





When sugar is dark and burnt in appearance, remove from heat, and at edge of pan slowly stir in ½ cup boiling water. Return burnt sugar to heat and boil gently, about 5 minutes, until thickened. Gool.



Older People In **Model Town** Find Rest, Peace

About 50 member of the older generation have achieved the incolony at Millville, N. J. Opened 15 years ago this month, Roosevelt Park Colony for the Aged provides them with homes of their own. The story of this unusual residential "city within a city" is told in the current issue of PEOPLE TO-DAY in an interesting article called "Old Folks' Town."

The idea came to Mrs. Effie Morrison, a county welfare worker, when she saw old age Assistance clients forced into meaner quarters or institutions-or into relatives' home. One client, an old lady who built herself a 3-room home on meager funds, seemed to have a happy solution, Mrs. Morrison went into action, convinced the city of Millville to donate the land and the W.P.A. to provide funds for building 14 homes and a community house. Rent: \$6-\$10 a month.

The rest of the 33-homes were puilt by people who occupy them. They received tax-free plots of land, pay only expenses and maintain the property. A \$5,000 limit of building costs prevented too great disparity in appearance of the homes. When an owner dies, the house reverts to the commu

Gardeners Must Fight Insects

Get ready to fight insects if ou expect to grow a garden, warns Capper's Farmer.

The right insecticide, proper ming applications and thorotreatnent of plants are the key parts says Gordon T. Mickle, Colorado entomologist, in the nationallycirculated farm magazine. Much better control is obtained when insecticides are used against younger stages the first appearance of insects. This early application not only protects plants but also prevents the pests from multiplying. It's necessary to get complete coverage because many bugs and worms feed on the lower parts of plants or on the undersides of leaves.

DDT and related insecticides leave a deposit on the plant that lasts for several days. Such poisonous residue is objectionable on such vegtables as lettuce, spin ach and others used for greens. Use rotenone, pyrethrum or cryolite on these plants.

The aphid is one of the mos ommon pests. It attacks cabbage, eucumbers, potatoes, melons, pea and many other garden plants. For control, use 2 tablespoons of 40 per cent nicotine sulfate mixed with 1 pound of hydrated lime and applied as a dust. If you prefer a

spray, mix I tablespoon of the

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
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
