Cotton Up \$3 For Week Run

NEW YORK, Aug. 16-Cotton futures, after a faltering start this week, pushed ahead with increasing confidence to end the period with gains up to \$3 a bale.

At Friday's close the list ruled attorney and he will turn it over 17 to 64 points-85 cents to \$3.20 a bale-higher than the preceding

Closing on higher ground in four of the five sessions, the market erased almost 60 per cent of the loss suffered a week ago following publication of the government's Aug. 1 crop estimate.

Factors causing the turn-about in market sentiment included a resurgence of inflationary psychology, plus growing fears of crop damage in the western belt, particularly Texas, because of ex-tremely hot and dry weather.

The New York cotton exchange service bureau estimated domestic consumption of all cotton in the five week period ended Aug. 2 at 675,000 bales. This compared with 696,000 bales used in the previous four week period and 768,-000 bales consumed in the corresponding five week period last

The daily rate of use in the latest five week period was 28,100 bales against 34,800 bales and 32,-000 bales, respectively, in the





Properly cured, leafy peanut hay is practically equal to alfalfa for dairy and beef cattle. A ton of choice peanut hay contains about 200 pounds of protein, the equivalent of about 450 pounds of cottonseed

But some portion of the nuts leaving the threshing machine are destined to see the inside of a glue factory. Glues are made from peanut meal and are suitable for making gummed tape and paper. That package you have which is tied with gummed tape may be the product of a peanut field.

With the right program peanuts can be a profitable crop. If you need late information on peanut growing, ask your County Agent.




