About two thirds of the 700 accidental drownings of preschool children each year in the United States occur among youngsters who are presumably safe at or near their home, statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company report. One year olds ac-count for almost 300 of all the drownings, a greater number than at any other single year of life.
