Wrong Is Wrighted?

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 2 (UP) — The wrong at Welm and Wivy streets has been "wrighted." Following complaints of residents, the street signs have been changed to read W. Elm and W. Ivy.

DE-CONTROL MAY MEAN HIGHER FOOD BILLS

WASHINGTON, July 2 (UP)—Housewives were put on notice Wednesday that their food bills probably will go up soon and push the cost of living an all-time high.

Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall made the prediction, and blamed the new controls law. He said the cost of living may not increase drastically as a result of the act but that it will rise enough so that "every American family will feel it."

He gave his estimate after President Truman said the new law provides "very limited protection" against inflation.

Mr. Truman warned that it will permit rent hikes in many cities after Sept. 30 and clear the way for increases in prices of milk, vegetables, fruits, fertilizers and some other goods and services.

Make UP 20 Per Cent
Arnall, relieved to find he had any real price control authority left at all, said the law "is not as strong as we had hoped for but it could have been very much weaker than it is."

He based his cost-of-living prediction mainly on the act's exemption from price controls of all fruits and vegetables. They make up 20 per cent of the aver-

age family food costs and seven per cent of the average family budget.

This removed ceilings from processed fruits and vegetables. Although some of these are selling below those ceiling, price officials estimated that 65 per cent are selling at ceiling levels at retail and therefore can be expected to rise.

'Authority Was Deterrent'

Fresh fruits and vegetables—except potatoes for a brief time—were not under ceilings and now are supposed to be in a seasonal price decline. But, Arnall said, the authority to place ceilings on them under the old act was a "deterrent against unreasonable price increases."

Price officials started Wednesday to decide what "borderline" items should be decontrolled as processed fruits and vegetables. They said they don't think coffee would come in this class but were uncertain about such things as baby food, chili, pork and beans, and raisin bread.

They said milk and cigarette ceilings will go up in some areas because the new act bans ceilings below price levels established by state minimum price laws. They could not yet estimate the extent of such increases.

Oil Output Up For Week

TIJLSA, July 1—Crude oil production showed an increase of 4,650 barrels over the previous week, the Oil and Gas Journal reported Wednesday.

Daily average output for the week ended June 28 was 6,164,325 barrels.

The greatest gain was in Michigan, up to 5,000 barrels, while Wyoming's production was up 4,000 barrels.

The largest loss was in Illinois, where production dipped 3,400 barrels, and Oklahoma and Louisiana fell off 2,100 and 950 barrels, respectively.

Texas remained unchanged at 2,699,500 barrels, while Colorado increased 1,100 barrels to 81,500 and New Mexico climbed only 100 to 165,100 barrels.

"Winnie" Wins Confidence In Korean Conduct

LONDON, July 2 (UP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill won a confidence vote on the Allied conduct of the Korean war Tuesday night after warning that further criticism might lead to election of an isolationist president in the U. S.

The House of Commons backed up Churchill by defeating a Labor party motion of censure, 300 to 270. Liberal party members joined up with Churchill's own Conservatives in the crucial vote.

Churchill outmaneuvered his Labor party critics by deflecting their attacks on his government's part in the conduct of the Korean war onto the U. S., then playing on Europe's fears America may return to isolationism.

He warned Laborites against trying to find fault with Americans on every occasion, particularly in a presidential election year.

"There might come a time, especially during a presidential el-

ection, when a very sharp reaction or emotion, even in anger, might sweep large sections of the American people, and any candidate for the presidency who gave full vent to it would gain a considerable advantage," he said.

Churchill said the U. S. should have consulted Britain in advance of last week's raid on a Korean power plant on the Manchurian border, but agreed that it was a legitimate military target.
