The West Texas Cattle Raisers' Association will stage its Annual Barbecue on Thursday night of this week, and the boys are looking for an extra large crowd.

We always keep our appetite whetted up for this occasion, whether we "ride a pass" or not. This year will not be an exception—we hope. Fact is we might join if we could afford a pair of boots.

It has been so hot in these parts we have turned our calendar back to August. No respectable September would issue 100 degree heat waves.

Most all this weather business is rather peculiar. It's hot when it should be cool, and cool when it should be hot. It rains at the wrong time and floods come almost unexpected. When we want rain it stays as dry as a powder house. No fooling—it is peculiar.

However, we insist that a cold winter is in prospect, and our clothes supply will not be equal to the occasion.

A great many people still seem to believe that it is possible to get all kind of handouts from the Federal Government, and still keep our freedom and independence.

They should ponder this sentence from a 1952 U. S. Supreme Court decision: "It is hardly lack of due process for the government to regulate that which it subsidizes." The court merely said, in Judicial language, that when Government pays the bills, it can call the tune to which we must all dance.

There are still too many people who are trying to get some kind of Government Aid, and it matters not what it is, so long as they feel they are getting something for nothing. This will never be true—it's like perpetual motion—just not in the stars.

The only way we have ever been able to get anything was to work for it. This we have done, and are satisfied. It did not tax our nerves half as much as worrying a n d scheming, and has paid off much better.

Whether you voted for Ike or not, you must admit that he made an honest effort to do the things he said he would do. His address before a public gathering of Republicans Monday evening, proves to us conclusively, that he is on the right road. He knows what America needs, and if humanly possible he plans to get these things. Within a period of only a few months, he has done more constructive work than his critics had done in as many years.

Poor, simple Harry, now talking about government by postponement! Why Ike has done more in eight months than Harry did during all his years in Washington. Harry postponed the Korean war settlement for more than two years—couldn't end it, he said. Ike stopped the murder of our boys in the matter of a very few months. Ike is a man of the .45 calibre. Harry a .22 calibre blank. Russia respects Eisenhower, simply because they fear him, while they paid no more attention to Harry than they did to ordinary gnat. But let's forget about Harry—he's supposed to be politically dead anyway.

## Doves' Diet Tips Hunter

Texas hunters having trouble locating mourning dove targets were advised to watch for food and water areas used by the game birds.

The suggestion came from the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. He noted that north zone hunters who know their dove diet have been having much better luck than those blindly trusting to luck to locate the birds.

He said doves are fond of weed seeds such as sunflower and cotton. They also like grain such as maize.

One handicap to the hunter since the rains came is that water is more accessible and thus the doves do not concentrate at tanks like they do in extremely dry weather.

Some hunters, who dress their own game, study contents of the birds' crop and then plan their hunting trips accordingly.

## Mavericks To Tackle Bearcats At De Leon

### Welfare Worker Guest of Lions At Tuesday Meet

Attendance at the Lions Club was exceptionally good Tuesday, and several visitors were present. It was N. P. McCarney's program, but he selected Mrs. Carl Elliott to bring the message. Mrs. Elliott is with the State Department of Public Welfare, and is well versed in the subjects she discussed.

As a matter of fact the department's work in two divisions—adult and child welfare and it was the latter she discussed.

Her territory includes 48 counties, and most of the activities are in the larger cities, she said. Workers are not ashamed of their work she said, but on the otherhand are really thrilled.

Her works takes her into private homes where child neglect has been reported, but also into hospitals and other institutions. Especially is she interested in various types of "Homes for Children". Time was when children really suffered in some of the homes, but strict supervision is changing this picture.

Many children are neglected through ignorance—people in charge just don't know. Even the baby sitter must know a few things if he or she succeeds in this work.

She told of one instance where a baby was taken to a home, and left by her mother. The baby was filthy and diseased, but the mother had taken care to give a fictitious name and address. A doctor was called and the child taken to a hospital where it was put under quarantine. Eight months later the mother was located.

Mrs. Elliott gave some good first-hand information and her address was appreciated.

Geo. I. Lane, a visitor, gave a short talk and announced the sale of tickets to Thursday's barbecue. He took in some cash, as usual.

As a whole the meeting was good.

## New Laundry Is Now Open

Erection of Eastland's new laundry has been completed and A. B. Jacob, owner and manager says he is now ready for business. In fact a few people have already begun calling 174, and sending out their bundles.

The laundry, known as the White Star Laundry, is modern in every respect, and the people of Eastland may get first class laundry service right here at home. Mr. Jacob announces a number of regular and special services, and is in position to give any type service given by other steam laundries over the state.

Trucks will be used to pick up and deliver bundles.

Employees at the laundry are all Eastland residents, which means an increase in the city payroll.

Eastland's Mavericks are to meet the De Leon Bearcats in De Leon Friday night, and many Eastland fans are expected to be on hand for the game.

So far the Mavericks have been making themselves felt. They took their first game of the year from Cisco, with a score of 7-0, and held their own with the Coleman squad, who really was not in their class at all. The score was 14-7 in favor of Coleman, and Eastland people feel that the boys really showed their strength.

Coach Hooker's boys are all in good shape and may be expected to bring home the bacon when they meet the Bearcats.

### Snakes Roam In Fall Air

Snake lover or not, Texans may count on seeing a good reptile display for the next few weeks.

In fact, according to the Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission who doubles in herpetology, the big fall parade is already underway.

This is reflected in phone calls and letters to the Commission about identifying various species. The Chief Aquatic Biologist said snakes do most of their daytime traveling during spring and fall because of moderate temperatures. He pointed out that snakes are very sensitive to weather extremes and are usually inactive during the heat of the summer days and during cold weather.

He cautioned Texans to be on the lookout for the four poisonous snakes in the Lone Star State—rattlesnake, copperhead, coral snake and cotton mouth moccasin.

Fish flour has been considered as a possible substitute for milk in countries where cows are scarce, reports the National Geographic Society. Odorless and tasteless when properly prepared, it can be used in biscuits, soups or mixed corn meal.

### Hybrid Corn Is Sure Producer

Corn producers who enrolled last spring in the Texas Hybrid Corn Production program are reminded by Extension Agronomist W. B. Coke that the time has arrived for reporting results.

He points out that early reports from over the state indicate that yields probably will not equal the records set in previous years due to the dry weather which hit at a critical time in the growing period of the corn plant. On the other hand, he says, the reports no doubt will reflect the value of good seed, soil preparation, fertilizer, cultural methods and crop rotation as aids for keeping production high during drought periods. He encourages producers to complete their report forms and pass them on to the local county agent for transmittal to the state office.

Final date for submitting county records for area and state final is Oct. 15. The state committee will soon after this date name the 1953 winners.

The safety jacket is modeled after hospital restraining jackets, but it is more comfortable. It is sleeveless and buttons down the front. Attached at both sides of the waist of the jacket are two strings long enough for tying to crib sides, the back legs of a high chair, or the metal frame of a baby carriage.

Weathermen said it would be generally fair today and Thursday — cooler at nights, but hotter in the afternoons. Top mercury readings, about 95 degrees each day. Just about five degrees below summer's sweltering 100 level.

Cool tonight and Thursday nite — in the upper 50s.

Clear to partly cloudy was forecast for North Central Texas for Wednesday and Thursday with no important changes in temperature.

And for West Texas: Clear to partly cloudy today and tomorrow. No important changes in temperature.

Production was on pump from an open hole at 1,090-1,127 feet. Location of the new producer is three miles northwest of Rising Star in Section 26, Block 2.

No. 3 will be 480 feet from north and 150 feet from west lines of Section 26.

Both are slated for 1,200 feet. A new completion and two locations for additional stabs in the Rising Star area of Eastland County were announced this morning.

Breeding & Tyler of Rising Star have completed their No. 1 G. A. Dunn for a daily gauge of 73.12 barrels of 40 gravity oil and 25 per cent water.

## Telegram To Be Published On Tuesdays, Thursdays

The Eastland Telegram, serving Eastland, Eastland County and the surrounding area, will be published semi-weekly—on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons—effective Thursday, Oct. 1, O. H. Dick and Joe Dennis, publishers, announced today.

The change from daily—five days a week—publication to the new two issues weekly schedule is being made to counteract increasing production costs, and, more important, to offer readers and advertisers a bigger and better newspaper, the publishers pointed out in making their formal announcement this morning.

The Telegram will continue to be delivered by carriers. The new, larger newspaper will be distributed to city subscribers every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon. The new subscription price for city delivery—only 10 cents per week.

Out-of-city subscribers will continue to receive The Telegram by mail. The new mail subscription rate will be \$2.50 yearly, payable in advance.

On the basis of retail business

volume and population, Eastland is no longer a daily publishing field such as it was for many years during and following the fabulous oil boom of three decades ago. Despite this fact, however, the publishers continued daily production as a public service, forsaking profit for the benefit of their readers and the general welfare of the community.

However, the increasing pressure of mounting production costs in recent years has made daily publication more and more difficult. In addition, there is a shortage of highly skilled labor in the printing and publishing industry.

The change to semi-weekly has been in planning during the past year, he publishers said.

"We investigated fully and gave the matter our most grave consideration for several months prior to coming to a decision," Dick said.

"And now, in doing so, we feel that our newer and larger paper— to feature an even greater abundance of local news and features than ever before— will be even more deeply appreciated by our

readers and our advertisers." Whereas daily publication accentuated much area, state and national news also published in larger dailies widely distributed in Eastland, the new semi-weekly Telegram will feature local and county news.

"We are proud that we will be able to offer our readers and advertisers a much-improved newspaper after October 1," Dick said, "and we wish to express our appreciation to our many friends and patrons for their valued support and goodwill down through the years."

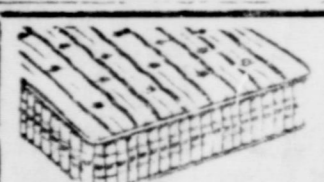

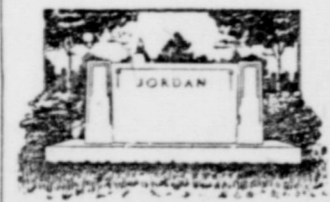

### Reds Change Buying Methods

HO GEONG — Communist China's purchasing agents are more choosy in the buying of supplies from abroad following the Korean truce. Red authorities issued orders surrounding purchases of materials, the sources said here. They still want imports of strategic items but can now afford to be more leisurely in the prices paid.

At the same time they were lowering the boom on private importers at mainland ports, "suggesting" that they resist in industry. If there is going to be continued "intermediate" exploitation, the state trade organization is going to do it according to reports that say the squeeze is being tightened on individual importers. They are finding it harder to get import licenses from the government.

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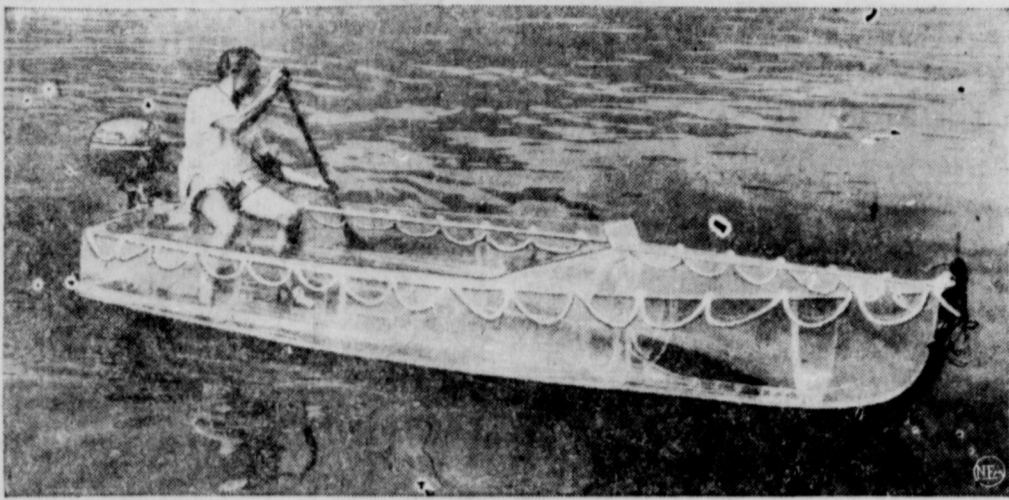
