Coast Guard Ship To Furnish Radio Relay Base

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UP)—The State Department announced Saturday that the Coast Guard cutter Courier is enroute to the Mediterranean to act as the first

floating relay base for Voice of America programs to Russia and her satellites. The specially equipped 5,800 ton ship represents the latest phase in this country's attempt to blast through the Iron Curtain with a "campaign of truth." It is hoped that the ship's mobility and its powerful transmitters will pose a problem for Russian jamming of American propaganda broadcasts.

New clothes, new boats, guns, fishing, hunting and camping equipment—maybe a new car. They dream of happy hours, rest and complete comfort. They picture themselves on the sea shore or camped by a quiet brook, in the green valley at the foot of towering, rugged mountains.

The very idea that they are not at home help them some, and when they think of "all rest and no work" they begin floating in the clouds. They think of the "paid vacation"—drawing money for soaking up all the pleasure in the

world, and all free for nothing. The kids will kick up their heels and play, the young people will swim and skate, middle-agers will dine and dance, and old codgers like the writer, will simply grunt and growl. But other than the last group mentioned they will swear they are having the time of their lives, even if they have blisters on both heels, a splitting headache, and are so sick that hospital attendants would not let them check in—just send them on to the undertaker.

Yes this is "vacation time" American style. And during this season we are supposed to cut loose from the balance of the world and just be ourselves. We should act just as we wish to act, even if it makes everybody hate us and call us a fool.

We like to picture ourselves as being important—we enjoy squandering the bosses' time making a monkey of ourselves. We have met vacationists with pleasing personalities, who panned themselves off as diplomats or even royalty. A hundred or two miles from home, where they were unknown, they were the "cat's whiskers." At home they peddled prunes at the corner grocery and the credit rating was less than zero. They would tell of their wealth, when they knew very

well that they had overdrawn their bank account in order to make the vacation possible. Many of them take their last pay check to finance a trip to the mountains, while their home grocery, cleaner and druggists are forced to carry their over due accounts until they return and replenish the overdrawn bank account.

Vacations, properly spent, are good, but most of them are no more than wild orgies, and the vacationer is more dead than alive when he finally gets home. Should you spend your vacation with friends and relatives you will likely eat too much, go too much and go without thought of rest. You will expose yourself to the elements, though at home you are careful and guard your health.

We remember one of our vacations a few years ago. We had a two-week paid vacation, and we planned to do some first class resting, a little fishing and catch upon our reading. We left Fort Worth on the appointed day, filled with thrills and fondest expectations. Our health was good

and we felt like a million dollars. Only it happened to be raining that day, though a little rain didn't dampen our spirits.

Away we went, in a very happy go-lucky fashion. We planned to drive a couple of hundred miles and spend the night with our brother. We drove the 200 miles alright, but our brother was not at home. We had planned to slip in on him. This knocked out the visit and also the fishing trip to the Colorado river. We were about as happy as a starved alley cat, and as disgusted as the fellow who has just learned that his wife had run off with another man.

We spent the night alone, and took a day-light start on the second leg of our trip next day.

We developed car trouble next day—probably needed a couple of spark plugs, but after it passed through the "automobile clinic" we discovered we needed to jack the radiator cap up and then run a new car under it. We paid that ploughhand nearly 50 bucks for his diagnosis, but later discovered that all he did was rub a little

ACP Practics Help Keep The Soil In Shape

Sick and hungry land cannot meet the production challenge of the future any more than sick and hungry people can develop and maintain a strong and prosperous county, say E. E. Blackwell, chairman of the Eastland County PMA Committee. In fact, he points out, the two go together, sick and hungry land means sick and hungry people and the purpose of the Agricultural Conservation Program is to help farmers in the never-ending effort to keep their land strong and productive.

Under the 1953 program, he explains, PMA community committees will make farm-by-farm contacts to help each farmer check his farm field by field to see what needs to be done to cure its ills and improve the land wherever possible. The most urgently needed conservation will be given first attention.

Calling attention of how the ACP helps farmers, Mr. Blackwell says that the symptoms of illness of land may differ on different farms but there are some general signs that can be checked on most farms. One of these is the signs of erosion. Gullies are easily seen and most people are aware of trouble when land is being cut up with these small canyons. Even more serious is the less spectacular sheet erosion which almost unnoticed gradually removes the top soil.

Erosion in general is usually the result of a breakdown of soil structure loss of organic matter. The soil becomes more and more compact, less water soaks in, and cracks appear when the surface dries out. While the symptoms vary with different types of soil, they are indications that the land is in failing health.

The chairman points out that grass and legumes in permanent pasture or in rotation is usually the remedy. When lime and phosphate are needed to make the grass and legumes grow better, these materials play an important part on the soil improving process. Construction of terraces, contour farming and other devices play a part in holding the soil in place. All are emphasized in practices for which assistance is available under the Agricultural Conservation Program.

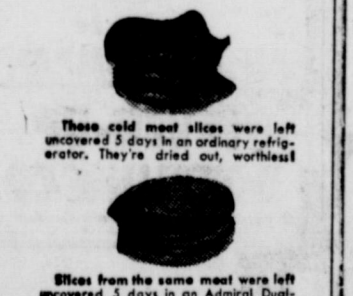
Chiang Kai-Shek Blames Russia

TAIPEH, Formosa, July 19 (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek Saturday placed the responsibility for the disintegration and fall of his Nationalist regime on the Chinese mainland squarely on Soviet Russia.

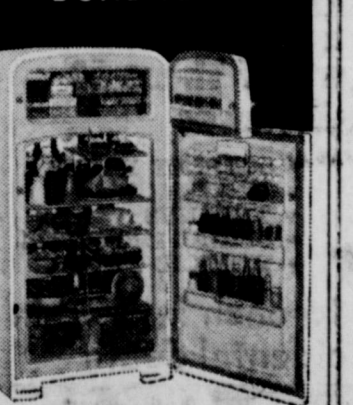
Chiang said in an interview that the Soviet Union has a "master plan for the conquest of the world by creating discontent, class struggle, contradictions and subversive activities."

"Let any country relax its vigilance against communism and it will soon find itself threatened by Communist plots inspired by the Kremlin," he said.

The exiled leader of the Kuomintang government said he still was confident he would be able to "deliver" his 450 million countrymen from Communist domination. But he admitted that the longer the Reds were in power on the mainland of China the more difficult it would be to unseat them.

Swedish Ship Makes Rescue

NEW YORK, July 19 (UP)—Fire swept the Norwegian freighter Black Gull in the Atlantic ocean off Long Island Saturday but 45 out of 49 passengers and crewmen were plucked from chill waters by the Swedish mercy ship Gripsholm.

The Gripsholm effected one of the speediest and most efficient

rescue operations in maritime history.

Four persons were missing and presumed dead—either drowned or consumed by the orange flames that swept through the ship's highly inflammable cargo of castor oil and naphthalene.

"It was a ghastly sight," said Eric Sjolm, chief officer of the Gripsholm by ship-to-shore telephone.

"If we had gotten there a few minutes later it is doubtful if they could have been saved."

DEAR VOTER:

I take this opportunity to answer a vicious, scandalous and false newspaper article calculated to injure and defame my personal character and integrity. This attack is a last minute attempt to mislead and prejudice the people of Eastland County in order to obtain the office of District Judge by a distortion of the truth.

THE FACTS ARE THESE:

The Commissioners Court of Eastland County made a contract with Horace Walker to collect delinquent taxes, which contract was approved by the Attorney General and Comptroller of the State of Texas. I, as an attorney at law, was employed by Mr. Walker to examine abstracts of title in connection with this contract; I performed those duties. I had no authority whatsoever over the tax monies collected, or the prosecution of tax suits, nor have I done anything in connection with this tax matter, which seems to have been made a political football, which has not been in the least dishonorable.



In connection with the cases against Mr. Walker, I will say this: If Mr. Walker is guilty he should be punished to the fullest extent of the law. I have had no part or parcel in these cases, except that I have been subpoenaed as a witness for the State of Texas.

With reference to the property in Limestone County: My opponent evidently is unaware that it is quite customary and usual for real estate men and Attorneys to purchase and handle property for their clients, and this was done by me in several instances. There is absolutely nothing wrong in that.

It strikes me as very strange indeed that inasmuch as investigations have been going on for several years that I have not heretofore been attacked until this late hour in a political campaign with the imputation of a wrongful act.

I have made several campaigns and in no campaign has anything unfair, derogatory or un-Christian-like ever appeared against any of my opponents. I have always contended that a man who is unclear in politics will probably be unclear, unfair and unjust in public office.

It is regrettable that any person who is a candidate for such an honorable position as that of District Judge would countenance any article such as has just appeared by letter and in the press of Eastland County, and would conduct a campaign for such a high office on such a low political plane.

Six Crewmen Missing On Burning Ship

NEW YORK, July 19 (UP)—Nine passengers and 42 crewmen abandoned the burning Norwegian freighter Black Gull 65 miles off Montauk, L. I., without lifeboats Saturday and the outward bound Swedish American liner Gripsholm changed its course to pick up 45 survivors.

The U. S. Coast Guard said the remaining six had not been accounted for.

Survivors were transferred to the Coast Guard cutter Mackinac for return to New York for treatment of exposure.

As soon as the transfer was accomplished, the Gripsholm resumed its journey to Goeteborg, Sweden.

Air-sea rescue planes, three other Coast Guard cutters and the American export liner Excalibur searched the calm waters of the Atlantic about 65 miles off Montauk Point, extreme eastern tip

Rayburn Slated To Be Nominated Chairman Demos

CHICAGO, July 19—Gov. John Murray of Oklahoma said Saturday he will nominate Speaker Sam Rayburn as permanent chairman of the Democratic national committee next Tuesday.

Although Oklahoma's 24-vote delegation is pledged to support Sen. Robert S. Kerr as its favorite on for president, Rayburn is being boomed as the party's nominee by Sen. Mike Monroney, the state's junior senator.

Murray emphasized that he is nominating Rayburn only as permanent chairman and not as the party's choice for President.

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The governor planned to fly to St. Louis Saturday to meet the Oklahoma delegation mid-way on its trip here aboard a special train. He will join the party at a "Oklahoma Night" baseball game between the St. Louis Cardinals and Boston Braves.

Murray came here with William C. Doenges of Tulsa, national committeeman from Oklahoma, four days earlier than expected because of dissatisfaction with the state's share of available convention tickets.

He said he has been successful in obtaining additional tickets so party campaign contributors and others who are not delegates from Oklahoma can attend the convention.

"I have found a few additional tickets," the governor said, "but I'm still working for more."

Loyalists Say FDR, Jr. Will Aid In Battle

CHICAGO, July 19—Maury Maverick, leader of the "Loyalists" Democrats from Texas, said Saturday that Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., promised help in getting his delegation seated in next week's national convention.

But Maverick denied negotiating with the late president's son on a "deal" to give Texas 58 convention votes to presidential candidate Averell Harriman if his "Loyalist" delegation is seated.

Maverick's faction and the "regular" Texas anti-administration delegation headed by Gov. Allan Shivers are contesting here for convention seats. Young Roosevelt is Harriman's campaign manager.

"We made no deal," said Maverick. "It was nothing but an attempt to get our side some help in getting seated."

Will Roosevelt help? "Yes, he can help us. He's a smart young fellow," Maverick said.

Shivers and National Committeeman Wright Morrow were standing firm behind Sen. Richard B. Russell as their presidential choice. They said the Georgia senator is the "strongest" candidate the party can offer.

Shivers conferred Friday night with Sen. Estes Kefauver the presidential contender from Tennessee. This raised speculation that Kefauver might get some "second choice" Texas support if Shivers' delegation wins control of the state's 58 convention votes.

Red Assault Forces UN Troops Back

SEOUL, Korea, July 19 (UP)—Artillery supported Communist infantrymen, hurling hand grenades and directing small arms fire into stubborn American defenders, succeeded in regaining a hill position west of Chorwon Saturday.

But the hard-won ground cost the Reds an estimated 100 men killed and 150 wounded.

A battalion of Reds, beaten back three times in the past 24 hours, took the hill after a seven-hour battle that had raged for two days.

The Chinese soldiers originally were thrown back after a five-hour fight Friday. Both sides poured tank fire into the battle, and one American tank turned a Russian-built T-34 into a charred ruin.

An Eighth Army announcement reported that 2,783 Communists were killed, wounded or captured in ground action during the week ended July 14. The total included an estimated 1,588 enemy dead.



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Thirty-six minutes later the captain radioed he had ordered passengers and crew to abandon the flaming ship. Four to six leaped from the poop deck.

It was reported that the Black Gull was carrying a cargo of 500 tons of naphthalene, a highly-flammable coal tar product used to manufacture explosives.

Fire spread so rapidly that flames burned the Black Gull's life boats before they could be lowered, the captain reported.

The Coast Guard said darkness hampered rescue efforts. Only the searchlights aboard the cutter and the flames from the doomed Black Gull penetrated the darkness.

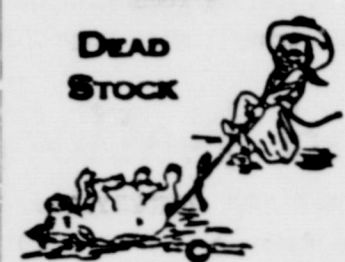
