We will not go so far as to say that women are more dependable workers than men, though we do feel that the average woman clings to her job with more tenacity than the average man. Men are inclined to be looking for a greener field, while women are quite ready to settle down and protect whatever job they may have.

At the moment we can't say that women telephone workers are in a class all their own, but we do know that most of them hold what they've until promotion comes. A very true trait, we say.

In Eastland there are more than 30 women workers at the telephone office. Very few have been there for as short a time as a year, while one of the women has been with the company for 33 years. The local girls have an average of about eight years service each. This means that Eastland subscribers may expect, and usually get, perfect telephone service. The operators and others are experienced—know what they are doing and how to do it. Before a notice is put on her own, these capable women give her training which means she is a good operator almost from the very start.

We have lived in Eastland less than two years, and have had occasion to visit the telephone office on very few occasions, yet when we ring it seems that we get a kind of personal service. They seem to know us and at times seem to know what we want better than we know ourselves. Occasionally one will call by name, and it makes us feel like we are really an old-timer, and a rather important one at that.

Of course our voice, which sounds like a cross between a bull-frog croak and a cracked steamboat's whistle, may give us away. If that is true we are glad our voice is in need of repairs. It gains for us special recognition, and a lot of perfect service. (You are welcome, girls.)

Jack Porter, former Democrat who is now Republican boss in Texas, seems to be handling the United States District Attorney appointment with gloves. And who knows but that is right? An early announcement would bring on a lot of unnecessary talk, and Jack has had a lion's share of that for some time.

U. S. Casualties In Korea Climb To Total 136,029

The Defense Department today reported 443 American casualties in Korea for last week, to bring the total since start of the war to 136,029.

The increase, largest in seven weeks, included 67 dead, 354 wounded and 22 missing. The new total consists of 24,281 dead, 98,851 wounded, 2,675 missing and known to be prisoners, 8,682 missing and unaccounted for, and 1,540 men who were missing for extended periods but now have returned to duty.

The summary showed an increase of 179 in the number of missing who now officially are known to be prisoners. The increase for the week was the largest since 623 American casualties were reported April 29, and compared with 224 casualties for the preceding seven days.

Spokesmen said the upturn undoubtedly was due to heavy Communist attacks launched to gain a "last grab" advantage in determining a truce demarcation line.

The Army now has suffered 105,623 casualties while the Marine Corps has reported 26,396, the Navy 2,002 and the Air Force 1,468.

ONYX JOINS IN NEW OIL PRICE BOOST

Strengthening the certain possibility of a coming—and soon—gasoline price boost of from half a cent to a cent and a half per gallon, Onyx Refining Co. and Magnolia Petroleum Co. Wednesday joined the parade of companies meeting the new 25-cent-a-barrel crude oil price hike.

The Onyx announcements was made through Vice-President Jack Levering, who issued the following statement:

"Effective 7 a.m. July 15, 1953, Onyx Refining Co. issued Crude Oil Price Bulletin No. 6, posting a price increase of 25 cents per barrel for crude oil purchased in West Central Texas.

"The new schedule establishes a base price of \$2.48 per barrel of 20 gravity and below with a two-cent differential per degree in gravity, upward to a top price for 40 gravity and above at \$2.90 per barrel.

"Onyx purchases approximately 6,000,000 barrels of crude oil annually from the nine county area including Callahan, Coleman, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Nolan, Runnels, Shackelford, and Taylor counties, partially served by its pipeline system and augmented with purchase via tank truck.

"Under the new schedule producers and royalty owners in West Central Texas, selling crude oil to Onyx, will realize about \$1,500,000 per year in added revenue from oil sales."

AUSTIN—The Texas treasury may get 23 1/4 million dollars extra in two years because of the new 25 cents a barrel average increase in Texas crude oil prices.

Moisture Dwindling Fast—Scorching Heat Wave Continues

The current sweltering mid-June heat wave is still in high gear and little hope for a let-up was seen today in the forecast of the U. S. Weather Bureau.

The near and over 100-degree temperature trend of the past two weeks is scheduled to continue at least two more days—today and Friday.

Top mercury readings for both days, weathermen say, will be around 100 sizzling degrees.

The low for tonight again is scheduled for the mid-70s.

Skies were scheduled for clear to partly cloudy.

The North Central Texas forecast calls for generally fair weather Thursday and Friday with widely scattered thundershowers in extreme northwest. Not much change in temperature.

For West Texas—Partly cloudy Thursday and Friday with widely scattered thundershowers. Not much change in temperature.

Continued hot weather and searing winds in the Eastland County vicinity is taking a heavy toll of the reserve moisture put into the ground by heavy rains several weeks ago.

"Practically the entire state is now included in the area suffering from drought conditions," a report of the United States Department of Agriculture said today.

At Washington, congressmen from drought-stricken Southwest areas met Wednesday with government officials to discuss getting fed for starving livestock. They asked the government to make available at lower prices some or all of about 700,000 tons of cottonseed meal held by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Here's the 36-day outlook for the weather, issued early today by the U. S. Weather Bureau:

For the period mid-June to mid-July, temperatures are expected to average warmer than seasonal normals over the western two-thirds of the nation except along

the West Coast, where near to below normal temperatures are indicated.

Precipitation is expected to exceed normal in the Middle and South Atlantic states and also in the Far West, but prevailing dry conditions are indicated over much of the Central and Southern Plains and in the Southern Rocky Mountain states. Elsewhere about normal rainfall is anticipated.

Gorman Veterans of the Armed Services have reactivated the Mauney-Bryan American Legion Post 594. Officers were elected and were installed Monday night by Commander Bleck of Eastland at the Fire Hall in Gorman.

The new Post Commander is Willie O. (Bill) Parr.

Post 594 was organized just following World War I as the Mauney American Legion Post, named in honor of Alvin Mauney who gave his life in the Argonne Forest. Later the post became inactive, but following World War II it was reactivated and the name changed to Mauney-Bryan American Legion. The latter name honors the memory of Leland Bryan who died during the Pearl Harbor attack.

Officers installed, other than the above mentioned post commander include: vice commander, Milton H. Fairbetter; second vice commander Claude Fuller; post adjutant, Alvis Rogers; sergeant-at-arms, Verlon Overstreet; finance officer, James Thompson; historian, Arlon Smith; chaplain, A. V. Littlefield, and service officer, Arlon Smith. Gus Frossard was appointed child welfare chairman and Keith Whitt judge advocate.

For quite some time the members of the Men's Fellowship Bible Class of the First Christian Church have been studying the civic needs of Eastland and what they as a class could do about it. After considerable study and investigation it has been decided to construct a park and picnic area for the colored population of the town. It was felt that this project would be a measure, express to the colored people of the city the high regard in which they are held by the white population and to afford them a recreational area.

Property has been acquired right on the north banks of the Leon River on the left side of the highway, this is the area known in old days as the Confederate Veterans Reunion Grounds.

Already the site has been staked off and soon work will start on clearing etc. Several pieces of playground equipment have been donated and more will be constructed of pipe which already is on the ground.

In addition to playground equipment, the park will be provided with lights, picnic tables, benches and water.

After the project is completed it will be deeded by the class to the City of Eastland for the use of the colored population of the city.

The colored Masonic Lodge has agreed to act as sponsors of the project upon completion.

Anyone having playground equipment that they care to donate are urged to contact Jno. F. Collins, class president, Sam Gamble, project chairman, or Rev. O. W. Ackelson.

New, through passenger train service over the Texas and Pacific Railway from El Paso and West Texas to East Texas, Louisiana and points North and East will go into effect, Sunday, June 21.

W. W. Fair, T&P passenger traffic manager, Dallas, said that the new service will be made possible by operating its present passenger train, the Westerner, eastward beyond Fort Worth and Dal-

las to East Texas, Texarkana, Little Rock, Memphis and St. Louis, and direct through Louisiana to Shreveport, Alexandria and New Orleans.

In announcing this new passenger service, Fair reported that the schedules of the T&P's Texas Eagle and Louisiana Eagle passenger trains will be changed on the same date.

Under their new schedules, the Texas Eagle will leave Fort Worth ten minutes earlier—at 5:05 p.m.—and Dallas five minutes earlier, at 6:10 p.m.

Watch Health During Summer; Prevent Disease

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fog. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramps is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

SAVOR THE FLAVOR

BINGHAMTON, N. Y. — Light gives milk an unpleasant taste and deprives it of some nutrition, according to Dr. D. V. Josephson, head of animal husbandry at Pennsylvania State College. He told dairymen there that flavor, rather than nutritional value, is milk's best selling point.

SIZZLING SUN IS BIG THREAT — HOME GARDENERS PLAGUED BY WEATHER; RAIN IS NEEDED

The weather—always a favorite topic of conversation—is plaguing home gardeners. A month ago it was too wet in parts of the state and too dry in others and right now it's the dry and hot side all over. The yields and quality of garden vegetables will both be cut, says J. E. Hutchinson, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, unless steps are taken to offset the adverse growing conditions.

Keep down weeds and grass that compete with the vegetables for vital moisture and plant food, says the specialist. Cultivate just deep enough to get the weeds and break the surface crust. Cultivation when properly done, leaves the soil in a loose friable condition so that air and moisture from either rain or irrigation can penetrate.

Deep cultivation, explains Hutchinson, disturbs and may even destroy the roots of shallow rooted vegetables such as squash, cucumber, cantaloupes and sweet corn.

A good mulch of organic materials will help conserve moisture that is in the soil and will also help control weeds and grass and lower the soil temperature.

Most garden soils need about an inch of water per week to keep the vegetables coming to the family table. If this amount of moisture is not forthcoming as rain, then supplemental irrigation should be used, advises Hutchinson. He says it takes about 20 minutes of average flow from a common garden hose to apply an inch of

water to 100 square feet and that one good soaking every 7 to 10 days is much better than frequent light sprinklings.

And finally, he says, if insects are causing trouble, get them early for if allowed to multiply, they'll soon take the garden.

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TEXAS POLIO CASES DOWN DURING WEEK

Texas polio pulled a surprise last week.

Despite the state's severe heat, the dread disease tumbled to 46 new cases, 16 under the week previous, the State Health Department reported today.

Ordinarily, polio runs wild in prolonged hot weather. At this time a year ago it had already begun its record smashing pace that eventually led to the worst polio year in the state's history.

This year's total cases rose to 392, less than half the year-ago figure for the comparable period.

Twenty-six counties reported the new cases. For eight counties it was their first incidence this year.

Meanwhile, 21,040 cubic centimeters of gamma globulin had been distributed in Texas through June 16 to aid the battle against the disease. The blood fraction, which contains antibodies against all three known types of polio, is distributed free to city and county health officers.

Mrs. Vickers Is Injured in Fall

Mrs. W. C. Vickers of 611 S. Seaman, Eastland, sustained serious shocks and bruises when she fell from her front porch late Wednesday afternoon. She fell clear of the porch, but landed on her right side on the concrete walk.

After receiving treatment from a physician, it was learned that she was suffering from shock, bruises and a dislocated right wrist. She is resting as well as can be expected today at her home.

SOME EASTLAND STORES WILL CLOSE, OTHERS REMAIN OPEN ON INDEPENDENCE DAY, JULY 4

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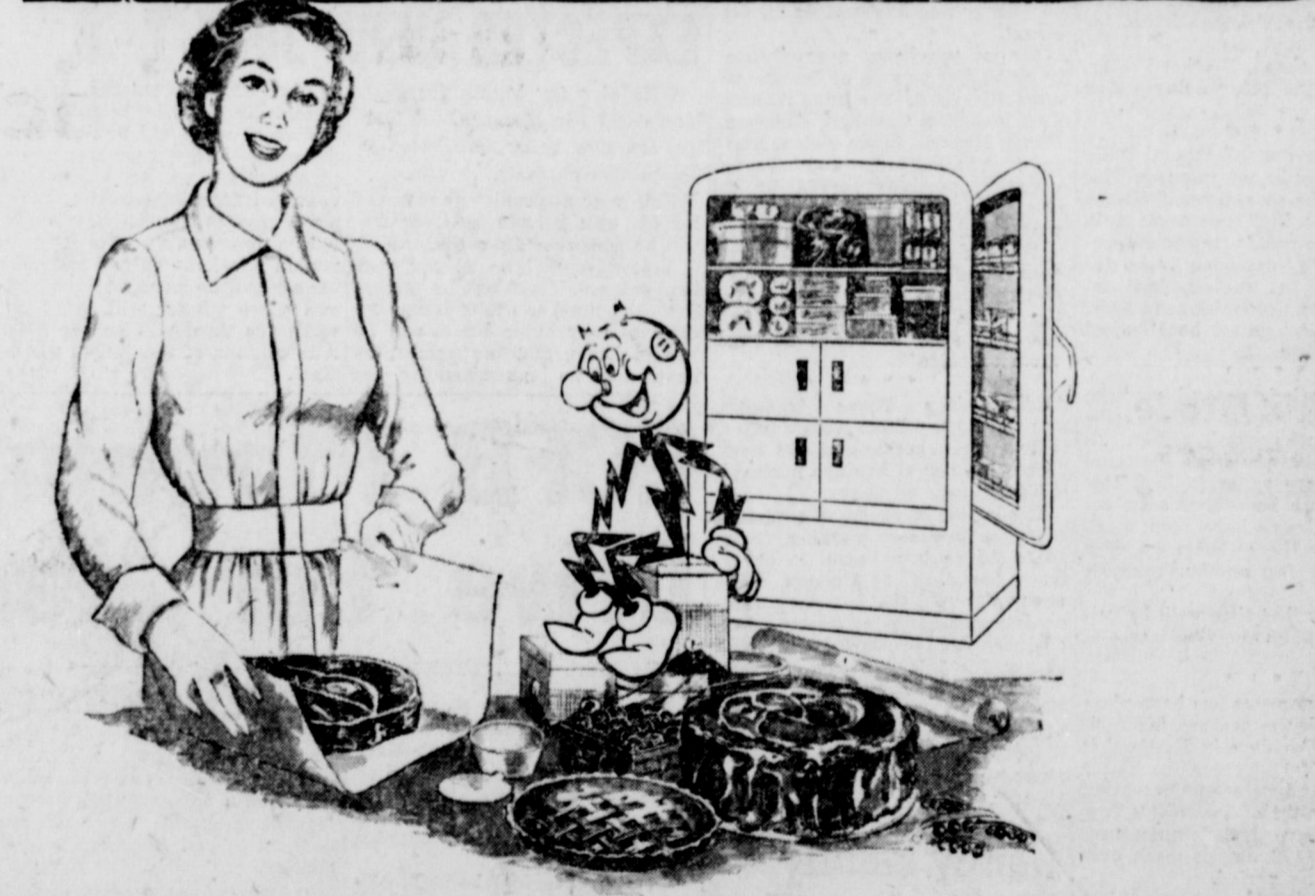

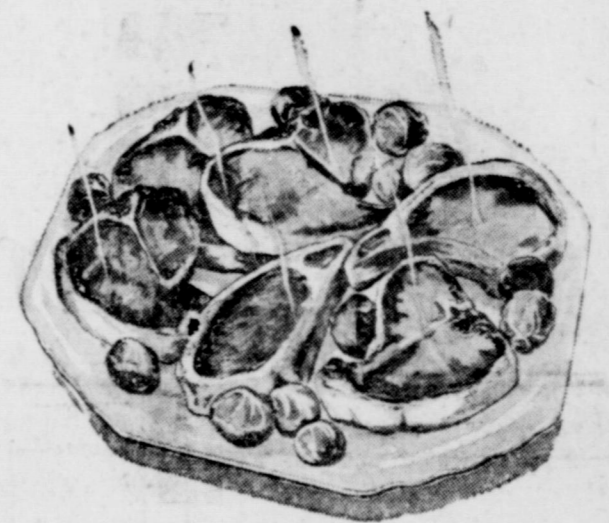

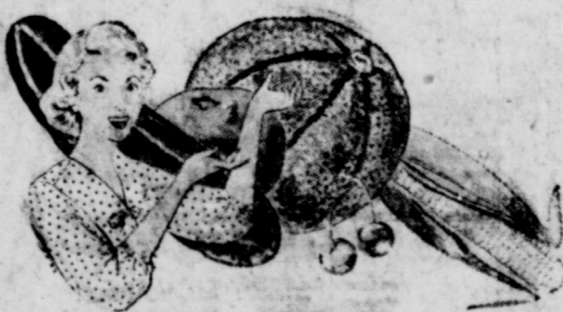

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Spiritual Understanding in Day By Day Living Convention Theme

The practical value of spiritual understanding in daily life was the keynote as more than 7,500 Christian Scientists from throughout the world met recently for the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

A special message from The Christian Science Board of Directors told the gathering that materialism not only is being challenged, but is yielding increasingly, to the impact of spiritual enlightenment.

Bearing witness to this were incidents of Christian Science healing read at the meeting which included total recovery from a severe case of poliomyelitis, abdominal cancer, rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart diagnosed as incurable, dislocated hips thought beyond recovery, and accident injuries pronounced fatal.

Through prayerful living of pure Christianity, the Directors said, "painless progress can be made by the individual and by humanity as a whole."

Named President of The Mother Church for the coming year was Mrs. F. Cudworth of Boston, a Christian Science practitioner

active in the healing work of the denomination for almost 50 years. Her term of office is for one year.

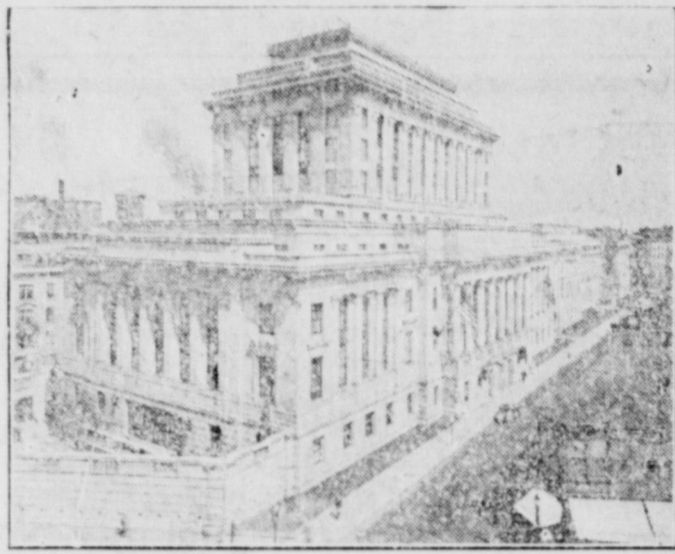
The inseparability of Christianity and healing was emphasized by Mrs. Cudworth, who said: "The true nature of church becomes evident in our experience through our understanding and demonstration of the healing power" of pure Christianity.

Reports on the world-wide activities of the denomination, which has branches throughout the United States and in some 40 other countries, were made by key officials.

Expenditure of approximately one million dollars for charitable purposes during the year was reported by Roy Garrett, Watson, Treasurer. He added that individual Christian Scientists voluntarily contributed more than \$70,000 for flood relief in Europe, and that The Mother Church received over one million dollars in gifts from members and friends.

Strengthening of the denomination's work with young people was reported in several fields. Establishment of a Division of College Organization Activities was announced by Theodore E. Metzner, Manager, Department of Branches and Practitioners. The new division is headed by a former Christian Science Navy chaplain, Joseph G. Heard of Miami, Fla.

The Camp Welfare Department announced the opening of a British branch to serve Christian Scientists stationed with the armed forces in Hong Kong, Malaya, Singapore, Egypt, Gibraltar, and other points. More than 400 civilian workers are ministering to hos-

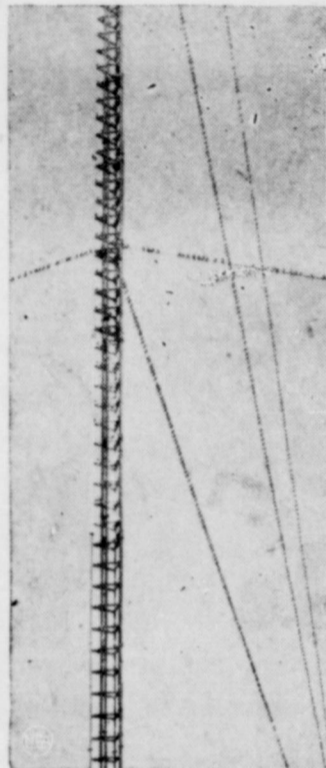

Officials announced that 34 new branches of The Mother Church were established during the year. They included branches in Casablanca, Morocco; Apeldoorn, the Netherlands; and several in Germany. Christian Science lecturers toured many parts of the world, including Korea.

New translations of certain of the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science into Swedish, Dutch, Greek, and Russian, were announced by the Trustees under her will, who reported a year of "outstanding activity."

Aviation Cadets Being Selected; Early Assignment

An Aviation Cadet Selection Team equipped to interview and partially process prospective applicants for flying training in the Air Force has been established at Hensley Field, Grand Prairie, Texas, under supervision of Headquarters, 3502D Personnel Processing Squadron (AC-OC), Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas.

According to team president Captain Richard K. Cope, the team supplied with the most current and factual flying training information will visit colleges, universities, Air Bases and cities in a wide area around Fort Worth.

Aviation Cadets are trained to become pilots or aircraft observers. An aircraft observer is schooled in an aircrew specialty such as bombardment, navigation, radar or aircraft performance engineering.

Upon completion of approximately one year of training, an aviation cadet (pilot or observer) receives his silver wings and a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force Reserve.

To qualify for Aviation Cadet Training, an applicant must have a minimum of two years of college credits; be between 19 and 26½ years of age, single, in good physical condition and be able to pass mental and physical tests. Pilot applicants must have normal 20-20 vision, while aircrew observer candidates need only have 20-50 vision correctable with glasses to the normal 20-20.

Young men applying now for observer training can expect assignment within six weeks after they successfully complete the qualifying tests.

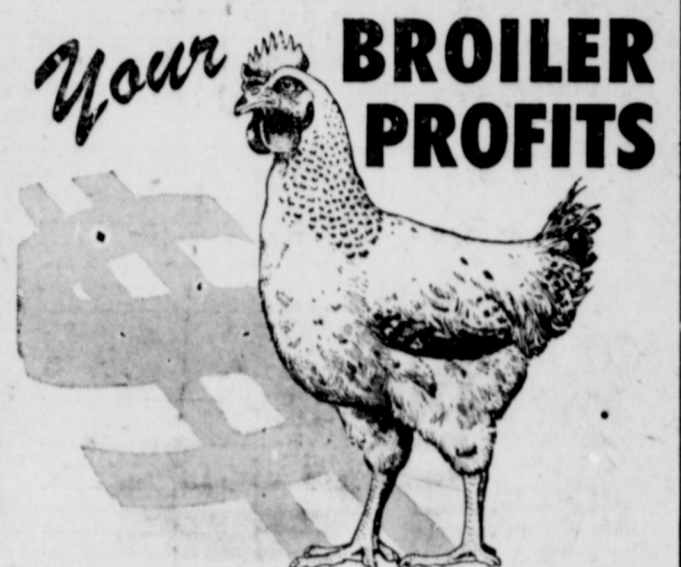
He cited them in a talk to the Government Economy Committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States as the kind of tangible proof being turned up by his investigators to show that the federal budget can be cut and the way paved for a reduction in personal income taxes.

Taber estimated savings of \$7 to \$8 billion can be made in the \$78.6 billion budget of the last administration while an additional \$2 to \$3 billion can be picked up in refunds through liquidation of

government loan agencies such as the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The chairman foresaw a balanced budget in the fiscal year beginning July 1. He said this would clear the way for enactment of the Reed Bill which would eliminate the 11 percent Korean increases in personal income tax rates as of June 30.



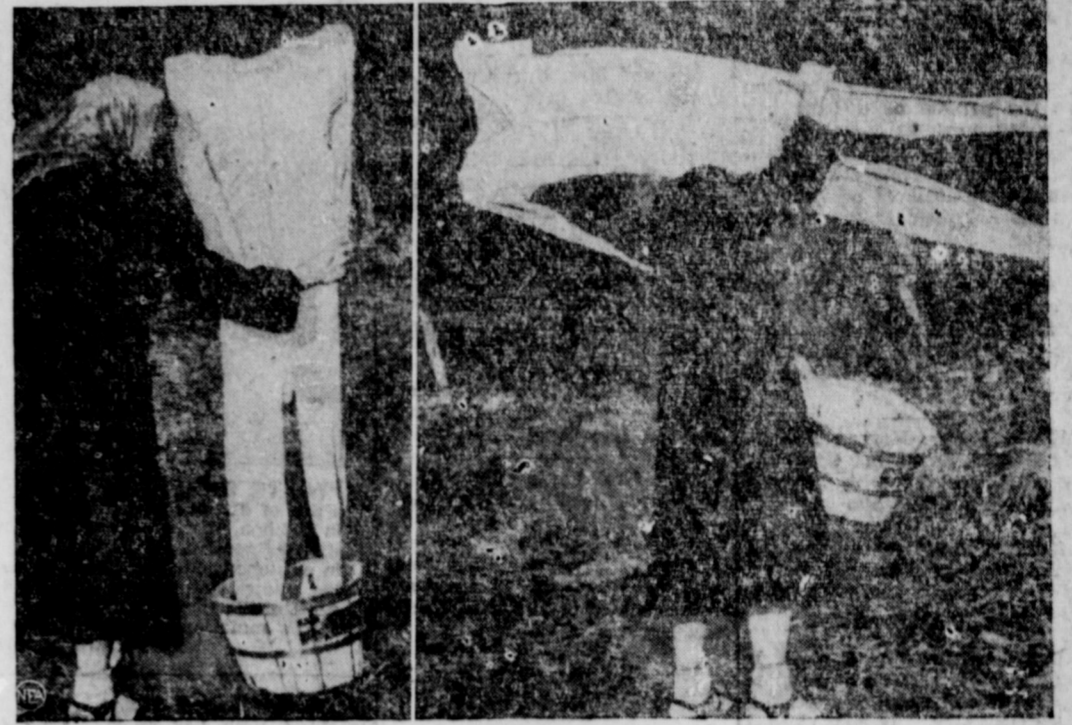

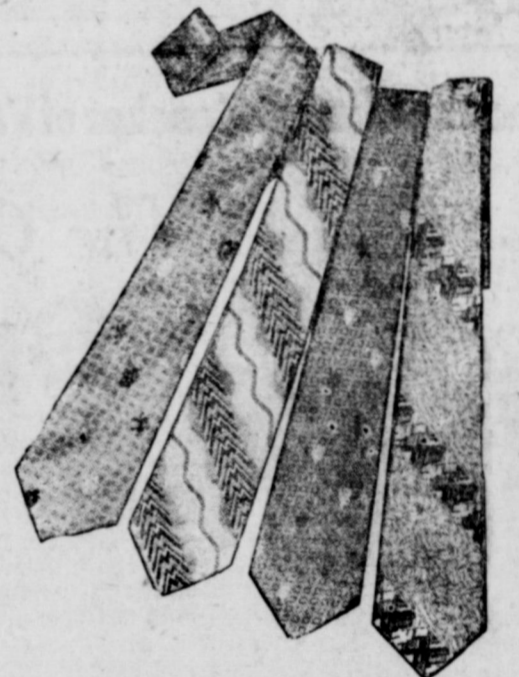
