

PLEASE HELP US FIGHT FLIES

Flies are with us in large numbers. We need everyone to help us in combating this health hazard. Please do your part in keeping your premises clean. Don't let trash accumulate. Keep horse and cow lots and chicken and dog lots clean daily, and scatter disinfectant at regular intervals. Keep lids on all trash containers. Don't allow trash, particularly kitchen refuse, to be thrown on the ground or put

The city is starting the second spraying this week, and will double the amount of "Gamma Ismer Penco' used in the solution, which is a chemical used in fighting flies. The men operating the spray have been instructed to drive very slow, and shoot the spray low on the ground, and spray both sides of the street and all alleys. Please bear with us if the chemical smell bothers you for a few hours. The city is starting their program of "two trash pick-ups a Week" during the summer months, and you will be notified through the daily paper as to schedules of pick-up. A spray has been ordered for spraying all trash barrels, which spray will be attached to the trash truck, and each trash barrel will be sprayed when the trash is emptied. Trash barrels are breeding places for flies and mosquitoes. We are keeping the city dump in good shape by spraying and bury-

ing the trash twice as often as usual, during the summer months. We need your help and will appreciate your cooperation in helping to fight the fly and mosquito hazard. Remember, it is said a clean city is free of epidemics, such as "Polio", etc.

We have plenty of trash barrels on hand now, which sell for \$2.50, but have no lids, as we are unable to get the lids. Therefore, please keep the lids from your old barrels.






