

Dr. Stockwell stated that upon his release he telegraphed his wife, 'I have completed life's most difficult and rewaring experience." He told that during his first fourteen kett in solitary confinement in a Chunking prison. His sanity and ability to com through the nearly two years of such experience were, he said The New Testament, the grace o God, and a sense of humor." He related how that in that post-midnight arrest when the communists ame for him while asleep with nis family his wife handed him a tattered, ragged, taped copy of the Testament. The communist took away his pocket knife, but failed to recognize what his New Testament was. Later, when Dr. Stockwell asked for a complete Bible, he was told he could not be permitted to read the Bible.

U. S. Casualties In Korea Mount To 129,819 Total

The Defense Department re-ported today 395 American casualties in Korea last week, bringing \$2,200 and another grant of \$5,- the total since the start of the 200. In addition, the county group war to 129,819.

The latest report compares with 271 casualties for the previous seven days. It includes 68 American dead and 335 wounded, but the number of missing was re-

duced by eight.

The new total includes 22,890 dead; 94,123 wounded, of whom about 85 per cent have recovered, and *11,411 missing. In addi ion, 1,395 men who were missing for extended periods have now return-

ed to duty.

The dead, wounded, missing and "returned to duty" totals by services:

Army-18,785, 71,393; 9,992; and 1,327.
Navy—364; 1,249; 86; and 4.
Marine Corps—3,242; 21,349;

Air Force-499; 42; 832; and

The department said the change in the number of missing was a statistical revision rather than re-covery of lost men.





Molasses-Coffee Coconut Pie

1 envelope gelatin
14 tup cald water
2 eggs, separated
1/3 cup molasses
1/3 cup sugar
14 teaspoan salt
24 cup hat, strong Clover Farm
Coffee 1/2 cup Clover Farm Moist Coconut 12 cup heavy cream, whipped 9-inch baked pie shell or crum

Soak gelatin in cold water Mix in top of double boiler egg yolks, molasses, 1 3 cup sugar, and salt. Add coffee. Cook over hot water, below boiling point, until mixture is slightly thick. Stir constantly. Remove from heat and add gelatin. Cool in cold water until mixture becomes as thick as fresh egg whites. Add vanilla. Beat egg whites stiff, but not dry, and gradually add 1 3 cup sugar and 1 3 cup coconut. Fold into custard mixture. Pour into cold, baked pie shell. Chill until ready to serve. Spread with whipped cream and sprinkle with remaining coconut just before serving.
