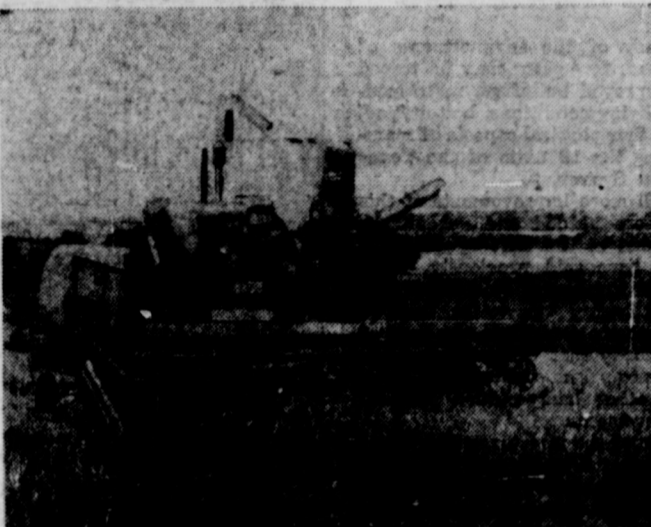

Texas Prisons With 12 Units; Being Operated Quite Successfully; Honor System Used To Good Advantage

(NOTE: The Governor of Texas, continuing his series of articles on State problems, has written the following discussion of the Texas Prison System.)

The people who commit crimes are still human beings after their freedom has been forfeited.

That is one of the basic principles behind the operation of the Texas Prison System.

Of course, punishment never will be outmoded as long as there is crime. But Texas has progressed a long way in its treatment of those convicted of violating the law.

Many of the advancements of the past few years may be traced to improved buildings, more sanitary living conditions, better food, and other physical aspects of maintaining the 12 units of the Texas Prison System.

Still more improvements of this kind are needed and should be provided at the first opportunity. As I have said previously, when and if the courts rule the Texas gas-gathering tax to be legal, I hope to see our State put part of the money that will become available into prison construction, along with other badly-needed capital improvements.

One of the most urgent needs of the Prison System exists at Eastham Farm, near Crockett, where overcrowding is a serious problem. Despite all of our hopes and endeavors, the Texas prison population continues to grow. By mid-summer, there are expected to be more than 7,500 inmates—about 650 more makes the expansion requirements more urgent.

Aside from the matter of punishment—which remains serious even though it is regarded by some of our modern thinkers as old-fashioned—there are three chief objectives of a good Prison System. These are (1) protection of the public from the criminal element, (2) protection of the prisoners from each other, and (3) rehabilitation of the individual prisoners.

Most of the State prison expenditures go for the first two of these items, although protective walls and cells and guards form a definite part of the rehabilitation program.

Much of the rehabilitating cost is paid by income from the annual prison rodeo.

The rehabilitation program is, briefly, the many-sided task of providing opportunities so that any prisoner who desires to improve himself may do so.

The "rehab" activities embrace general and vocational education, library operation, recreation, various medical aids, and religious services and counseling.

A typical report, covering the activities of January and February, 1953, indicates that the Prison System's five chaplains conducted 78 religious services, showed inspirational films to 5,000 prisoners, conducted 459 individual conferences, and handled 192 letters or telephone calls about the personal problems of inmates.

In vocational training, 16 trades now are taught, including new courses in sign painting and welding. There are more than 150 men enrolled in vocational correspondence courses and 116 attend classes.

tioned, more than 15,000 books were loaned from the Prison System library and 13,500 prisoners took advantage of the opportunity to read magazines.

A wide program of recreation is carried out, which included the Golden Gloves tournament early this year. The fourth season of the prison baseball league will begin this month. Dominoes, checkers, and other games are available.

In the medical aids program, 325 inmates received assistance during January and February. Seven hundred eye examinations were conducted and 177 pair of glasses were issued, 70 denture plates were supplied, two hearing aids were provided, and four new artificial limbs were procured.

As chairman of the Inmate Committee of the Texas Prison Board, the Rev. Mr. George Beto, President of Concordia Lutheran College at Austin, is responsible for the rehabilitation program, which is actively administered by Mr. A. C. Turner. Mr. Beto, who accepted an appointment to the Board early in 1953, made an inspection of the entire Texas Prison System in February and March.

He has confirmed my impression that our Prison system is well administered by extremely competent personnel, under the outstanding management of Mr. O. B. Ellis. With the approval of the Texas Legislature, Mr. Ellis began a thorough reform of the State's prisons in 1948. This reformation has extended to improvement of inmate's living conditions, rehabilitation of the prisoners, better selection, training, and compensation.

of employees, and the use of more efficient farming methods on the 73,000 acres of prison farm lands.

One of the newest and most encouraging rehabilitation projects is in operation on Ferguson Farm a Midway near Madisonville. This is an honor farm where the best rehabilitative prospects in the Prison System live and work without physical restraints. There are no locks, and the 70 men at Ferguson enjoy numerous simple but appreciated comforts and privileges in return for their trustworthiness. Not a single escape has been attempted there.

I join Mr. Ellis, Mr. Beto, and the other members of the Prison Board in their pride at this evidence that many prisoners, once given opportunities for self-improvement and hope for the future, can prepare themselves while in the Texas Prison System for responsible citizenship after their release.

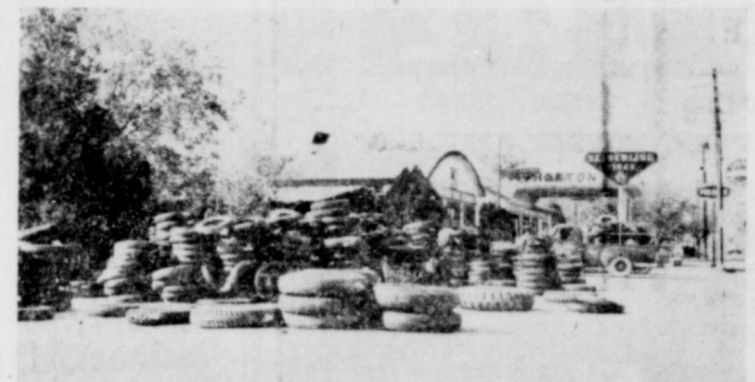

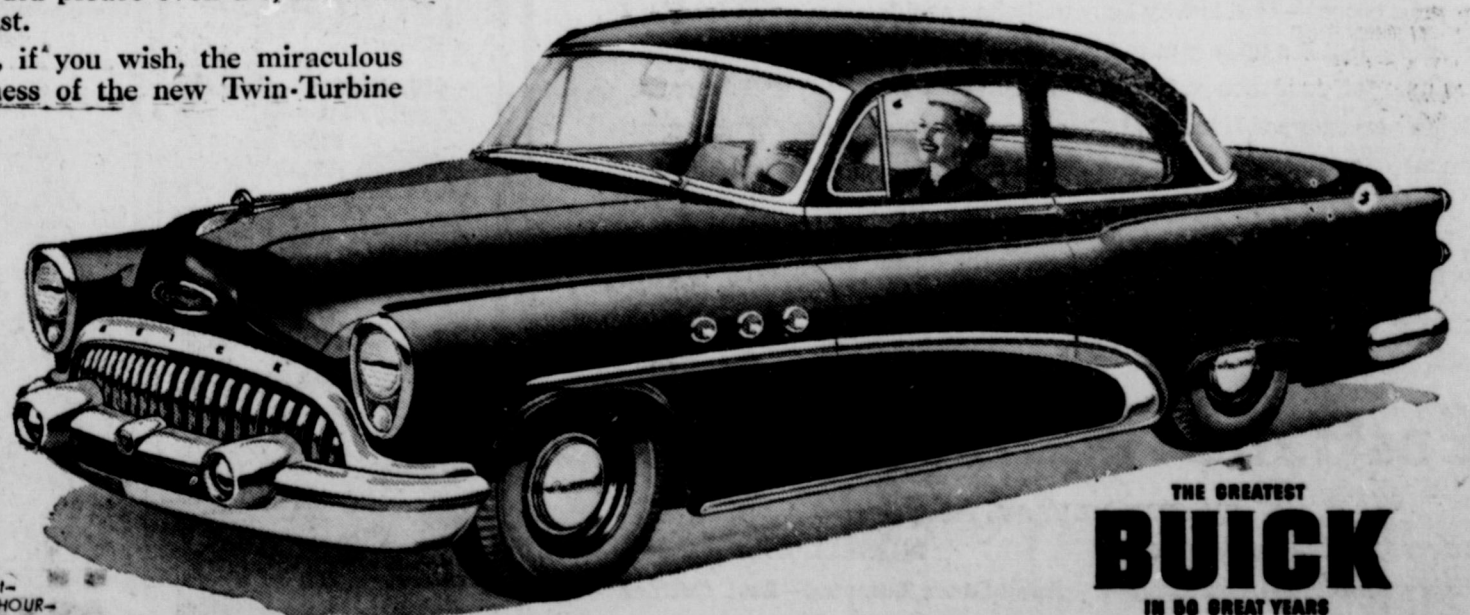

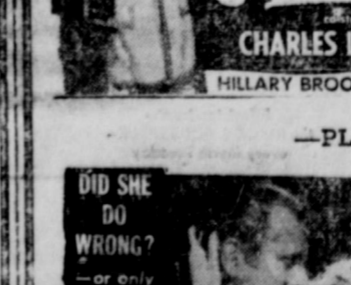
