Polio Warfare Continues On 4th At Houston

HOUSTON, July 5 (UP)-Houston families by the scores for-sook the Fourth of July holiday to continue volunteering their children for test shots of a serum doctors hope will prevent paralysis and death from poliomyelitis.

Dr. William McDowell Hammon, the University of Pittsburgh polio specialist who is directing the first mass test of the serum, gamma globulin, said Saturday he was delighted" at the number of children who appeared Friday.

By injecting half of an eventual 5,000 children with gamma globuin and the remaining 17,500 with harmless gelatin, physicians will be able to tell if the serum works.

Many Houston parents, meanwhile, were reported buying the gamma globulin injection from private physicians, at a cost ranging from \$6 to \$40, depending on the trength of the innoculation.

Tremendous response by par ents in volunteering their children for the mass test at Houston, where the nation's worst polio epidemic has been raging, will make it possible to complete the experiment in less than the 10 days set aside for it, Hammond said.

He said he expected the eight Houston and Harris county clinics administering the innoculations will begin turning away children at Moorcroft and 96 at Farmingby next week




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NEW TORQUE CONVERTER FOR CHRYSLER



In rotations of legumes and cotton, the legumes have a benefic effect on the row crops which follow. Growers' experience shows the hairy vetch increased cotton yields by as much as 129 pounds of lint ; acre. Hubam sweetclover increased yields by 150 pounds of cotton p acre, while Madrid sweetclover increased yields by 100 pounds per ac when the clover was planted in September and plowed under in t spring ahead of cotton planting.

When corn is included in the rotation, alfalfa has a beneficial fect on the corn yield bringing maximum results in corn production the area in which it is grown.
