With Mack

At this moment rain clouds are hovering in this area, and only for the fact that it is so actual, we would predict rain. As it is, we don't know what to do. We have just about arrived at the conclusion that 1952 is another drought year. If this is true there may not be any relief at any time soon.

Water at the city is getting rather low, and while the wells we drilled recently are aiding some, they are not sufficient to furnish Eastland with an adequate water supply. We have learned to do without a number of luxuries in our life, but are not sure how we can get along without a little water. There are many substitutes for drinking water, so far as drinking is concerned, but who wants to bathe in buttermilk or beer. Also we had much rather drink coffee than wash our feet in it.

And since thinking it over we note that most all water substitutes contain about 99 per cent water. We could drink beer, and by so doing we would be using Milwaukee water instead of the Eastland brand, and we suppose that would help some. If we should go the buttermilk route we would not save any water, because the cow that gave the buttermilk drinks three gallons of water for each gallon of buttermilk she gives. And you can readily see this is bad arithmetic. We could use pure water ourselves and still save, for we don't drink as much as a cow, even though some people try to compare us to a walking silo.

We gave our garden back to the Indians three months ago, but the City Commission comes along and promises to throw us in jail if they ever hear of us watering that rose bush again. As the little "hoose-gow" down at the city hall has no south front, and is not air conditioned, we have no intention of spending any of these hot days and nights down there, even if we never see another rose.

They will let a fellow use his bath water for irrigation purposes, after he has bathed in it for a week, but that won't help our rose bush for we quit bathing just about the time we gave our garden to the Indians. On top of all that we would not use bath water on a rose bush, if we expect the bush to live and thrive. The next thing we know they will be asking us to strain our dishwasher and use it for making coffee. When they do this we are going to get a passport for the Fiji Islands, and live on coconut milk.

Yes sir, things are getting serious. One thing about it, though, it is not far to Cisco, and we have a good highway. And while Cisco isn't suffering from floods, they do have a little water. And with a prescription from the right doctor, they would probably let you have a quart every few days.

The only thing that cheers us is the fact that we are not nearly dead. If we have stood the drought this long, we'll likely pull through. Maybe some of these days, after our new lake is completed, and it rains enough to fill it, we will look back and smile as we think of the period when water was rationed.

In the meantime just take up a notch in your belt and whistle LaPaloma.

"CITIZENSHIP PLANS" UP BUREAU CHIEF STANDS PAT ON O'DWYER RELEASE

MEXICO CITY, July 30 (UP)—Robert Prescott, United Press bureau chief here, said Wednesday he would stand on his dispatch Tuesday quoting friends of U. S. Ambassador William O'Dwyer as dropping hints that he had considered becoming a Mexican citizen when he retires from diplomatic service.

Prescott said his dispatch accurately reflected information he had obtained from members of the American Legion who had talked with the ambassador, despite an angry denial issues by the former New York mayor.

O'Dwyer, his face flushed and his voice loud and angry, denounced Prescott before assembled American reporters on an embassy veranda Tuesday.

"I say to you that you are a lying bastard," he shouted, pointing at the United Press correspondent.

"That's pretty strong," Prescott said.

"I'm calling you what you are in the English language," the ambassador retorted, shaking with anger.

Prescott said he could produce the notes of his original telephone talk with O'Dwyer.

"I don't care what your notes say," O'Dwyer yelled, pounding the table until coffee cups rattled.

"I have three witnesses who were with me at the time who will testify that the statement as regards my citizenship is a lie."

"Now get out," the ambassador shouted.

Questioned later by other reporters, Prescott reviewed his talk with O'Dwyer and then said:

"Not only am I legitimate, but I am the fifth legitimate child in my family."

The ambassador, target of numerous political attacks since his controversial appointment in 1950, had made his first comment on his future plans at a recent American Legion meeting.

Legionnaires said he told them privately his ideas were "somewhat nebulous" but he was giving "plenty of thought" to a decision whether to return to New York and resume his law practice or remain in his "adopted country."

Continued Heat Of 100 Degrees Day's Forecast

Heat waves continued to simmer over the parched lands of the Southwest with no let-up in sight Wednesday.

Temperatures shot over 100 Tuesday in Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri and Kansas. New Mexico reported a high of 98 at Carlsbad and Colorado had 92-degree weather. Only Wyoming was comparatively cool. Lander reported the high in Wyoming with 85-degrees.

The eastern slope of the Rocky mountains continued to suffer from a drought. In Oklahoma and Kansas, grains and corn crops were suffering.

In Texas, weather bureau forecasters said dry conditions in the western part of the state may cause local dust storms if wind velocity picks up.

A low-powered cold front poked into West Texas and Western Oklahoma Tuesday, got stalled by the heat and began a slow retreat to the northwest.

Highest temperature recorded in the Southwest was a 106-degree mark posted at Presidio.

Marks of 100 were recorded all through Texas and Oklahoma. With no rain in sight, Tulsa, Okla., banned car washing and lawn sprinkling from 5 to 9 p.m. daily.

Texas and Oklahoma went without a drop of reported rainfall but Colorado and New Mexico had light showers Tuesday. The rain was not enough to halt the drought.

Wednesday, weather bureau meteorologists were forecasting more of the same type weather—partly cloudy and warm throughout the Southwest.

Some heavy clouds in the states of New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado may keep temperatures partially in check, but it will continue dry through the area.

Additional CIO Steelworkers In Wage Agreements

WASHINGTON, July 30 (UP)—Reynolds Metal Co., and the CIO Steelworkers reached agreement Tuesday on a new wage contract for 10,000 employees at eight company factories.

The agreement is closely in line with that granted by other aluminum producers and also with the recent steel wage settlement. It provides for a flat 15-cent hourly wage hike, retroactive in some cases to last April 15, and other "fringe" benefits bringing the total to 21.4 cents an hour.

The big three of the aluminum industry—Aluminum Co. of America, Kaiser and Reynolds—have applied to the Office of Price Stabilization for a 10 to 12.5 per cent increase in the price of fabricated aluminum to offset the wage increases.

Independent aluminum fabricators warned OPS Tuesday that they also would have to have a price increase if the ceiling price of primary aluminum is raised.

The Reynolds agreement affects workers in plants at Troutdale, Ore., Phoenix, Ariz., Corpus Christi, Tex., La Grange and MeCook, Ill., and Bauxite, Jones Mill and Hurricane Creek, Ala.

Nurses Warned Of Certificate Deadline Date

AUSTIN, July 30 (UP)—Vocational nurses were warned Wednesday the deadline for seeking a license without examination has been set at Sept. 6.

The 52nd legislature set the deadline, the state board of vocational nurse examiners said.

To be eligible for license as a vocational nurse without taking an examination, an applicant must have practiced vocational nursing during the entire year prior to Sept. 7, 1951, according to the board.

After Sept. 6 of this year, applicants must complete a 12-month training course in a board approved school and pass a state board examination to obtain a license.

Dairy Keeping General Grow Found Guilty

FORT MEADE, Md., July 30 (UP)—Maj. Gen. Robert W. Grow, former U. S. military attaché in Moscow, Wednesday faced an official reprimand and a pension from command for six months for letting his "war now" diary fall into Communist hands.

A high-ranking military court martial Tuesday found Grow guilty of two offenses improperly re-recording classified military information in private records and failing to safeguard properly classified military information.

The court martial's sentence, however, will be subject to review by the commanding general of the Second Army, the judge advocate general and the court of military appeals before it becomes final.

The court martial, which conducted the five-day trial in the strictest secrecy, acquitted Grow on a third charge which was described by Army officers as "more serious" and involved classified information that could not be made public.

Grow's diary was allegedly stolen and photographed by Communist agents while the 57-year-old general was in Frankfurt, Germany on official business.

Communist propagandists had exploited militant passages in the diary to support their "war-mongering" charges against the United States. Radio Moscow also claimed that the diary proved that Grow was a "spy" engaging in "subversive activities" within Russia.

Scientists Seek Proof Of Ideas

WASHINGTON, July 30 (UP)—The Air Force offered Wednesday a combination of summer heat waves and optical and radar illusions as a plausible explanation of the latest flurry of "flying saucers."

Intelligence officers ridiculed the notion that the mysterious objects in the sky hail from other planets or Russia—or pose a menace to the United States.

They were confident that new scientific investigations with powerful telescopes and special cameras would explain away the objects as "physical phenomena" such as mirages. And maybe, cure the nation of sauceritis.

As for three flocks of objects sighted by radar over Washington in the past 70 days, Maj. Gen. John A. Samford, Air Force director of intelligence, told a news conference late Tuesday that "my own mind is satisfied" they resulted from temperature inversion.

Science Can Explain

This was explained in detail later by two electronics experts from the air technical intelligence center, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio. They are Dr. B. L. Griffing and Capt. Roy James.

Air temperature, they pointed out, decreases when a warm air mass passes over a relatively cooler one, temperature temporarily increases and an "inversion layer" of warm air is formed.

This inversion will cause radar beams to bend earthward. Radar impulses then bounce off ground "targets." What then appears as unidentified "blips" or tiny white lights on radarscopes are not objects in the sky but objects on the ground.

Maybe Street or Car Lights
With a large inversion, street or automobile lights may be similarly reflected, as if in formation, on clouds. And if there is sufficient wind velocity or turbulence, these lights will appear to dance or "dog fight."

The Air Force is going to concentrate on some precise means of measurement of the eerie objects.

One device to be used is a special camera that will photograph the objects and break into its constituents the light they give off. These basic colors then can be compared with colors cast by known objects—say a neon sign or an airport approach light—so the source of "flying saucer" light can be determined.

Another device is the Schmidt telescope, with which vast portions of the sky and what goes on there during the night can be recorded. Consideration is being given to locating these around the country.

Ike And Other Top Republicans Plan Party Play

DENVER, July 30 (UP)— Dwight D. Eisenhower and other top-level Republicans will hold a series of meetings here over the weekend to lay the groundwork for a militant and "hard-hitting" campaign, Eisenhower's headquarters announced Wednesday.

One of those scheduled to attend the conference is Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, R-Ill., who placed Sen. Robert A. Taft's name in nomination for the presidency at the Republican national convention early this month. Taft lost the nomination to Eisenhower on the first ballot.

Dirksen, who charged in a bitter convention speech that the forces supporting Eisenhower were the same ones that were behind Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York in 1944 and 1948, was invited to come here as chairman of the Republican senatorial campaign committee.

Warm Welcome Ready
But it was evident around the Eisenhower headquarters that the occasion would be used to impress upon Dirksen that he and all others who supported Taft for the

Farouk May Be Planning U. S. Visit In Exile

ISLE OF CAPRI, Italy, July 30 (UP)—Exiled King Farouk was reported Wednesday to be planning to take his wife and their six-month-old son—Egypt's new King Ahmed Fuad II—to the United States within one to three weeks.

Farouk, forced off his throne by a military coup last Saturday after a 16-year reign, spent his first night as an exile on foreign soil Tuesday night with his family in a 25-room, 14-bathroom suite in the swank Eden Paradiso hotel at Anacapri.

But he was understood to have told Italian government officials and his personal friend, Italian travel agent Pier Bussetti, that he planned to stay at Capri only one to three weeks before leaving for America.

Reports that he planned to leave shortly were strengthened by the fact that he brought with him to the hotel only 73 of the more than 200 pieces of luggage which were unloaded Tuesday night from the royal yacht Mahroussa.

The rest were taken to his personal yacht, the 130-ton Fakhri El Bihar, or stored at Naples, Italian port for America-bound ocean liners.

Farouk himself was silent on his future plans. He stayed aloof from newspapermen and issued no authorized statement about his intentions.

The royal suite occupies the whole third floor of the Eden Paradiso. Accompanying Farouk, his wife and their infant son were eight male escort bodyguards and two governesses.

Farouk stepped ashore from the Mahroussa at Naples Tuesday after a farewell by the yacht's crew that brought tears to his eyes. Many sailors knelt as he walked past them. Some reached for his hand and kissed it. As he strode down the gangplank, there were three mighty shouts from the crew:

"Long live Farouk, king of Egypt and the Sudan."
The 32-year-old ex-king turned and gestured. His jaws clenched as he fought to control his emotions.

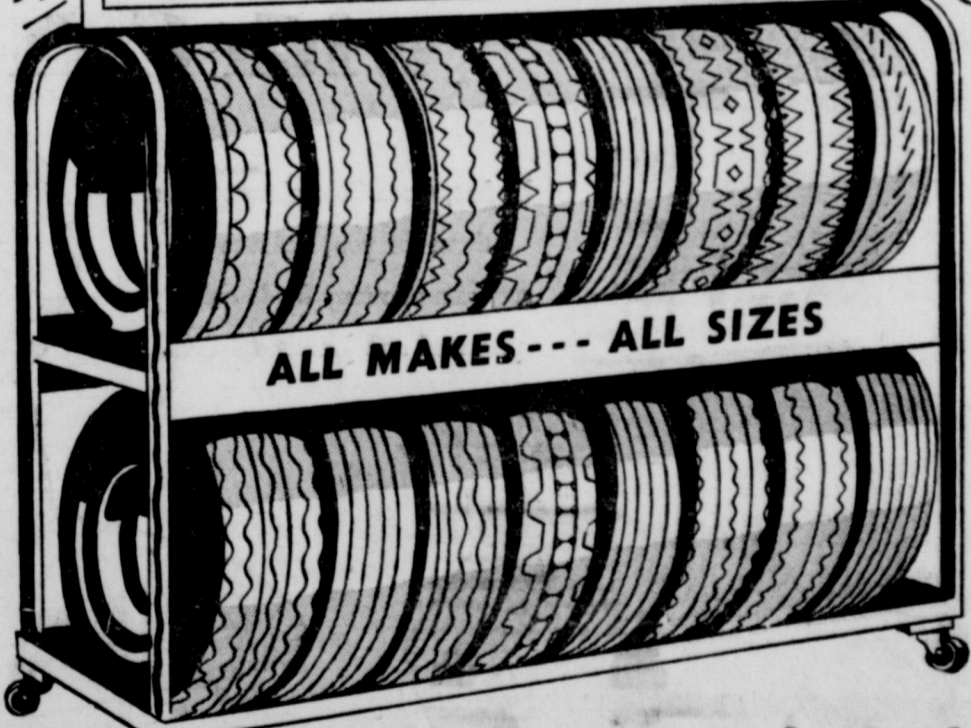

Vision Is Big Factor In High Accident Rates

CHICAGO — Obscured vision was a factor in one out of every eight fatal automobile accidents last year, according to the National Safety Council.

"Accident Facts," the Council's statistical yearbook, which is just off the press, shows that nearly half of the visual obstructions were rain, snow or sleet on the windshield. A fourth of the obstructions were trees, buildings and other things along the highway or adjacent to it. The remaining fourth resulted from parked and moving cars.

Glare from headlights or the sun was reported infrequently. Out of 20 states reporting interference with vision, 11 reported no drivers blinded by headlights—and these 11 states had more than 9,000 drivers who were involved in fatal accidents.

Jittery Quake Told No New Danger Exists

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., July 30 (UP)—Scientists assured jittery citizens Wednesday there was no real danger of another major earthquake in Southern California, but police said people were reaching "the end of their ropes."

Repeated after-shocks from a previous shake have frightened some people into evacuating their homes and sleeping in the open, police said.

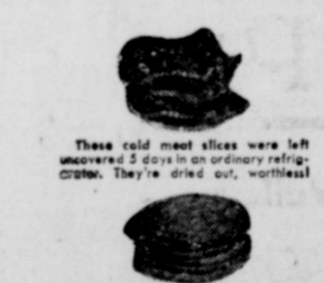
Three tremors, all after-shocks from the "killer" quake that claimed 13 lives on July 21, rocked and jerked Southern California beginning shortly after midnight Tuesday.

Other Tremors Recorded
Scientists said other tremors too small to be felt were recorded on their seismograph instruments.

peated their earlier statement that there was no more danger of a strong quake during the series of after-shocks than at any other time.

Two Bakersfield residents suffered heart attacks and were treated by fire department resuscitation squads, and all four wings of the Kern county hospital were ordered evacuated. The 250 patients in the hospital were moved to Bakersfield high school.

Railroad Has a 'Quitter'
The Southern Pacific railroad even reported that one of its local employes "upped and left" town because of the series of tremors.

After the initial jolt Tuesday, many residents evacuated their homes and slept on lawns or in parks.

Damage was confined almost entirely to Bakersfield.

The hardest of the new tremors sent seismograph needles to 6.5 on a scale of 10, equal to the strength of the 1933 quake in Long Beach, Calif., that caused 120 deaths. The July 21 quake had an intensity of 7.5 on the 10-point scale.

Dr. Beno Gutenberg of Caltech said the shake apparently came from more shifting in the Pear Mountain fault, which caused the Tehachapi quake.

The shock started two fires here, one of which destroyed a home. The walls of some buildings cracked.

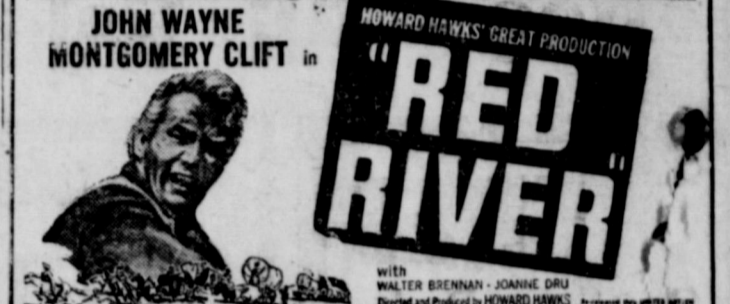
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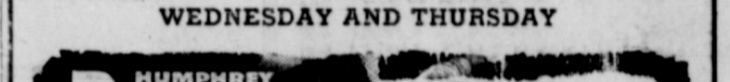

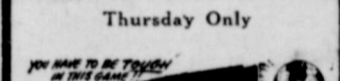
