Wind Damage Preventable

Ninety per cent of the damage to buildings caused by wind is preventable, reports Capper's Far-

Studies by insurance companies show that only a small portion of total wind damage results from storms such as tornadoes, says the nationally-circulated farm magazine.

The large part of wind damage is due to poor construction, lack of maintenance or carelessness.

Poor building construction causes the biggest single losses insurance companies sustain. One in: portant item is the need for sufficient and well-designed interior bracing. Since a dwelling is divided into rooms it offers considerable more space for interior bracing. This explains why farm dwellings are only one third as subject to damage by wind as farm utility buildings.

The walls of a barn are called upon to keep out the weather; hold up the roof; support additional floor; resist interior and exterior pressure. A vertical wall without interior bracing will do all of these except resist pressure. But there is more than a ton of weight just from the air alone on every square foot of a barn. This weight neutralizes itself when the air is still. However, it throws all kinds of strain on the barn when the air

Foundations should extend below the frost line and go all the way around buildings. Anchor nolts should not be more than 8 feet apart and should be well embedded in the concrete and securely fastened to the structure above. Portable buildings should be securely anchored with wire fastened to firmly embedded posts, Shingles should have a solid foundation and be fastened down so securely the wind can't get underneath to r'p them off.

Altho carelessness accounts for the majority of smaller losses, caused by falling dead trees or limbs, broken storms windows and doors, poor maintenance of buildings account for most of the medium-sized losses. Without minimum care, nothing will deteriorate faster than a farm building. Usually it isn't the loss of the older building that causes the grief, it is the damage they inflict on newer buildings when they take off in the breeze







Americans Still Like Rural Life Statisticians Say

NEW YORK, N. Y .- American are still predominately a small own and rural people despite the rapid growth in city population, statisticians have pointed out from study of populations trends hown by the 1950 Census.

Three fifths of the American people live in places with fewer than 25,000 residents, the statisticians said. Less than one quarter of the people live in cities with populations as large as 250,000. In fact, 25 states have no cities as large as 250,000 ,and 13 have no ities above 100,000. In general, the South has the

argest population of people livin small towns and rural areas, while the Northeast has he lowest percent in such places.

In only seven states - Mass-nchusetts, Rhode Island, Connectcut, New York, New Jersey, Ilinois, and California-do the mojority of people live in cities arger than 20,000. On the other hand, in states such as Mississippi, South Carolina, and North Dakota, the percentage of rural population runs as high as 70 percent. New York is the most urbanized state, with 59 per cen of its residents in cities of 250, 000 or over.

The movement of the popula tion into cities has ben steadily growing over the last 50 years the statisticians pointed out. In 1900, thdee fourths of the popu ation lived in places under 25, 00, and well over half the population lived in rural areas. A that time, 37 states did not have a single city with as many a 250,00 residents, and 11 state ad no cities larger than 25,000.

"The preference of many fam for life in small towns and countryside is also evidence the rapid expansion of subur oan areas," the statisticians add



By taking the above precautions you will establish a preliminary date showing the time when your original idea was concieved. After that you can continue with your work, perfect your idea, and after the same is perfected, make appli-cation for a patent, if you feel that you have a patentable idea.

One should not just make a preliminary sketch and put it away and think that is sufficient to protect his rights. That is just on additional bit of evidence to help him establish his right to the patent. The patent should be sought as soon as one possibly can after conceiving his patentable idea and working out details of the same


