George Callihan, 64-year-old Abilene resident and oil man who was well known in the Eastland County area, were held today at 3 p.m. at the Kiker-Warren Funer-

Mr. Callihan, who was an oil operator in the Ranger area during the fabulous oil boom of more than three decades ago, died of a heart attack Wednesday at 8 p.m. located her bill fold and calmnly placed the money therein bath.

Mr. Callihan came to Texas in 1918 and set up drilling operation at Desdemona, Albany and Moran fields during the boom days in the Ranger area. He moved to Albany throughout the city. in 1920 and to Abilene in 1928. He had extensive oil interests in Taylor, Runnels, Shackelford, and Eastland Counties, and had re-

cently discovered the Box Field eight miles east of Abilene. He operated the Callihan Rotary Company here since its organiza-tion in 1947:
