Crops Depleting By United Press

Another hot, sultry day is in store for Texans today with more 100-plus temperatures and still no relief in sight. Yesterday's tem peratures ranged from the high of 105 at Presidio to Galveston's 87 Overnight, it was no cooler than Marfa's 62 and ranged upwards to 77 degrees at Dallas, Palacio and Presidio

Residents of the Lubbock area were blessed with a thundershower which dumped 1.13 inches of rain Dalhart, in the Panhandle, had eight hundreths of the only other noisture recorded in the state. Weathermen say the outlook for

today and tomorrow is for clear to partly clouddy weather and continued hot. The forecast says West Texans can expect some widely scattered afternoon and evening thundershowers.

In Austin, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that hot, open weather combined with steady winds and growing crops is rapidly depleting moisture reserves ov er most of Texas. The USDA says rain will be needed soon in all areas to maintain progress, particularly for feed crops. The report said crops and fast-

ures made rapid development last week, and in the northwest, cotton and sorghum planting was pushed toward completion. The department says the oat harvest is in full swing and yeilds are "very good." However, the wheat harvest is dragging on the high plains where combine crews are waiting for the crop to ripe






