in the house building history from 1948 through 1951," he told the closed conference, "there is still tremendous potential for new houses, a demand that is sufficient to make possible the prodution of one million houses a year for an almost indefinite period." A biting cold air mass, the most

But Haeger said his forecast vas based on the assumption that the present good general business conditions would continue. He emphasized that a recession or a depression traditionally cuts marriage and birth rates and forces with their relatives instead of buying their own homes.

But barring an economic crisis Haeger said, such factors as new families, replacing homes lost roughly 60,000 homes a year lost through fire and other natural by natural disasters. The increasdisasters and replacing obsolete omes add up to a long-term demand for one million or more omes a year.

One reason for some pessimism immediate about the industry's future is that now the "depreson babies" are coming of age. They were fewer than babies of the boom prosperity of the 1920s or the war propserity of the 1940's.

The Census Bureau calculates that in the next five years there will be about 775,000 less women in the marriageable 20-24 year-old age group than in 1950. This is the result of the sharp fall in the birth rate in the depression days of the early 1930's.

Figures 730,000 Homes Haeger insisted, however, that despite fewer marriageable men the rock-bottom demand for new houses will be 730,000 new homes a year. He figures it this
