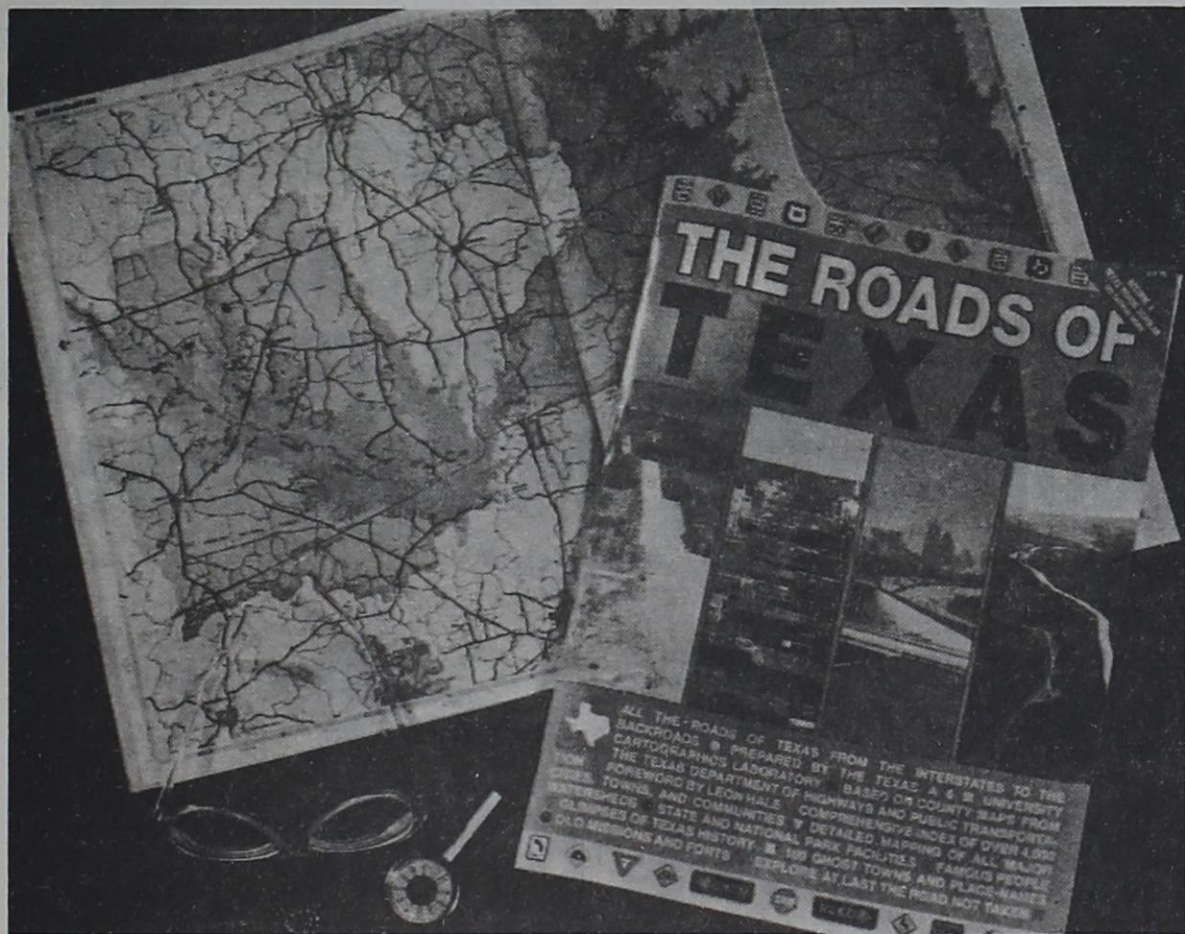
### Sheriff's Report

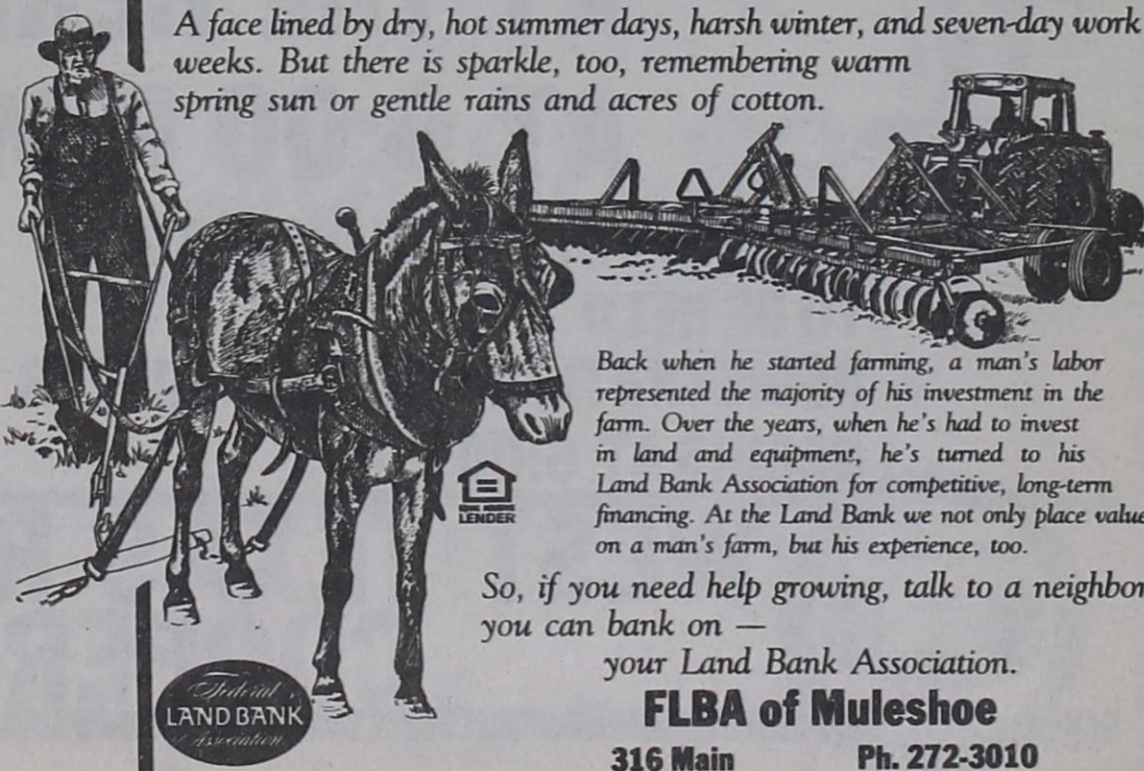

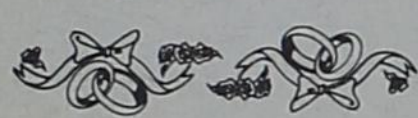

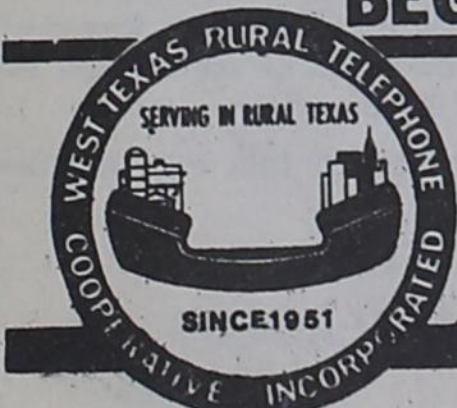

## Mustang Tracksters Win Friona Meet

Bovina High School track team captured the team title in the JV division of Friona's Chieftain Relays last Saturday, scoring 128 points.

Bovina won the title over second-place Canyon, which had 109½ points.

Going into the final event of the day, the 1600-meter relay, Bovina was clinging to a 108-107½ lead over Canyon in the team standings.

But the relay foursome (Hector Guevara, Manuel Porras, Izzy Marrufo and Robert Guevara) raced to a first-place finish in the event in the time of 4:42.0, and Canyon finished a distant sixth in the race.

Bovina's sprint relay team, composed of Marrufo, Corey Kirkpatrick, Guevara and Kory Mitchell, also won their event with a time of 45.9.

Robert Guevara also posted a

win for BHS in the 200-meter dash with a time of 23.7, just off the school record of 23.0 set by Stuart McMeans in 1970.

Kirkpatrick also won the 400-meter dash with a time of 55.5, for Bovina's other first-place finish.

Manuel Porras placed second in the 100-meter dash with a time of 12.1, Hector Guevara was second in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles at 44.7, and Marrufo was second in the 200-meter dash with a 24.2 clocking.

Otherwise, Hugo Renteria was third in the 100-meters with a 12.3 time; placed fourth in the 400-meter dash at 55.14, and seventh in the 200-meter dash at 23.3.

Kory Mitchell placed fifth in the 100-meter dash with a 12.34 effort, and Andy Stormes was sixth in the intermediate hurdles at 47.1.

Genaro Ruvalcaba placed fifth in the 800-meter run with a clocking of 2:19.9.

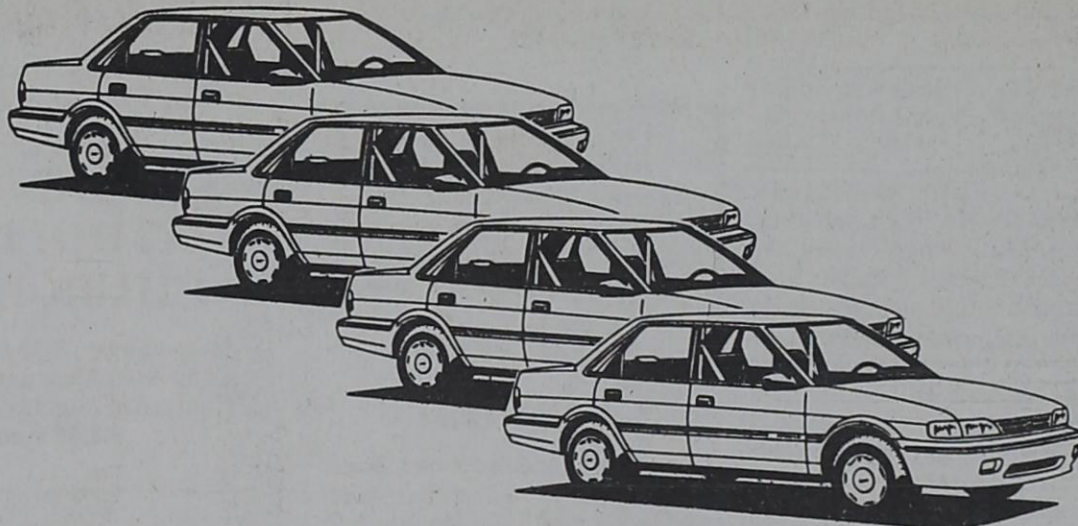

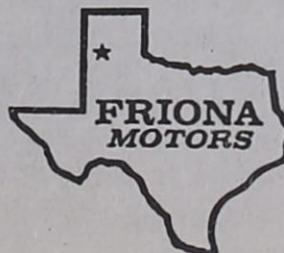
