There is Stassen, Warren, MacArthur and others. All good men.

If in the end it could be Ike vs Taft, Ike will get all the votes but about six. Unaltered by subsequent mendments and jeal-ously guarded by our courts, these priviliges must still be respected

Thus, that fundamental philoophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the roverned," has been carried forward into the highest law of our


