1. The EMS firm must be capable of providing ALS service 24 hours per day, seven days per week.
2. When in service, an ALS vehicle must be staffed by at must be certified at the EMT Special Skills level and the other at the EMT level. 3. All services operating at the
EMT level and EMT level and above must have
a medical director. 4. If the EMS firm is 'providing ALS care including cardiac monitoring and drug therrapy, the vehicle must be staffed Paramedic and an EMT
