

Anothe thing to remember is that medicines should always be taken exactly as directed by a doctor because many beneficial medicines can do untold harm if taken too frequentor in too large quantities. It is well to stop and think that you may be taking your own life in your hands when you take medi-

The State Health Officer also warned of the danger in the in clination of many persons untrain ed to diagnose and treat their own ills. Such persons are apt to gues wrong he asserted, and while they not take medicine that is ac tually harmful, they are neverthe less postponing an accurate diag nosis and the resulting proper treatment that could help their ill-

"Two thirds of that tax would automatically be passed on to the users of Texas gas in other states — but Texans would enjoy the benefits through better highways, better streets, better education, and better water conservation,'

Exports of natural gas from Texas have climbed 900 per cent in the last 12 years, the lawmakers pointed out.

"In 1940, only about 19 billion cubic feet of gas was leaving the state each month. Today, only a dozen years later, Texas Railroad Commission reports show that 180 billion cubic feet a month are leaving the state to provide fuel for home, stores and factories in other states. Texas use of its own gas, in the same period, has increased only about 350 per cent, from about 31 billion cubic feet a month to 107 billion cubic feet a month."


