## County Asked To Have 'Day' When Waco Fair Starts

Eastland has been invited to have a special day at the Heart 'O Texas Fair in Waco, Sept. 26 through Oct. 4. The invitation from Texas' newest exposition was extended by Pat Taggart, president, and M. D. Corbin, executive vice president, who urged this city to name a sponsor and bring the high school band with the delegation.

Corbin's letter stated, "The Heart 'O Texas Fair is designed primarily to serve as a showpiece for the agricultural and livestock industries of this great section of Texas and to foster these industries. This is, therefore, your fair and it needs the help of your city and county if it is to succeed."

"The Heart 'O Texas Fair will be truly, we believe, a major exposition. The center will be the brand-new \$1,000,000 McLennan County Coliseum, second largest in Texas. The fair will include beef cattle, dairy cattle, junior show, Quarter horse show, women's department, girls' department, Midway and many exhibits—agricultural, commercial, educational and entertaining—and a big-time rodeo."

## SUN PARCHES TEXAS CROPS

Sun, hot winds and continued drought threatened more disaster on Texas crops last week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported today.

Feed crops, cotton and pastures deteriorated in all areas. Farmers and ranchers flooded central markets and auctions with cattle and calves as hopes for summer grass faded.

Corn prospects shrunk further in Central, North and East Texas. Some was cut for fodder or silage to salvage as much feed as possible. Late plantings needed rain badly.

Severe cotton damage was reported in South Texas. Many Lower Valley fields were being picked only once. Fairly good progress was noted in Central Northern and Eastern areas but more rain was needed.

Most commercial vegetable areas needed moisture badly. High temperatures and hot winds hurt growing crops and lowered yields. Tomato yields in major East Texas areas were further reduced and prospects in the Avery section were quite uncertain.

Stock was showing considerable shrinkage as the high temperatures forced cattle to hunt shade instead of grass. Supplemental feeding was increasing, USDA said.

## Mercury To Top 100 Mark Today And Tomorrow

Eastland Countians can look for more sweltering 100-degree or better weather for the remainder of this week.

That was the outlook today, according to a forecast issued by the U. S. Weather Bureau.

Generally, fair and hot weather was predicted for Eastland County and vicinity today and Friday with the maximum mercury readings for both days slated at 100 or above.

Tonight's low—a warmish 80 degrees.

For North Central and West Texas—Generally fair today and Friday. Not much change in temperature.

## POLIO HITS 65 IN WEEK; STILL UNDER '52 RECORD

Polio struck 65 new victims in Texas last week but the State Health Department again noted that the outbreak is "much lighter" than last year's record epidemic.

So far this year, 447 cases have been recorded by health officials. This compares with 917 at this time in 1952.

Harris County has been hardest hit in 1953 with 52 cases, followed by Cameron with 51, Nueces with 39 and Dallas with 33. These are the only counties with more than 20 cases for the year.

Twenty-eight counties reported polio last week, 12 of them for the first time this year.

Kendall County, reporting for the first time, had five cases. Other "new" counties were Gray, with two; Brooks, Calhoun, Freestone, Jones, Lavaca, Motley, Potter, San Jacinto, Terry and Tom Green, with one each.

Cases were also reported by Harris, 14; Nueces, 7; Dallas, 6; Cameron and Victoria, 3 each; Robertson, Jefferson, Hidalgo and McLennan, 2 each, and Comanche, Delta, El Paso, Galveston, Jackson, Orange, San Patricio, one each.

## Big Game Meet Set For July 17

Mounting interest in the fall wildlife harvest, as indicated by letters of inquiry, caused the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission to announce that nothing will be decided until the July 17 meeting of the Commission in Houston.

He said recommendations then will be made on the waterfowl season and on possible shooting in the Panhandle, West of the Pecos and other areas over which the Commission has regulatory authority. The Executive Secretary noted that some Panhandle residents have requested a short open season on Chinese ring-necked pheasants as well as on antelope.

The Executive Secretary asked Texans to withhold their inquiries until after the July 17 meeting.

## FEAR TALK From Country Gentleman June, 1953

You have probably wondered how much truth there is in the "fear" talk that is going around. It is causing some uneasiness about the kind of times that may be ahead.

One reads predictions that business will slump in the next year or so as the stimulus of inflation plays out. And when prospects brightened for a truce in Korea we began to hear about the dangers of peace and how it would pull the prop of defense spending out from under the economy.

Knowing how this talk concerns farmers, Country Gentleman has sought to find out what basis there is for it.

The facts show little grounds for these fears. You can expect readjustments but no depression. Peace, if happily it does come, should be regarded as a door to opportunity and not a calamity.

First of all, what has happened so far in Korea and elsewhere does not assure peace. So you can look for the defense program to go on. Savings will be made in it, but the outlays for this year will run as large as in 1952 and will continue high as far ahead as anybody can see now.

Neither can inflation be halted abruptly. Instead the Administration is taking steps to taper it off gradually, thus averting any boom bust cycle. What it is aiming at is a reasonably balanced condition, with wages, earnings and prices high enough to provide the buying power needed to absorb production. Monetary, tax and other policies will be applied when and if needed to bring this about.

A better-balanced condition of that kind would certainly work to the long-run benefit of farmers. If peace should eventually be achieved it will not find us unprepared. It would bring the opportunity to do a number of things that need to be done and to open up some new frontiers. The Administration has been quietly weighing measures that would serve as useful offsets and putting them on the shelf for the time when they may be needed.

One is the modernizing of our highway system, now years behind the requirements. It is estimated that 60 billion dollars could be well spent for this purpose over a five to ten-year time. Bringing our schools up to the needs of the increased birth rate since 1940 would take at least 6 billion. Hospital facilities, now badly lacking in many areas, would call for a billion or so more.

But this is only a catching-up process. The resources of our river basins comprise our last great natural frontier. Their conservation and development would open up new opportunities for both agriculture and industry. This is also on the shelf.

There are other waiting frontiers also. As one well-informed man remarked: "We have been giving so much of our energy and attention to war since 1941 that we don't know the peacetime limits of the world we're now living in. The laboratories have revealed dozens of secrets that we might draw upon. We have little idea, for instance, of what atomic energy will mean once we begin harnessing it to civilian uses. The next ten years could be as revolutionary in advances as any in our history."

## Marriages Go On Rocks; Divorces Growing Popular

Marriage is a holy ordinance whether you have ever considered it in this light or not. Ordained and established in the Garden of Eden by the Creator Himself, when he created Eve as a helpmate for Adam.

This was the work of God, though indications at this time are that the plan has not worked too successfully.

Did you know that almost one out of every three marriages end in divorce? Proprietary, you may exclaim! Well, it's a fact nevertheless, and you do not have to leave Eastland county to find out how true the statement is.

During the past year, according to records on file in the County Clerks office, 185 marriage licenses were issued, and so far as is known an equal number of weddings followed. A pretty fair record at that.

But then consider the number of divorces granted. During 1952 no less than 131 divorces suits were filed in this county, and 80 of the number were tried and divorces, so far as we were able to ascertain, were granted. Twenty of the cases were never prosecuted. Whether the sparring parties kissed and made up, whether they died or moved away, we do not know, but 20 cases were dismissed for one cause or another.

Conditions are better today than they were a few years ago. Divorces are more numerous immediately following a war, it seems. If the old boy happens to live through the struggle and makes it back home, he may learn that his wife doesn't want a husband at all—just a monthly check, and now that the "check days" are over, why be worried with a husband? Of course this does not apply in all cases, but statistics indicate that it did apply to many of them.

Lets look back a few years. In 1946 there were 265 divorce cases filed in Eastland County. Two hundred and one were tried and 48 dismissed. In 1947 the figures were 175 filed, 148 tried and 18 dismissed. Little improvement was shown in 1948 if it seems there were 144 cases filed, 108 tried, and 18 dismissed. In 1949 there were 132 cases filed, 116 tried and 7 dismissed, while in 1950 there were only 118 cases filed, 96 tried and 9 dismissed.

It must be noted however, there were more people in the county at that time than there are now, and more marriage licenses were sold. Yet the ratio is about the same.

Indications are that when 1953 passes into history, it will show that for each three weddings at least one will go on the rocks.

## Texans Warned On Gun Danger

The first fatality of the 1953 game harvest prompted the Chief Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission to remind Texans of the hazards afield.

According to Game Warden M. S. Dry of Eastland, the victim was a 37-year-old Ranger woman, who was shot while squirrel hunting. His information was that she was with another woman and the latter's sons, age seven and ten.

Dry's report stated they were maneuvering to shoot at a squirrel. It kept moving around a tree. Finally, one of the women handed a .22 rifle to the ten-year-old boy. In releasing the safety, the lad accidentally discharged the gun. The bullet killed the woman instantly.

Game wardens are helping the Commission maintain a record of the hunting toll in the hope that publicity of the tragedies will help make Texans more safety conscious.

## Warns Against Summer Threat Of Common Ill

Commenting on the unusually high incidence of dysentery in Texas at the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen, and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation of the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain throughout the abdomen and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucus. Toxemia results from absorption of the poisonous substances produced by the germs.

"The germs gain entrance to the body through the mouth," Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth, and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infected and produce their harmful effects."

Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more often, and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; however, he said it may occur at any age. It is usually more prevalent during the summer season, and the great number of cases now being reported are unusual for spring.

"The germ is always expelled with the excreta of persons sick with dysentery and may continue to be expelled for some time after the patient recovers from the disease. These persons who still discharge the germs after they recover are called carriers, and the occur more frequently in this disease than in the majority of other infectious diseases.

"Food protection and adequate sanitary measures are more urgently needed now than ever before if we control the potential possibilities of epidemic dysentery in the State."

## Postal Rates May Be Hiked In Near Future

Eastland Countians and other Americans in the nation face the prospect for higher postage rates in the future.

A proposal to boost postal rates generally is "a probability" for action during this session of Congress in Washington, according to legislative leaders. And though opposition is anticipated on both sides of the Capitol, observers predict higher rates finally will be approved.

Postmaster General Arthur A. Summerfield now is working out final details of the administration bill.

Although definite details haven't yet been released, it is expected that ordinary letters will require four-cent stamps — at least, those going out-of-town. Out-of-town letters have been frozen at three cents for nearly 21 years, while rates on local letters went up from two to three cents in 1944. Air mail rates would be raised from six to seven cents.

A four-cent charge for out-of-town letters would bring in an extra \$150 million a year, while the same rate for local letters would add another \$70 million.

Rates on newspapers, magazines and other second-class mail have been boosted 20 per cent in the last 14 months, but still don't cover transportation costs, Postmaster General Summerfield said. Another 10 per cent boost in these rates already is scheduled for next April.

Third class rates, on circulars, books and catalogs, have increased 25 per cent since 1949.

Postal deficits are running around \$600 million a year. The administration already has made three moves to cut the figure, but "they aren't enough," a department spokesman said.

## Federal Jobs Show Another Drop On June 1

Federal employment dropped below the 2,500,000 mark on June 1 for the first time since July 1951, and is expected to show another drop for this month.

The Civil Service Commission said it does not have a tabulation of dismissal notices effective by June 30, but they are known to number several thousand.

The notices were issued in anticipation of cuts in funds for the year starting July 1. Some may be rescinded but a net reduction in personnel is anticipated.

The commission reported Tuesday that civilian government employment dropped 23,500 during May, the largest monthly decrease since June 1950.

The preliminary total for federal employes on June 1 was put at 2,483,100, down 73,382 from the total of 2,556,482 on Feb. 1. This was a reduction of about 8 per cent.

The Eisenhower administration announced early in February that federal agencies had been directed to hold down on all employment as an economy move. However, civilian service statistics show the downward trend has been under way since last July.
