LIQUOR LAWS EXPLAINED BY MEMBER OF CONTROL BOARD

Perhaps it is not well understood that any citizen who violates the state liquor laws may be found guilty and punished.

For example, if a beer tavern operator serves his customers after legal closing time, he can be penalized—and the customers can, too.

Any person who consumes alcoholic beverages after hours in a public place can get into trouble. And a public place means not only a beer tavern or a cafe; it also means a public road, street, a park, a public building, a private club,

or any place other than a private residence.

The Legislature has granted the Texas Liquor Control Board wide authority, and discretion in its use, to close any establishment selling alcoholic beverages if evidence is shown at a hearing before the administrator that its manner of operation is against the law.

New liquor laws also emphasize that it is unlawful for any beer retailer to possess any narcotics or equipment for their use, or to permit any person on his premises to have such narcotics or equipment.

And under the law, gambling on the premises of a beer retailer is considered a violation as being against the public decency.

These changes are designed to permit agents of the Liquor Board

and all law enforcement officers to act decisively against undesirable retailing establishments.

Peace officers are concerned with enforcement in dry areas as well as in wet areas.

It is legal for a person who lives in a dry area to transport liquor from a wet area to his home for his own personal use.

If he is carrying more than a fifth of whiskey or a case of beer, however, he may be stopped by liquor board agents and questioned. It is then his responsibility to show that he is not transporting alcoholic beverages for sale.

We refer to transportation for sale in dry areas as bootlegging, and we are always after the bootleggers. We are also constantly on the alert for moonshiners, or persons who operate illicit stills.

A great number of persons are captured and punished, but the practices of moonshining and bootlegging have not been stamped out. In order to achieve that objective we need greater co-operation on the part of the public.

As long as there is a profit to be made in bootlegging and moonshining, some persons will risk the danger of arrest and punishment to make that profit.

What I am saying is this: enforcement is not the complete answer to observance of the liquor laws. It takes education too—education of the public as to what those laws are and why the citizens have their share of the responsibility of enforcing them.

It is the Legislature's duty to enact laws regulating alcoholic beverages. Recent changes have been made to tighten these laws.

datation of another name. Citizens then named it Desdemona in honor of Desdemona Wynn, the attractive daughter of a Hog Town Blacksmith. But during the boom days most people hereabouts referred to the town and oil field as Hogtown and Hogtown field.

"Immediately after the boom started here," Jones reminisced, "a visitor late at evening might see wagons unloading lumber on the side of the road. The next morning he would see a new house there with a family occupying it. That was the hurry and bustle of 1918."

Hundreds who worked here during the boom scattered to the four winds but return annually to renew friendships, to reminisce and to see their old haunts.

A newspaper survey covering 1,724 physicians revealed that 1,700 of them believe women should not wear shoes without stockings. Much of the increase in serious foot trouble among women, the doctors said, is due to the practice of going without stockings in summer.

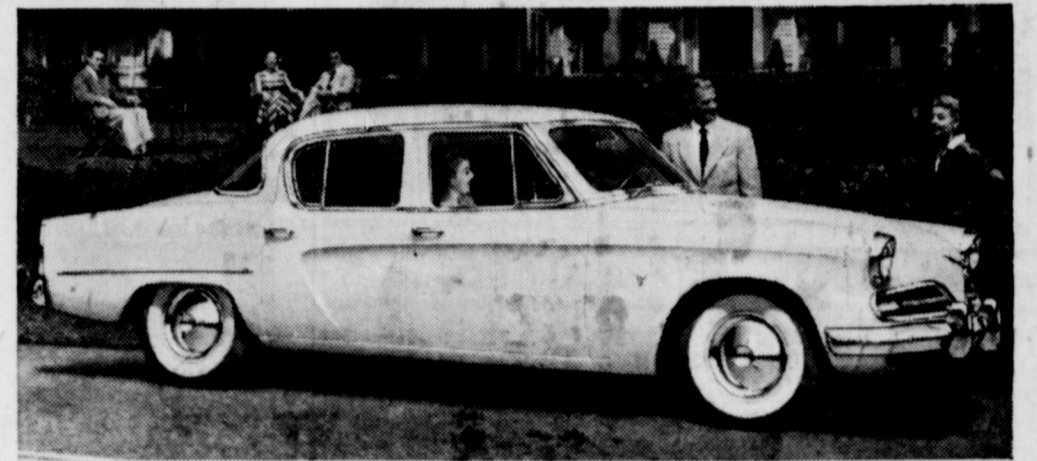

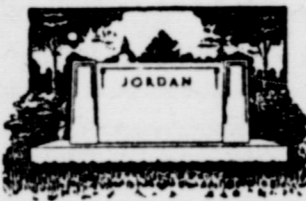

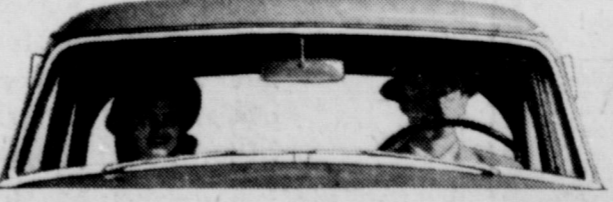

### New Name for Wildlife Area

Formal designation of the Wildlife Management Area in Anderson County as the Gus Engeling Wildlife Management Area probably will be made this fall.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said the occasion may coincide with completion of the headquarters buildings late in the year.

The area was given its new name by action of the Game and Fish Commission since Engeling was the first manager of the 9100 acre experimental and demonstration tract. Engeling was slain by an illegal hunter three years ago. He was unarmed and doing research work on the area at the time.

The management plot is being developed for wildlife generally. It has deer, wild turkey, quail, doves, squirrels and fur bearing animals.

The director said a gradual program now under way is designed to improve the quality and distribution of vegetation as well as timber stocks. Work in small, sam-

ple tracts is expected to guide future operations. A number of fenced plots are being used for a combination soil improvement work and seasonal aid for deer and turkey through supplementing deficiencies in natural feed at critical times.

Lake development is expected to improve the supply and distribution of surface water. This process is linked to a program calling for eleven small dams, two already completed.
