Bailey County Commissioners Court will meet in Special Session at 10 a.m. on Friday, July 21.

After approval of minutes and payment of routine county bills, commissioners will authorize County Judge to advertise for bids for a truck for Precinct Four; consider a budget amendment to FY1989 Budget; and consider miscellaneous items.

FIVE YEAR OLD DIES IN LAZBUDDIE ACCIDENT--Around 3:22 p.m. Friday, the Bailey County Ambulance Service was notified of an accident at Lazbuddie. The large ambulance responded and found two victims from the one-vehicle rollover. Paramedics and EMTs worked frantically to resuscitate five year old Jennifer Thiele. Carelink helicopter was notified almost immediately to respond to West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe, and a second ambulance from Muleshoe was called to the scene at 3:43 p.m. With both Muleshoe's ambulances called to the site three miles east and two miles north of Clay's Corner, the Sudan ambulance was summoned to Muleshoe to cover the city while the emergency was underway. All efforts failed to resuscitate the youngster, and she was dead on arrival at WPMC. Services are pending for her at Ellis Funeral Home. She was a passenger in a vehicle driven by her guardian, Evelyn Moore, who is hospitalized at WPMC. Lazbuddie Fire Department and EMTs were first on the scene of the accident. (Journal Photo)

Affiliation Agreement

Signed With Methodist

During their meeting on Wednesday, the Muleshoe Area Hospital District board considered several items on the agenda.

One of the items concerned operations of the Bailey County Ambulance Service.

With more than 20 people present, Bailey County Judge Jim Watson approached the hospital district about taking over operations of the Bailey County Ambulance Service.

He said County Commissioners were working on the 1989-90 budget, and due to a large budget deficit said the county could not afford to continue operations of the ambulance, and were considering several options, including the possibility of leasing the ambulance service to an outside ambulance service.

Judge Watson indicated that the level of service offered by the Bailey County Ambulance Service will be affected as of October 1, 1989, when the county's new fiscal year begins.

On being informed the hospital district currently has '0' funds to operate anything, John Chisholm administrator of West Plains Medical Center, said he had been discussing future ambulance service with Judge Watson. He said the hospital is willing to take over management of the ambulance service.

Richelle Watkins, current director of the ambulance service, has resigned, effective July 30, and will return to nursing at West Plains Medical Center.

Further discussion on the future of the ambulance service is anticipated at the Wednesday, July 19, meeting of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District board. They will meet at 8 p.m. in the Muleshoe City Council Chambers at the city hall.

Chisholm said he had been notified that South Plains Hospital in Amherst will permanently close their doors at 5 p.m. on Friday, July 14.

This was an indicator that the local ambulance service would be

playing a much bigger role in providing emergency transportation in the area, especially to the east and northeast.

Police Chief

At Bovina

Shot In Face

In what started out as a routine traffic stop in Bovina resulted in Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman ending up shot in the face, and officers converging on Bovina to try to apprehend a suspect.

Shortly before 11:30 p.m. on Thursday, Chief Coleman radioed for assistance, saying he had been shot.

Responding officers found Chief Coleman had been shot in the nostril, with the bullet lodging in his neck near his spine.

The chief told officers he had shot the suspect, who fled the scene of the shooting on foot.

More than 25 officers and reserve officers converged on Bovina from surrounding cities and counties, and from New Mexico. Clovis sent a K-9 dog and handler to help track the suspect.

Around 3:15 a.m., the suspect, identified as a 24-year old former resident of Missouri, on top of a building "a couple of buildings down" from the Bovina City Hall.

Bailey County Deputy Sheriff, who went to Bovina to assist the officers, said the suspect had a bullet wound in his upper right leg when found.

Investigating officers found stolen Missouri license tags on the vehicle driven by the suspect and were attempting to trace down the ownership of the vehicle involved.

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams was unable to be contacted Friday morning, as he

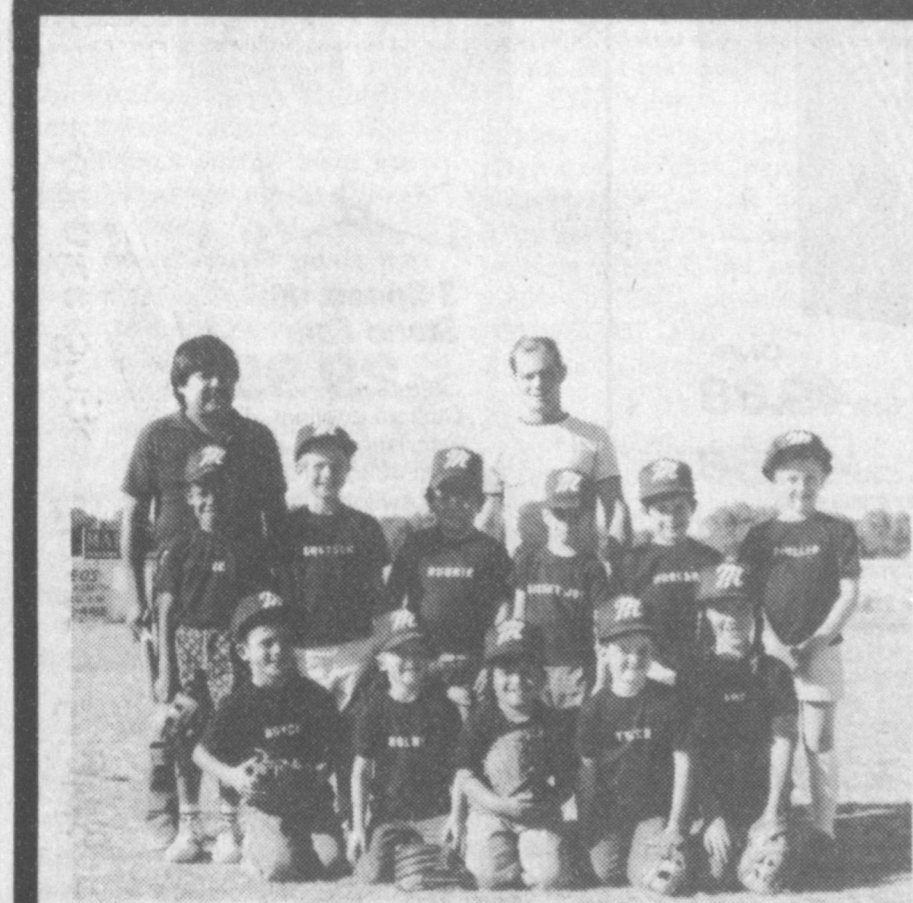

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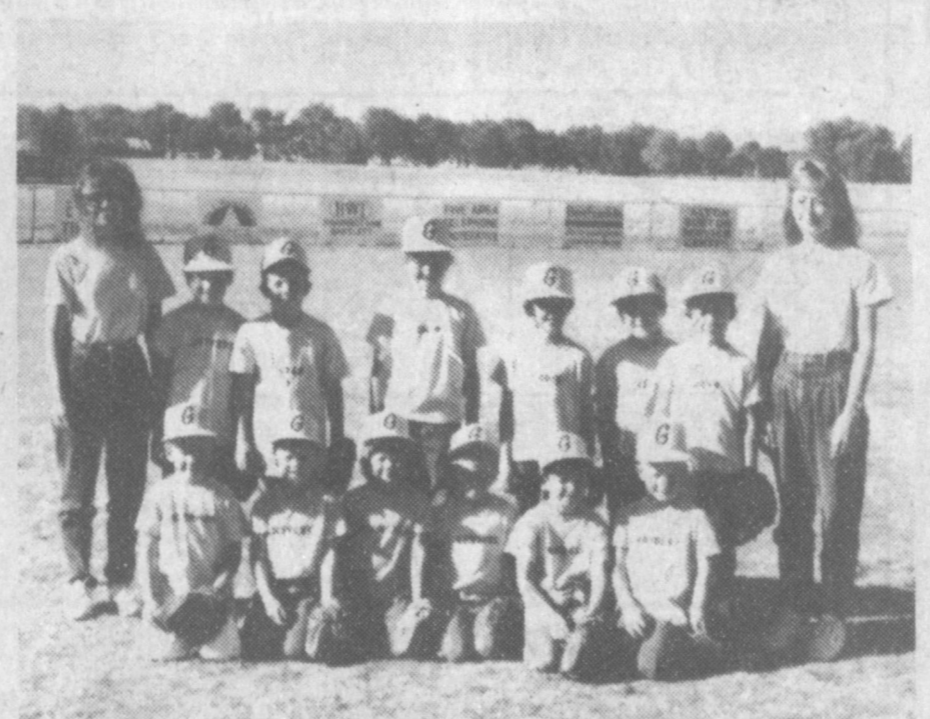

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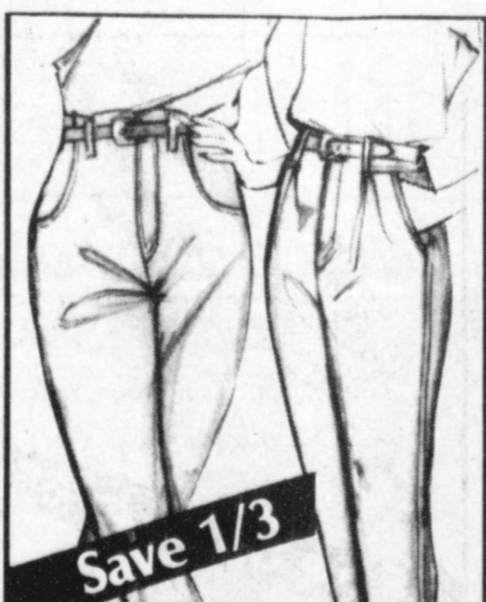

Chisholm noted, "I believe it is very important that some things be noticed."

"For instance, the affiliation with Methodist Hospital. This commitment means quality care can be delivered on the South Plains for all communities involved."

"South Plains Hospital at Amherst will re-open in some other form."

"The recent mandate by this community by voting for the Hospital District and the proposed Mini-Medical Center for the Region all are very important," he added. "The ambulance is growing in importance every day, and will continue to be very important to this area."

Chisholm added, "All citizens, board members, employees of the medical facilities, and even the newspapers, are working to keep people current with what's happening in the area."

He also added, "with South Plains Hospital at Amherst closing, we will be seeing new patients coming to Muleshoe. We must all work together at this critical time."

Before Judge Watson met with the MAHD board, they had opened bids for a depository for the hospital district. Board members wanted time to study the two bids submitted, so the bid was tabled until the Wednesday, July 19 meeting.

Commenting, "An affiliation with Methodist Hospital in Lubbock will be a good asset for the hospital in Muleshoe," the board members agreed to the affiliation and signed an agreement with the Lubbock facility.

One very important paragraph in the agreement is Paragraph V "Management Control of Hospital," reproduced in its entirety here:

"Under this agreement the control of the Hospital shall remain with the Board of Directors. The management of the Hospital shall rest with the

Administrator, and the System (Methodist Hospital) shall not influence or require that the Hospital be operated under standards imposed by the System. If requested by the Hospital a System representative will attend monthly Board meetings to be better informed of the Hospital operations. The Hospital Administrator may also be encouraged to regularly attend management meetings at the System."

The agreement is in effect for three years, but either party may terminate the agreement at any time with 90 days written notice.

With the affiliation agreement, some of the services to be provided by Lubbock Methodist Hospital System include: Management Consulting; Administrative Services; VHA Affiliation; Physician Recruitment; Executive Search; Visiting Medical Staff; System Programs, including Marketing Programs; Clinical Programs and Joint Ventures; Educational Programs and Development of a Regional Health Care Delivery System.

A proposed lease between West Plains Medical Center and the Muleshoe Area Hospital District was also discussed.

Although the lease was prepared, Jim Burgess, chairman of the West Plains Medical Center Board of Directors said they would like for their attorney to check the lease prior to finalizing it. The lease to obtain the hospital facility was tabled until the meeting of July 19.

MAHD Secretary Bob Finney said the lease needs to be expedited so the Hospital District can provide the stability needed to recruit nurses and get Medicare approval.

Finney also asked Kay Swint, director of nurses, to provide personnel policies and recommendations to the MAHD board.

Tim Campbell, president of the MAHD Board commented, "Lots of things are happening. We're

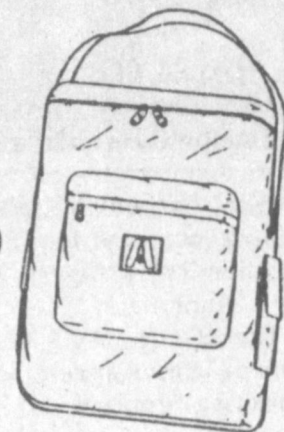

Pesticides Prompt New Training

The recently passed Texas Agricultural Hazard Communication Act (right-to-know), requires that employers in compliance with the law must offer agricultural safety programs for their employees.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service conducts these training programs and makes an Extension Agent available for the training sessions.

Agricultural employers who store or use 55 gallons or 500 pounds of one active chemical and have a seasonal/migrant payroll of \$15,000 or permanent annual payroll of \$50,000, are covered by the law. This would require employers to provide a training session for their employees.

The training program includes discussion of crop sheets, material safety data sheets and product labels. Information is

provided on chemical hazards, potential exposure to chemicals and ways that individuals can protect themselves through good work practices and use of protective clothing and equipment. In addition, the program may be presented in either English or Spanish, with bilingual assistance from the Extension Agent-Pesticide Safety.

If one is not covered by the law and would like to conduct an agricultural safety program for their employees, community members, school, organization or any requesting individual, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is also available to conduct these programs.

Should one wish to have a training session or is interested in further information, they should contact their local County Agricultural Extension Agent's office.

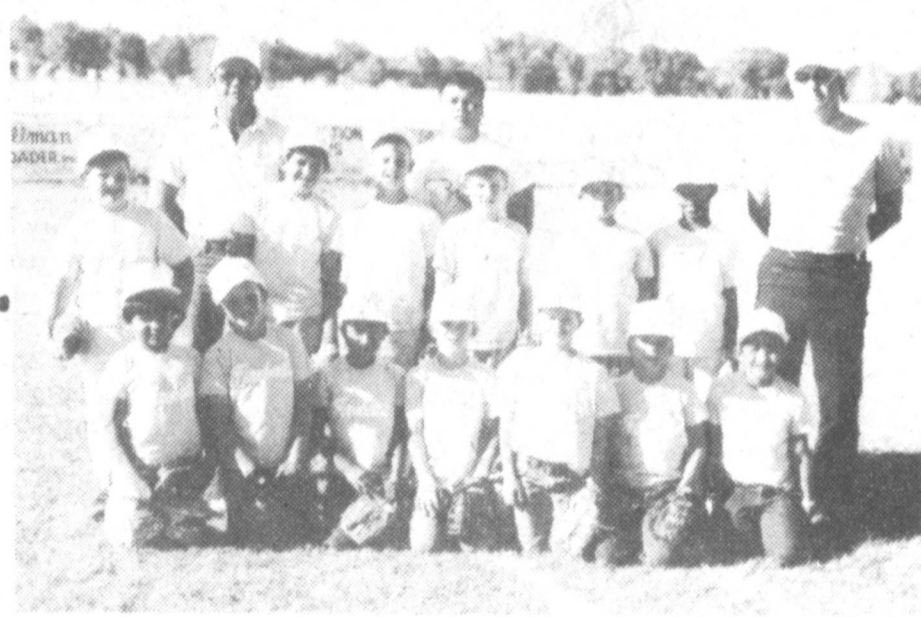

Firemen Ask Texans Help In Bogus Ads

The State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas, the State Fire Marshals' Office and the Texas State Association of Fire Fighters are joining forces to warn Texas' communities of telephone solicitors claiming to represent firefighters.

In an apparent statewide telemarketing campaign, individuals claiming to represent the Firefighters of Texas have been calling on area businesses trying to sell ads in a fire service publication. It has been reported that when businesses decline the

callers have become aggressive and unpleasant.

According to David Cox, executive director of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association, the two largest-circulation fire service publications in Texas are not involved. "Our magazine *Texas Firemen*, is not involved and I know the firefighters' union publication, *The Texas Fire Fighter* is not involved either. Fire departments are easy targets for this kind of fraud because so many of them depend heavily on fund-

raising and donations."

Union Representative Mike Higgins said this problem is not new for the Texas fire service. "We've had this problem in the past. This current operation is not part of any of our 70 affiliated local unions, or any of the other state organizations we're aware of. Such practices destroy the public's confidence in the fire service."

State Fire Marshal Ernest Emerson said that he hopes anyone receiving these calls will check them out. "The sad truth is

that the firefighters of this state have spent years building a relationship with their communities based on confidence and trust. I only hope anyone receiving calls like this will check them out with their local fire department."

According to the State Attorney General's office, although not uncommon, these practices are definitely illegal. Anyone receiving these calls who feel they have been misled in any way can file a complaint with that office by writing: The State Attorney General of Texas, Consumer Protection Division, P. O. Box 12548, Austin, Texas 78711.

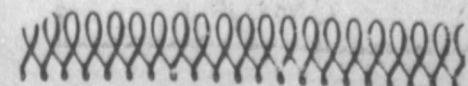

Dear Richelle:

This letter is in reply to an inquiry concerning minimum staffing standards for emergency medical services vehicles in the state of Texas. Standards adopted under the EMS Act state that the requirements for staffing an Advanced Life Support vehicle are:

1. The EMS firm must be capable of providing ALS service 24 hours per day, seven days per week.
2. When in service, an ALS vehicle must be staffed by at least two EMS personnel. One must be certified at the EMT - Special Skills level and the other at the EMT level.
3. All services operating at the EMT level and above must have a medical director.
4. If the EMS firm is providing ALS care including cardiac monitoring and drug therapy, the vehicle must be staffed by a Paramedic and an EMT.

Richelle, I want to commend you, your staff, and your community for providing such a well-respected EMS service in this region of the state. It is relieving to know that should a major incident or illness occur in your area that the situation will be well in hand. And, I want to

encourage you and everyone involved to continue to support your EMS system with the superior knowledge, equipment, and on going training that you have so well shown for the last several years. If I can be of any assistance to you or your community in its endeavors at any time feel free to call or write me any time.

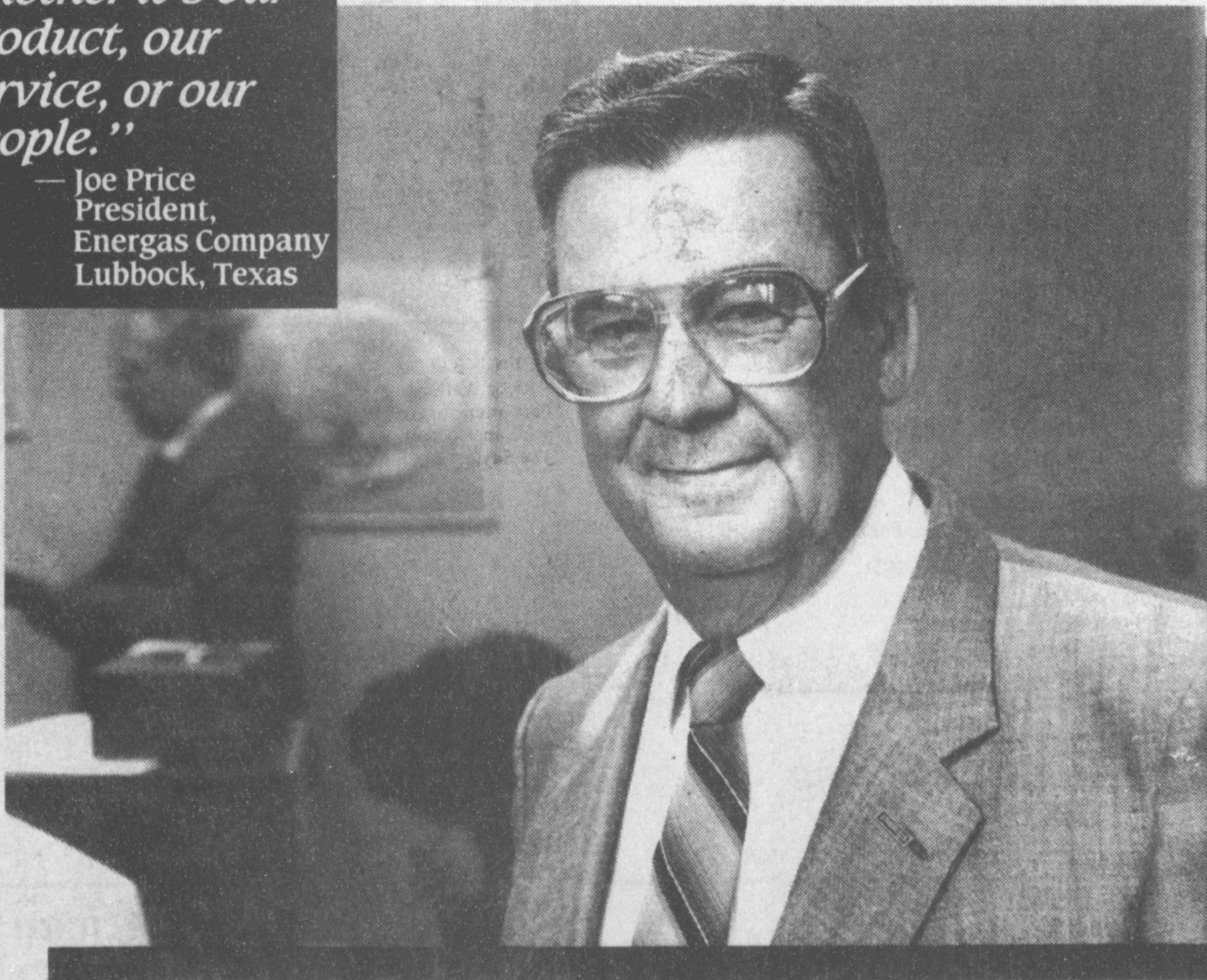

Summertime. Everyone's ready to cook out. But food poisoning bacteria love balmy weather too. In fact, foodborne illness rises sharply over the summer.

So don't be caught unawares. Here are some safe food handling guidelines based on the kind of questions we hear on USDA's Meat and Poultry Hotline.

And here's the Hotline's own recipe for *Quick Country Ribs* with safe food handling tips written right in.

Q. My family is quite large and we often barbecue outside in the summer. Foods like chicken and pork ribs take a while to grill. Can you partially boil the meat ahead to shorten the time on the grill?

A. Cooking ahead—parboiling or briefly popping something in the microwave—is only safe if you immediately finish the cooking process on the grill. Otherwise, cook the food completely to ensure that any bacteria in the raw food are killed. Refrigerate the cooked food in small, shallow containers. Reheated on the grill later, it will taste freshly barbecued. Remember, too, not to let food sit out over 1 hour on a hot day.

Q. I've recently discovered marinades for use in grilling meat and poultry. Are there any safety tips on handling these great sauces?

A. Keep these 4 points in mind when using sauces and marinades:

1) Marinate in a glass dish in the refrigerator, not on the counter.

2) If you want to make a dip for cooked food from your marinade, reserve a separate portion for dipping. Don't re-use any of the marinade used on the raw meat. It could contain bacteria.

3) Be careful with forks and brushes used on raw meat. WASH these utensils before using them again with cooked food so that you don't unwittingly spread bacteria through them.

4) Take a clean plate and utensils out to the grill for serving cooked food.

Q. My mother-in-law often grills shishkabob for family outings. I've heard raw meat shouldn't touch other foods, yet she puts all the ingredients on one plate for assembling. Should I be concerned?

You're right that raw meat juices can contaminate other food. But since the kabobs will be cooked right away, the risk is small.

The only concern here would be if hungry guests munch some of her cup-up raw vegetables that have gotten into the raw meat juice that could contain bacteria.

Therefore, generally it's better to keep raw meats separate from other foods.

Q. What's this I hear about grilled and flame-broiled foods causing cancer? Is anything safe to eat anymore?

A. It does seem that we're being cautioned about a lot of foods these days. Usually, though, "moderation" is the watchword. That's the case with grilled foods.

Some studies have linked the smoke caused by fat dripping on hot coals and the charring that occurs from flame or gas grilling with increased cancer risk.

Vacation Plans

Every family should have a planning session long before a vacation begins, said Dorothy Taylor, family life specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Even though parents may have the final say about vacation plans, they should listen to their children, she said. Each family member should have the chance to express his or her wishes.

If children don't want to go to the same place as their parents or are not having a good time, it could ruin the holiday.

"It's not just, 'It's a good idea. Let's go for it,'" Taylor said.

Families should always consider the developmental stages of its different members and the amount of money and time spent on the vacation when planning, she said.

NOTES, COMMENT

The person who always says what he thinks is honest but unpopular.

However, eating moderate amounts of grilled foods shouldn't pose a problem for barbecue lovers.

Here's how to further lower any risk:

*Raise the level of the grill so food is farther from the heat.

*Remove any visible fat on the meat. This reduces "flame-ups."

*Arrange the charcoal so fat doesn't drip on it.

*Cook meat until it's done without charring it. Remove any charred portion.

*Clean the grill after every use.

*If you eat a lot of grilled food (more than several times a week), precook meat or poultry so it's not on the grill very long.

Q. After a softball game, the team usually enjoys a picnic. We're tired of peanut butter sandwiches and would like

hamburgers and hot dogs. How can we keep these foods safe while we play?

A. It's critically important to keep perishable foods cold especially in hot weather. Bacteria on raw or cooked foods can grow rapidly at warm temperatures to levels that can cause food poisoning.

So use an insulated cooler when transporting perishable foods. Start out with cold food when possible and pack a gold source—like ice or the frozen "blue ice" jells—in the cooler.

You can also freeze the fruit juice that comes in small paper cartons. Carried in the cooler, they'll serve as blocks of ice to chill the food. They also make a good drink. Put the cooler in the shade and keep the lid closed.

You might also try freezing the hamburger patties and hotdogs.

They'll thaw somewhat in transit, but it's okay to grill partially frozen meat. Just be sure the center gets thoroughly cooked. For ground beef, juices should run clear and the meat should not be pink.

Q. Usually I just grill a few steaks every now and then, but I'd like to try smoking a turkey or a roast in the covered grill. What's the difference between smoking and grilling? Can you give me some guidance?

A. Generally, grilling is the rapid cooking of rather small pieces of food. Smoking is cooking larger pieces of meat or poultry in a covered grill or smoker, using a moist cooking method.

Methods vary with the types of equipment, so follow the directions for your particular kettle grill or smoker.

Keep these safety considerations in mind:

*The temperature inside the smoker should stay in the 250-300° F range for safety's sake. Use an oven thermometer inside the smoker to check.

*A pan of water should sit inside the smoker. The moist heat is vital for safety when cooking at this low temperature.

*To ensure sustained heat, use a high-quality charcoal. Add new coals every 1 to 2 hours.

*Cooking times will vary greatly depending on outside weather conditions.

For safety and doneness, red meat should reach an internal temperature of 160° F; poultry, 180° F. Use a meat thermometer to check.
