Truckers Are Fined Record Amount In '53

Truckers arrested last year for highway violations jumped to more than 23,000, according to the annual report released this week by Kent Odom, Chief of the License and weight Division of the Department of Public Safety.

The report for the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, shows truck law violators paid \$516,842 in fines. This is an increase of more than 1000 over the previous year.
These fines were paid into the road and bridge funds of the county in which the truck operator was arrested.

A share increase in the number of truckers arrested is shown by the report. The 22,319 arrested last year exceeded the previous year by more than 2,200. The offenses consisted principally of operating overloaded trucks, failure to pay sufficient registration fees and operating faulty and un-safe equipment upon the highways of the State.

Of the total fines and addition. al registration fees of \$1,866,734.-90 collected by the counties in law violations, more than \$849,-000.00 was for the payment of additional registration fees!

When a truck is apprehended upon the highway with a gross weight in excess of the amount for which it is registered, the law requires that the operator must pay license fee to the county tax col-





Couples Now Can Have Long Married Life

Couples marrying today can n years past, but at the same time in Mineral Wells Nov. 16-18. the likelihood that the wife will eventually become a widow has in-

ompared with widowers.

Currently in the United States about 660,00 marriages are broken by death each year, and in two thirds of these families the wife is the survivor. Fifty years ago the corresponding proportion was close to one half.

The chances that a wife will outlive her husband, it is pointed out, depend essentially upon the difference in their ages. Where husband and wife are the same age, the chances that the wife will utlive her husband are 60 in 100, but the chances rise to 70 in 100 where the husband is five years older and to almost 80 in 100 if dinner on Nov. 16. Olin LeBaron he is 10 years older.

The statisticians state the median age at which wives enter widowhood is about 56 years, and oint out that most women have many years of life before them after their husband dies.

"Three quarters of the women who are widowed at age 50 will live 20 years longer," the statisticians observe, "and the same number of years of life also remain nine out of every ten wives who lose their mates before age 40. Even at age 65, fully one half of the widows can expect to survive for 15 years, and almost one third for 20 years.

Mix remaining ingredients until smooth. Whip icy milk in cold bowl with cold beater until stiff. Whip in butter-sugar mixture, 1/2 at a time. Fold in diced peaches. Turn into chilled crust. Decorate with peaches and with maraschino cherry halves if desired. Chill 2 hours or longer. Serves 6.

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
