



tragedy. Mrs. Alta Louise (Blue Arnett) Graves, 37-year-old Ranger wo-man, was shot to death on the banks of the Leon River 15 miles south of Ranger at Lone Cedar about 4:30 p.m. Sunday when she was struck by a bullet which accidentally discharged from a single shot 22-caliber rifle.





Coastal Fish Coming Back

ROCKPORT — The Chief Mar-ine Biol-)zist of the Game and Fish Commission reported n e w ndications that Gulf Coast sports fishing is recovering from the devastating 1951 freeze.


