cere. He gave His life that men might be saved, and stands ready all the time to go to the rescue of the lost. Yes, Jesus of Nazarus does care, even for you. When He was on the earth walking, talking and working with men. He cared for each individual. He was critieized for doing this, as we are told in Luke XIV, I, when His enemics stated "This man receiv-eth sinners and eateth with them."
