## **Doves' Diet Tips Hunter**

Texas hunters having trouble locating mourning dove targets were advised to watch for food and water areas used by the game birds.

The suggestion came from the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. He noted that north zone hunters who know their dove diet have been having much better luck than those blindly trusting to luck to locate the birds

He said doves are fond of weed seeds such as sunflower and croton. They also like grain such as maize

One handicap to the hunter since the rains came is that water is more accessible and thus the dove do not concentrate at tanks like they do in extremely dry weather. Some hunters, who dress their

birds crop and then plan their hunting trips accordingly.
