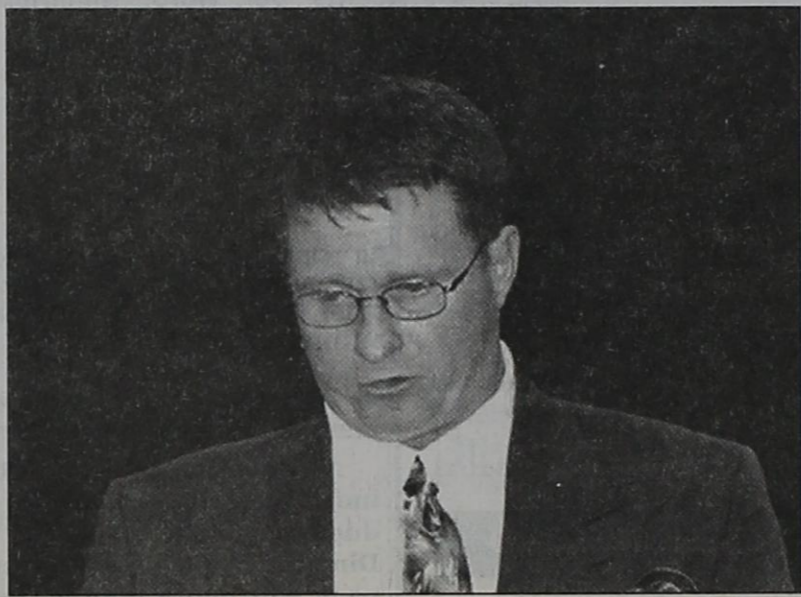

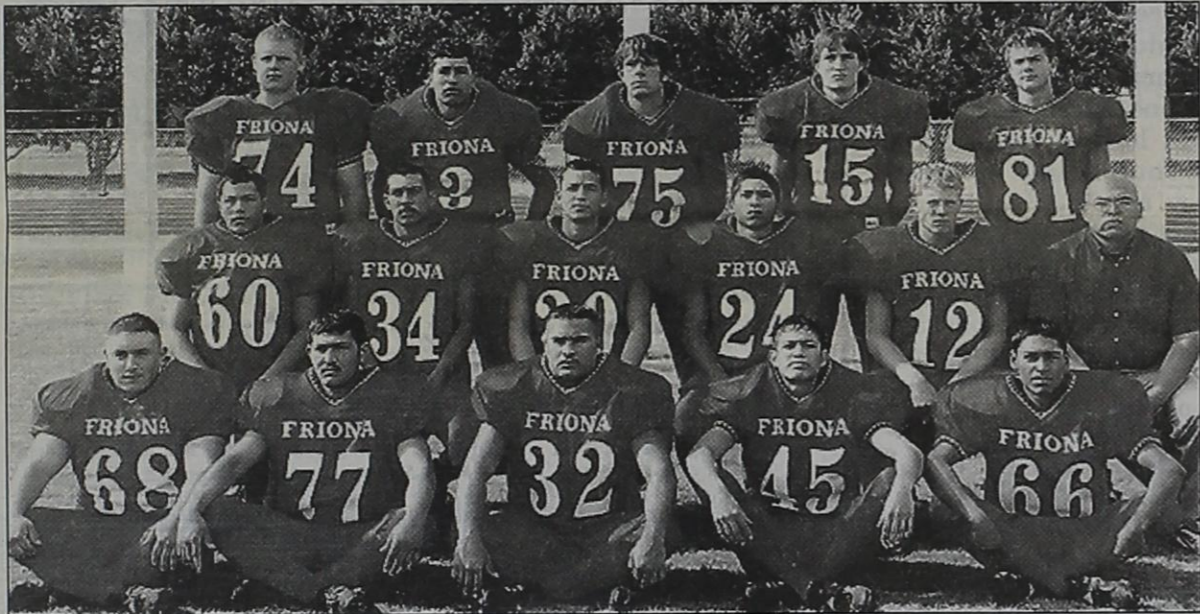

PEOPLE WITH ALL NEEDS APPRECIATE CONTACT LENSES

Growing numbers of people are getting contacts because of their safety and ease of use. In addition, a greater variety of individuals are able to use these vision aids. For example, bifocal contacts are allowing more baby-boomers and seniors to wear lenses.

In the past, some patients were not able to wear contacts for long periods of time, because they were uncomfortable or did not allow enough oxygen into the eye. Now these concerns are significantly reduced because of changes in the lens materials and processing. Only a small number of individuals cannot use contacts because of specific problems such as inflamed or infected eyes.

New Contact Wearers often complain of having dry eyes. Lenses are available that help reduce this problem. In addition, lubrication drops can be used to moisten the eyes. Most adverse reactions that occur with contacts can be quickly stopped if contact wear is ceased for short times. If lens users carefully follow instructions given by the eye-care practitioner, the risk of vision problems becomes extremely small.

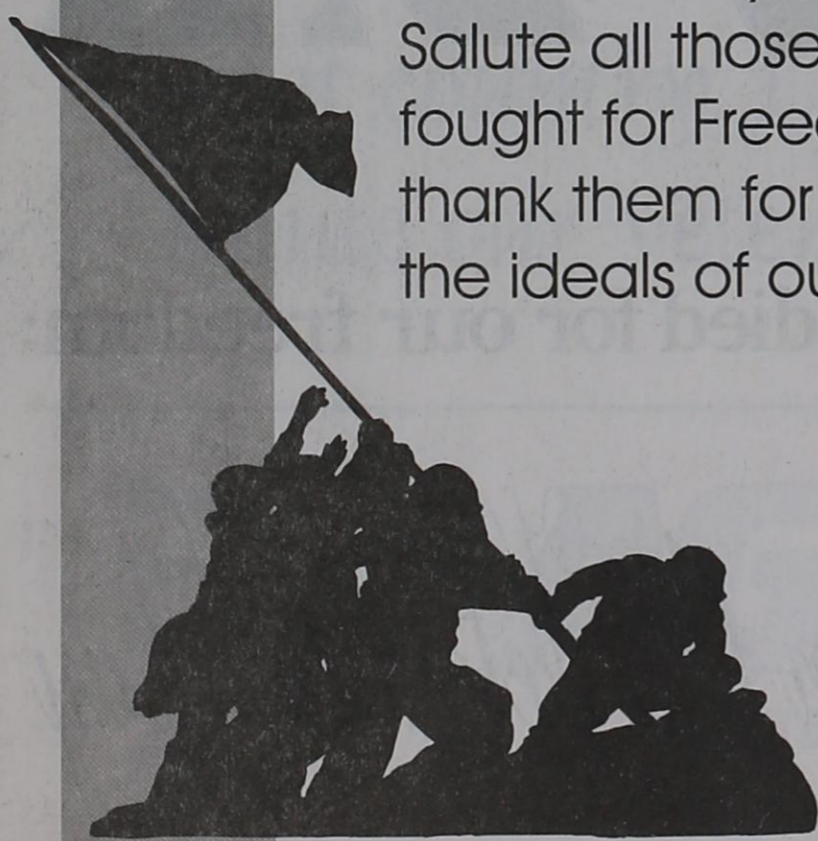

How Are We Doing?

Last week we made history here at the newspaper.

It wasn't anything you would have noticed, but it was a big day for us. Last week's newspaper layout was "pagnated" on computers and sent electronically to North Plains Printing in Hereford.

Many newspapers have been using the pagination process for years. We just now started. Prior to now, we used the "cut and wax" method, laying out the newspaper copy on grid sheets, waxing each story and picture and sticking it down, boxing up the copy, and driving it to the printing plant.

Then they had to shoot each page on a giant graphics camera, which then made a negative of the page, which was "burned" onto a metal plate, which then went on the press to run the papers.

Sounds like a tedious process but it was safe and secure and familiar. Letting go of old habits and routines is a scary thing. But I have some great people working for me here that have a much younger attitude and accept challenges more readily than I do.

So now with our Adobe Pagemaker software program, we lay out the pages in the computer, email them to North Plains Printing in Hereford by the end of the day on Wednesday, then go pick them up Thursday morning.

Now when we send the pages, the plant makes a negative directly from the computer, transfers it to the metal plate and it ends up on the press much

quicker. Not only that, the software process gives us cleaner and clearer copy and pictures. We hope you have noticed the difference.

We continue to work toward combining the Friona Star and Bovina Blade into one newspaper. Most of the readers that have talked to me about the changes so far have been positive. There have been a few gripes. Change doesn't come easy to some people.

Our goal is to publish one paper with news that covers Bovina, Friona, and Parmer County. Bovina and Friona have more ties than you might realize.

Many Bovina residents work here in Friona at such places as the hospital, school, or nursing home. Several Friona residents work in Bovina, or do business with the bank there. I would think Friona businesses would welcome customers from Bovina.

We all have something in common: we live in Parmer County. What happens in the county affects all of us sooner or later.

I am going out on a limb and guessing that no reader actually reads every single article or story in the paper, no matter who or what it is about. Before now, Bovina Blade readers got a paper each week that had 6 pages, maybe 8 in a good week. Four of those pages were also in the Friona paper.

Now you receive 14-16 pages with a wider coverage of places and events. To me that is a good thing.

Today's paper is the same paper for Friona and Bovina, from front page to back page. The only difference is the name at the top of the front page. Effective with the first issue of 2004, published on January 8, there will be only one paper, the Friona Star. At the end of 2003, the Bovina Blade will fade into history.

The price of the paper in the newsstand will be fifty cents. The annual subscription rate will be \$25 in county and \$30 out of county.

We will continue to cover news in Bovina and publish just as we are now and invite all citizens of Bovina, Friona, and Parmer County to submit your local news items to us. Just as you do now.

The reason for the changes are simple: economics. There are no longer enough advertisers to support a separate Bovina newspaper. It is easier, faster, and more efficient for our newspaper staff to produce a single newspaper covering the area.

Most of all, our loyal advertisers will benefit from wider coverage (over 2000 circulation). There will be no need to decide whether to advertise in Friona or Bovina or both. We will be adjusting our ad rates too but regular advertisers will not see a significant increase.

The staff here, Marlene, Sherry, Dana, Nathan, and I, appreciate your support and welcome your input.

We made history last week but we are not through yet. We hope you will stick around for it all.

earned a Bachelor of Science in Agronomy and worked as a crop consultant in Kansas before moving to Friona.

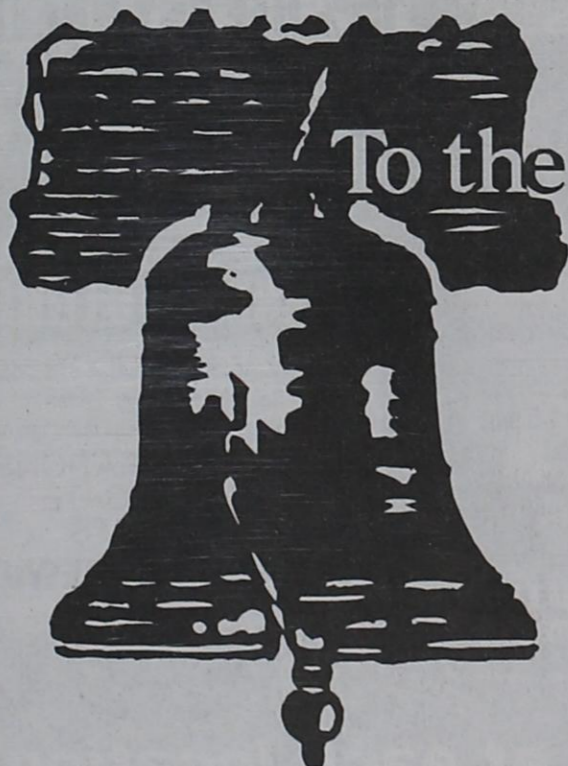
He is married to Collette and they have three children, Keegan, Kristin, and Curtis. They attend St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina.

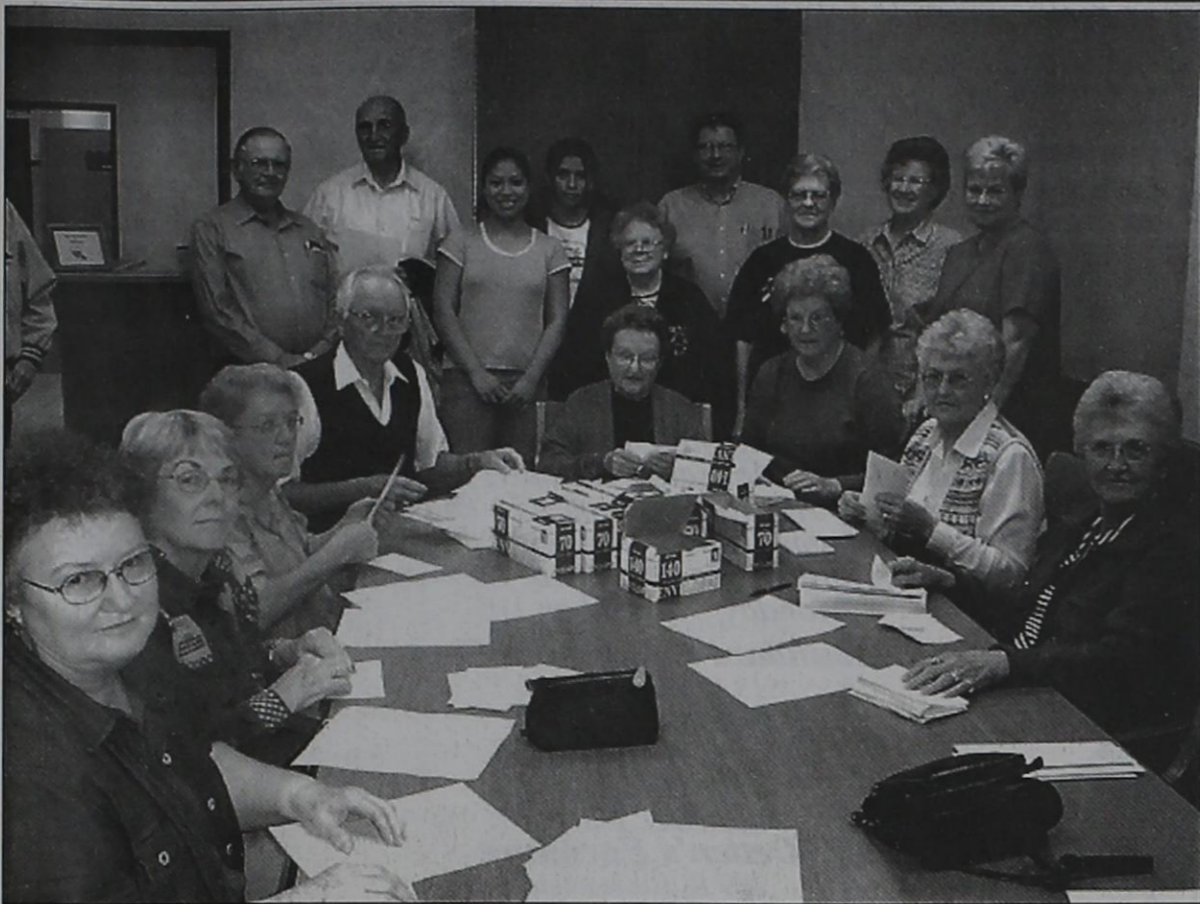

By mask-faced men with cadenced step.

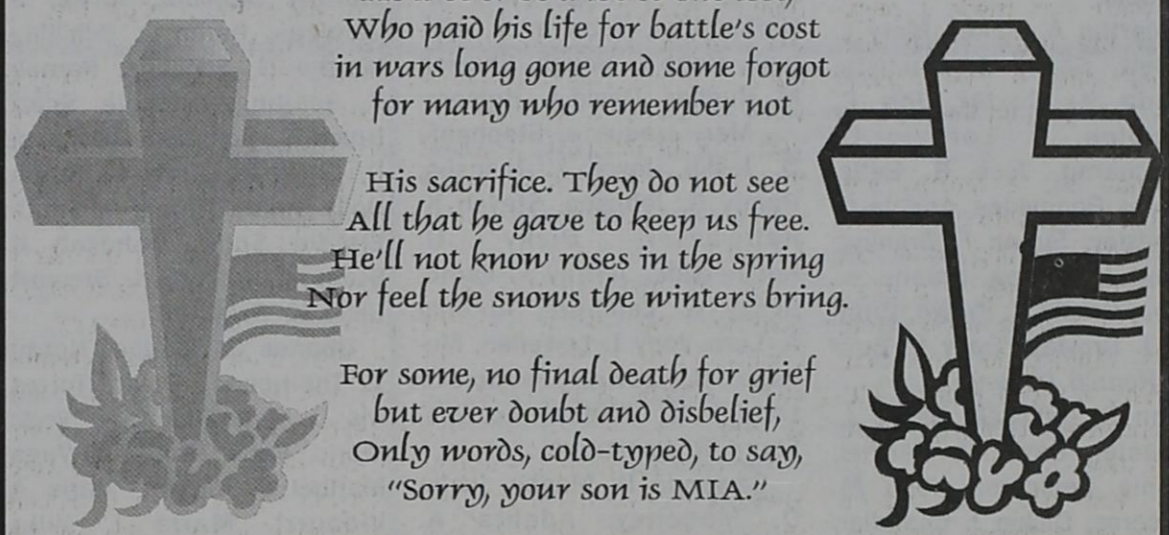
How many tears of grief are shed
