We are told that "Charity Beareth All Things," and the more we see of Christian activities the more fully we are convinced that this is true. Generally speaking this statement actually means that "Love Beareth all Things" and during our life we have seen this demonstrated many times. When everything else fails, Love enters as a conquerer. Paul tells us in Romans 12:18

that "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peacably with A very simple suggesbut there is no end to its ac-tual meaning. If you have love in your heart to the extent of loving your neighbor as yourself, you will live peacably with him, There will be no excuse for you to do otherwise, for we are told that love covereth all sins.

We are not capable of describing the limits of this duty, but it means most everything to the individual. Some people are more capable of loving their neighbors than others, yet we feel sure that when Christ gave us a new com-mandment He had this "greater in mind. In fact the two great Commandments are Love God, and Love Thy Neighbor, for upon these hang all the law of the phophets. Keep them and you will not wander from God. Love is the that binds, and it is impossible to love too greatly,

It may be added that we should strengthen this love and this may be accomplished if we live as close to God as is humanly possi-ble. You may do this through prayer, but your prayers must of necessity be of the effectual, fervent If your prayer means no than the bowing of your head and uttering a few words, and with most sentences beginning "gimme this or gimme that" you may not expect an answer. Very often the things you ask for are not needed at all. You merely think they are.

But when you pray, you must be humble and submissive. You will ask God, that if it can be His will, that you ask this or that bless-

If we can accept as truth the last sentence of the above paragraph, we will be learning about real love . We will not resent disappointment, and our lives will be fashioned in a manner that we will not offend others,

We may be called upon to give up, what we sometimes term, our own rights, but better this than to offend our neighbor, to say nothing about offending God, If our love is to remain pure and holy we may find it necessary to own passions that might cause constant watch against our

Yet we will gain in both grace and glory, far more than we were called upon to give up. Love works miracles, And the more you love the more capable you are to bring about these miracles. God performs them in answer to your

But when these things begin taking place, you will be so near the Lord, you will not be disturbed by trivial things of this earth.

But how are we to begin? First we would say let us have love in business relations, love that will make us went to be, honest and fair. We must be able to see own. Also there may be a possi-bility that he is correct—more so than you are. A love like this would end all our "dog eat dog"

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


