Latest figures show that Texas has more than 143,000 producing oil wells in some 3,684 fields scattered over the state. Its gas wells numbered almost 10,000.

Production of both oil and gas come from reserves which account for 55 per cent of those known to exist in the United States. At he start of 1953, Texas had some 18 billion barrels of crude oil reserves and its reserves of natural gas are estimated at 105.7 trilion cubic feet.

So widespread and complex are the economic effects of oil and gas development that no precise measurement can be made of the distribution of "oil" money.

One large beneficiary group, nowever, includes the land and royalty owners who share in the production of oil and gas for a total of some \$450 million a year.


