### Around The Square

With Mack

We hear quite a bit about the "Eleventh Hour," and while to some it holds no significance, to others it might mean many things.

A few years ago it was our privilege to have aided in the publishing of a religious magazine in Detroit, Mich., known as the "Eleventh Hour." Many times we wondered about the name, and finally got up nerve to ask the publisher. While his answer did not satisfy us completely we picked up the general idea that "time is short" and that much remains to be done in a world-wide Christian movement.

If this is the correct answer, we feel the name implies a great deal.

More recently the Salvation Army published a folder under the title, "The Salvation Army Sounds the Midnight Cry." And knowing the Salvation Army as we do, we can guess at the meaning.

Men in all walks of life are concerned with the future, and all agree that perhaps we have spent too much time on the mechanical and material things of life—and in doing so have lost the art of living. Money, and position, comfort and power have spelled success, while the simple arts of honor and integrity, kindness and understanding have been forgotten.

It was pointed out in the folder that the golden rule has been replaced by the rule of gold. Honor takes second place to expediency and a smug confidence substitutes for a simple faith and trust in God.

Preoccupation with our own problems and interests have caused us to forget the needs of others. Really we have fiddled while the world burns. Now at this late hour—maybe the Eleventh Hour—we suddenly have been brought face to face with the stern reality so clearly stressed by Christ Himself: "For a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth."

Quoting the folder we learn that "Jesus fed the 5000 on the hill-side, but also he fed them with the bread of life."

"As the hands of the World's clock move closer and closer to the midnight hour, and all of us face the unknown future, we should like to urge you to listen and turn again to our only hope—for time and eternity—The Living Christ."

"As one of our great statesmen said recently—'It is Christ or chaos.'"

The choice is our own, and the midnight hour draws nigh.

We do not wish to imply that one should neglect loved ones in order to go out and relieve the needy, but rather to supply the one lavishly to the entire neglect of another, is not the plan promulgated by Jesus.

Men may be born equal, but common sense proves that they do not remain equal from a standpoint of wisdom and faith. Divide all the riches of this earth among its people and it would not be 24 hours until we would have millionaires and paupers.

Then it is no more than right that we expect more from those who have received more. And the man who has had an infilling of the Holy Spirit, has experienced Grace in its deepest setting, will naturally be more capable of rendering a service to suffering humanity, than the man who has not.

So when we speak of the "Eleventh Hour" one might infer that there are many who know the truth, and that the two words are held up as a kind of danger signal to cause men to slow down, to respect and seek more wisdom, in order that he may better follow certain plans he already knows.

### A. W. Hartsfield Funeral Rites Are Held Today

Funeral rites for Abner Walter Hartsfield, 50, who had been a Ranger resident since 1925, were held at the Second Baptist Church in Ranger Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

The Rev. James Ward, pastor of the church, officiated during the services and interment was in Evergreen Cemetery with Killingsworth Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers at the funeral were C. L. Cozy of Straw, R. L. Bratton, N. V. Hamner, Sig Faircloth, Gordon Woods, G. D. Nicholson, Turney McCleskey, and T. C. Fisher.

Hartsfield, who was born in Erath County on May 6, 1902, had resided at 333 Armstrong Street in Ranger. He had been engaged in livestock raising since 1940.

Hartsfield died early Monday as the result of an automobile accident on U. S. Highway 80, ten miles west of Weatherford. He was instantly burned to death following a mishap when his 1951 Ford was sideswiped by a truck. Hartsfield was headed toward Ranger, the other vehicle was moving east at the time of the accident. Hartsfield's car careened and burst into flames. He was burned to death in the vehicle. The State Highway Patrol and the Weatherford Fire Department arrived on the scene a few minutes later.

The accident occurred about 6 a.m. Monday.

Driver of the truck, Willie Murphy, a Negro, has been charged with negligent homicide as a result of the collision. The charge came following an inquest Monday morning in Weatherford before Justice of Peace Sam Borden.

Hartsfield is survived by his widow, 333 Armstrong Street, Ranger, and his mother, Mrs. Vera Lou Hartsfield, 805 West Main, also of Ranger.

Other survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Bill Shinn of Picher, Okla. and Mrs. Ralph Carpenter of Galveston; three brothers, Ray N. Hartsfield of Dallas, Manuel Hartsfield of Denton, and Raymond Hartsfield of Alaska; four sisters, Mrs. Viola Gore of Long Beach, Calif., Mrs. Truman Stephenson and Mrs. Bill E. McGilvary, both of San Diego, Calif., and Mrs. Robert Carpenter of Dallas.

## Arterburn Navy's Passing Sensation

A former Eastland County football star who went on to greater glory in collegiate pigskin competition is currently the rage on gridirons of the United States Navy.

He's Junior Arterburn, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Arterburn of Ranger, who played stellarly for the Ranger High Bulldogs, the Ranger Junior College Raiders prior to enlisting in the Navy last summer.

This fall, plotted as first-string quarterback of the Great Lakes Bluejackets, Arterburn has been sowing 'em with his passing.

During six games in which he's been in action for the tars of Great Lakes the Ranger flinger has completed 50 of 82 aerials—a 61 per cent average.

Those 50 completions have totaled a net gain of 709 yards—and that's a better-than-good average of 14 yards per completion.

Yes, and almost 9 yards every time he fades to throw the oval.

So today Arterburn, whose gridiron talents have been emblazoned on sports pages in some of the greatest newspapers of the land during the "Great Lakes" 1952 gridiron campaign, holds one of the best passing records in Navy football.

The Bluejackets have won four, lost four in their battles with top armed forces elevens of the nation during their current campaign.

Even in defeat the ex-Ranger ace shines.

Last Saturday, for instance, Arterburn sparkled and a Chicago newspaper reported: "Offensively, Great Lakes star is Jdnior Arterburn, a quarterback who completed 26 of 35 passes for 317 yards Saturday as the Blue Jackets lost to NTC at Bainbridge, Md."

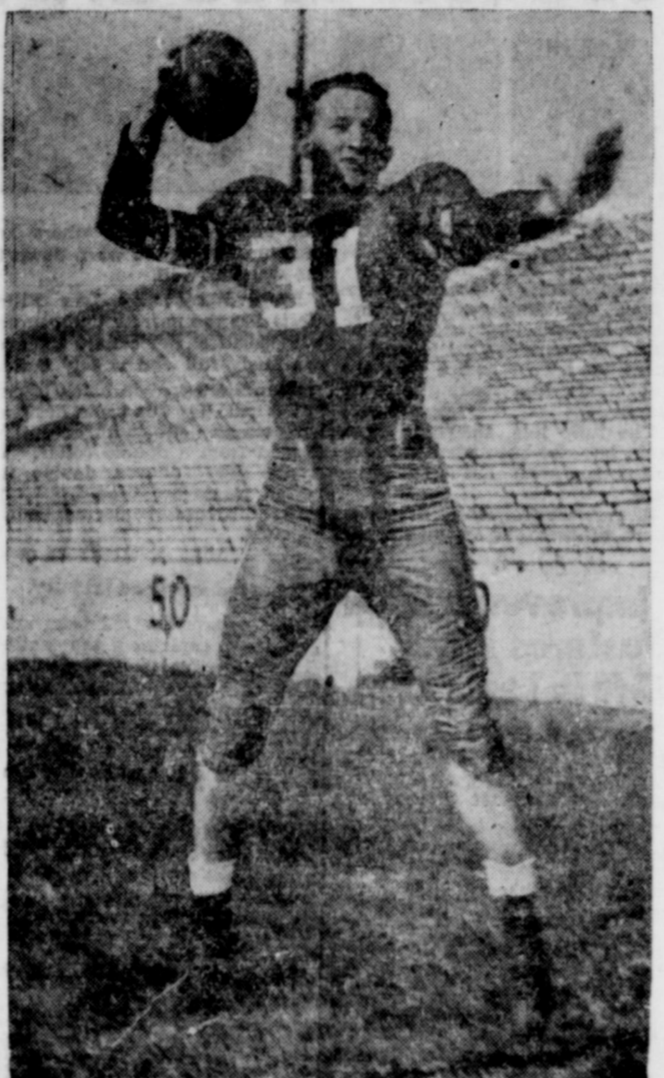
The collegiate record, incidentally, is 372 yards gained on completed passing in a single game set by Don Klosterman of Loyola (California) last fall.

Arterburn, in true form, is expected to fling 'em high wide and handsome Saturday night out at Pensacola, Fla. when the Blue Jackets play their final contest of the year—a crucial tilt with the NAS Pensacola powerhouse, one of the nation's few undefeated gridiron steamrollers.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Arterburn of Ranger are leaving today to motor out to the Sun Bowl at El Paso last New Year's Day when he piloted the Teachers to their first bowl game victory.

Arterburn was all-conference in the Border loop last fall and was an honorable mention, high on the list, for All-American honors.

The stellar Eastland County athlete is a husky 175-pounder.

and people in and around Eastland have domestic water at all times. This is paramount in our water planning. Therefore, if we call for bids on hauling water a performance bond would be required for approximately \$10,000. After checking into such a bond we have no assurance such a bond could be written, on account of conditions. There would be no definite period of hauling water (it may be for twelve hours or for two years), as we would cease hauling water just as soon as we had sufficient water in our lakes. We could not set any definite amount to be hauled, this being controlled by the rains we have. It may be necessary at times to change the place of hauling from. We could not give the bonding company what the total amount the water hauling contract would amount to, as we would not know how much water was to be hauled, or for what period of time. This was one of the requests of a bonding company. This bonding company also wanted to set the period of hauling at 180 days, which, of course, would not be acceptable.

Calling for bids on hauling water was discussed at the last commission meeting (November 3, 1952). After going into all the problems, which we would have to consider, in calling for bids, we deferred action on calling for bids until the problem could be given further study. One party interested in bidding on a hauling contract, after entering into the discussion at this commission meeting, and considering the many complex problems, particular with reference to making a performance bond, stated at this meeting, that if he was a commissioner on the Board he would not call for bids for hauling our water. This man was from Fort Worth.

We want to assure all the water users in this district we are interested in getting water hauled at the very lowest figure possible, and if a saving could be made in calling for bids we would not hesitate to do so, if you were definitely protected with the assurance you would have water at all times. This definitely must be first consideration.

We appreciate the cooperation we have received from you, during these very strenuous times.

### City Council Gives Break Down On Water Situation In Eastland; Now Hauling 60,000 Gallons Each Day

To The Citizens of Eastland: The City Commission have been hauling water into Eastland since August 18th, this year, on account of the drought, no water having been over the spillways at Eastland Lake for about twenty-nine months, and the water is almost depleted in both Eastland and Ringling lakes. The rains we had in September and November have put some water in the channel of the lake, and we have been able to cut down on the amount of water hauled.

We first started hauling 130,000 gallons daily, then reduced this to 90,000 gallons, then to 75,000 gallons, and we are now hauling 60,000 gallons daily. The hauling cost for the past month was \$6,207.82, and with a little more rain this could be reduced still lower.

We started hauling water from a well south of the city, then from Lake Burney, west of Cisco. We are now hauling about half of our water from Olden and the balance from Winsett Springs, about two miles south of Ranger. We closed a contract with Mr. J. M. Smith,

Olden, for water from his well on Monday, November 10th (this week) and we are now working on a contract with Mr. Whisenat of Olden, for water from his wells, and this contract should be closed this week. This should give us enough water, with what we are getting from our own wells, in case all of our water had to be hauled.

We have been, and are now paying \$3.25 per one thousand gallons for water hauled. Last week the water hauler assured us he would give us a reduction on the water hauled from Olden, but he asked us to give him until November 15th, in order that he might make a performance check to see just what his cost would be, such as labor, truck and tire repair, time element, etc. and he could then tell just what reduction he could make.

If we could call for bids on hauling this water, and thereby save on the cost of hauling water, by all means we would do this. However, we would have to have definite assurance the successful bidder would comply with his contract, as it is definitely our responsibility to see some four thous-

## Battle For 1952 PC Title Set Next Week

The closest junior college conference title race in Texas this season won't be decided until next weekend when the Arlington State College Rebels, pacing the field in the Pioneer Loop, play the Tarleton State Plovoys, who are only a half game behind.

Tarleton, bowing to San Angelo, 26-14, last Saturday, suffered its only conference defeat thus far this season.

The Arlington Rebs had to rally late in the fourth quarter to tie Ranger 13-13, and take over the loop lead. Previously tied for the loop, both ASC and Tarleton are unscheduled until they collide in their season's final game at Stephenville on November 22.

One Loop Contest Highlight of the loop chase this weekend will be a lone conference game between San Angelo and Schreiner at San Angelo. The encounter will have no bearing on the championship picture as both elevens have lost two league games. But the match between these two pre-season favorites and spirited West Texans rivals promises to be a classic.

Before it had player losses in mid-season and lost three games in a row, San Angelo was rated No. 1 Junior College team of the nation. Schreiner, despite its cellar position, has lost its two loop

games by narrow three and six point margins. It is rated by some conference officials as the best team in the league when its great quarterback, Bobby Bowmer, is in top shape.

When Bowmer was injured in the Arlington State game he had the Mountaineers 14 points ahead. He played only briefly when Schreiner was nudged out by Tarleton. The Mountaineers' chief offensive weapon now is Durwood Watkins who is the league's leading rusher.

Unless Bowmer rounds into shape, San Angelo, playing at home, will be favored. The Rams have a slashing running attack paced by Jack Freeman and Tom Caskey and two good passers in Gene Henderson and Norman Cash.

Rangers Get Nod Coach Boone Yarbrough's Ranger Junior College Rangers, a magnificent defensive unit, will be definite favorites in a non-loop game at Ranger Saturday when the Henderson County Cardinals of Athens.

Against ASC last week, the Rangers made impotent the passing of Sam Howard, lopo leading Rebel passer. The West Texans allowed the fine ASC back only two completions for 25 yards and intercepted five of his tosses. Ranger's offense, spearheaded

by Charles Blanton, Bud Hamrick, and Rusty Talbot generally has been overshadowed by the brilliance of the defensive platoon, but it outgained ASC, 312 yards to 259, last Saturday and exhibited a potential all-conference halfback in Blanton whose all-round play was little short of sensational. In addition to scoring six points, Blanton's work in rushing, returning kick-offs and punts, and pass-catching netted Ranger 162 yards.

The danger of the common cold lies mainly in the other infections that may follow after it. A cold lessens resistance, and is likely to pave the way for other more serious respiratory ailments. Sinusitis, ear infections, bronchitis, and the various forms of pneumonia are frequently ushered in by a cold.

### Hunting Boat Rule Changed By Commission

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission in Austin called Texas hunters' attention to a 1952 change in the waterfowl regulations affecting power boats.

He said gunners may now use a boat with an inboard motor or boats with an outboard motor providing the boats are tied or secured to a permanent blind.

The law covering this phase previously forbade the use of inboard motor boats altogether and stipulated that boats using outboard motors had to have the motor immobilized and placed in the bottom of the craft when it was

kept in a duck blind. The Executive Secretary said the liberalizing regulation is expected to accommodate many hunters in the coastal area where power boats are commonly used.

He cautioned hunters that use of motor boats to disturb or chase waterfowl is unlawful, although motors may be used to retrieve dead or crippled ducks or geese.

The Executive Secretary said the regulation governing baiting waterfowl has been tightened in that shooting over baited areas is forbidden altogether.

### Smith Warns Polio Battle To Be Pushed

Reports of a cure-all received widespread attention recently after the encouraging results of gamma globulin shots as an effective prevention of paralysis caused by polio were made known according to General Robert J. Smith, chairman of the 1953 Texas March of Dimes, in Austin.

General Smith, who is president of Pioneer Air Lines, said he wished the authorities could report that the gamma globulin field studies conducted in Houston, and Sioux City, Iowa, were the cure-all, making further research unnecessary.

"Unfortunately, the field studies are only a step toward cutting the paralytic effects of the disease," reported General Smith.

"The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has cautioned the vast number of volunteers handling the annual March of Dimes to be prepared to carry on the financing program.



"At the present time the local January March of Dimes with the chapters of the N.F.I.P. over the realization that any relaxation of nation are building plans for the vigilance might cost us the gains

that have been made.

"Dr. Hart E. Van Riper, Medical Director of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, has warned that we do not yet have a vaccine that can be used safely and on a large scale.

"Recent progress toward prevention and cure of polio marks a mere beginning in surbing the disease and it is urgent now to move ahead with the March of Dimes movement so that maximum research may be financed to ultimately clinch the advances already made," concluded General Smith.

## CONVENIENT SCHEDULE STATE HIGHWAY PATROL EXAMINER BIG AID TO COUNTY DRIVERS

For the convenience of auto owners and motorists in this area, the Texas State Highway Patrol has a convenient schedule for its drivers' tests over Eastland County.

State Highway Patrolman M. A. Peterson of Eastland is in Ranger on Fridays, in Eastland on Saturdays, and in Cisco on the first, third and fifth Thursday of each month.

Written tests are given in Ranger every Friday at 8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m., Patrolman Peterson said. The same hours—8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m.—are also scheduled at Cisco. The written tests at Eastland are given at 8 a.m. and 1 p.m.

Patrolman Peterson advised drivers applying for renewal of their licenses to send in their applications accompanied by a money order. Or, he said, they may appear at the drivers' license offices

on the scheduled dates in Cisco, Eastland or Ranger and remittances will be accepted and mailed in for the applicants.

During Patrolman Peterson's visit to Ranger last Friday a total of nine tests were given. Six passed the written exams and two failed. Another applicant failed on the driving test after having passed the written examination.

Eight renewals of licenses also were issued, Patrolman Peterson said.
