# BULLDOGS USE STRONG DEFENSE TO TAKE EASY 47-7 DISTRICT WIN OVER RISING STAR CATS

Ranger's powerful Bulldogs—unbeaten, untied and unextended in district play—struck down Rising Star's Wildcats 47-7 Friday night in Rising Star to push their conference winning streak to four in a row.

The Bulldogs, using a tight defense to make things easy for the offensive backs, scored almost at will. The Dogs continually took over the ball deep in Wildcat territory as the hard rushing line kept the cellar dwelling 7-A eleven hemmed in all night.

Again it was Charles Masseege, the football playing pastor, who sparked the Dogs' offensive attack. Masseege personally ran over three touchdowns, passed for another and had another 56 yard dash called back while spending much of his time on the bench as Coach O. C. "Stubby" Warden used his reserves at will. Other standouts in the backfield—it seemed all could gain without too much trouble—were Billy Browning, Jim Littlefield, Benny Robinson, Scott Forney, Paul Hinds and Bill Brazda. Chico Mendoza played his usual sparkling game at end.

From end to end, including the reserves, the Ranger line was terrific. The second-stringers stopped the Cats on the Dog three at one point and took over on downs after a fumble gave the Rising Star eleven the ball on the seven yard line.

Running from his righthalf position, Masseege raced over the first Dog TD from the five to climax a 50 yard drive. It took the Dogs just six plays to score the first time they took possession of the ball with Masseege gaining 32 of the 56 yards. Billy Browning converted.

A short kick almost blocked by the Dogs, set up the second Ranger TD. The Wildcats bogged down on their own 19 and kicked out to the 33. Browning took it to the 22. Littlefield went to the 12. Masseege found the three and then

Brazda powered his way over. Browning again converted. The score, 14-0.

Rising Star's quarterback, Buddy Barton, was jarred loose from the ball on his own 11 to set up the next score. Masseege needed but one down to go over. This time Browning's kick was wide and the score stood 20-0.

Again the defense set up another Ranger TD. John McDonald tried to punt for the Cats but was smothered back on his own 38 on fourth down. Scott Forney carried to the 18 and Masseege outdistanced the Cats around right end for the score. Browning converted, 27-0.

As the third quarter got underway Masseege broke loose and raced 56 yards for a TD on the first play of the second half. The play was unflinched by a 15-yard penalty, however.

Chico Mendoza set up the next Dog score when he broke through to jar McDonald loose from the ball on a pass play. The crafty Ranger end then jumped on the fall on the Cat 13.

Masseege took it to the five, Littlefield went to the two and then Forney passed to Mendoza for the score. Browning missed his second conversion try of the night, 33-0.
