TURKEY MARKET LOOKS GOOD; HOLIDAYS PUSH PRICE HIGH

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following story appeared in Sunday's Fort Worth Star-Telegram.)

With the Thanksgiving turkey market winding up, Texas turkey producers find themselves in a good position to market the rest of their crop at a favorable price for the Christmas rush.

About 75 per cent of the Texas crop will have been sold before Thanksgiving, observers believe. Texas turkey growers this year cut production about 11 per cent when the opening of the season found huge supplies of turkey meat in storage and prospects not too favorable for a prosperous year.

But turkey meat stocks moved out of storage in large quantities and the reduction of flocks placed the growers in a good spot when supply and demand factors were considered.

Texas is producing a good quality turkey this year as growers found that, despite relatively high feed prices, the feed-turkey cost ratio was still favorable.

Added evidence was visible in the state this year that the farm flock is disappearing from the scene as a major factor in turkey production in the state.

Turkey operations are now mostly on a commercial scale with growers using all latest information to the best advantage, putting to use new developments in nutrition and sanitation which promote a more efficient production operation.

The turkey industry's action in reducing flocks to conform with surplus supplies has been lauded by agricultural observers and has been held up this year as a model for other commodity groups faced with a surplus situation but without the turkey industry's action.

Youths Are Charged With Cisco Theft

Three Fort Worth youths, the oldest only 20, and two juveniles were arrested Wednesday in connection with a Cisco service station theft. The older of the three boys were charged Wednesday with theft over \$50 Wednesday afternoon and the two juveniles were charged with juvenile delinquency.

Charged with theft over \$50 were Walter Firoff, 20, Robert K. Reddell, 19, and Garry Smithermen, 17. Smithermen was later released and the charges dismissed. A 14 and 16 year old boys will face a hearing before the juvenile court.

The 14-year-old boy admitted to detectives Sam McGee and Tommy Bates he took \$56 from the cash register at Edd Wind Stop Service Station in Cisco. Wind said \$72 was missing.

He told detectives he and his four companions were driving back to Fort Worth Sunday after visiting Mexico when a tire blew out.

Part of the stolen money was used to replace the tire and for gas, he said. The balance was divided among the quintet.

A missing persons report had been made on the five boys but canceled when they returned to Fort Worth. McGee arrested them Monday. Sheriff J. F. Tucker of Eastland took custody of the three older youths, who denied the theft, and brought them to Eastland Tuesday.

Red Cross County Chairman Tells How To Obtain Emergency Leaves

Rev. Otto Marshall, Eastland, home service chairman for the Eastland County Chapter of the American Red Cross, stated today that many persons had been asking for information or assistance in obtaining emergency leaves and dependency discharges for members of the armed forces. He lists the most frequently asked questions and has supplied the answers as follows:

(1) What is the present procedure regarding applications for emergency leaves?

Servicemen in all branches of the military services who are stationed in the United States must make applications for emergency leave to their commanding officers.

A serviceman in the Army or Air Force who is stationed overseas may make application for

wrapped, addressed and mailed by the representatives. In the case of those unable to leave their beds, a representative visits them, inquires the number in his family and their ages, then selects several suitable gifts and carts them to the bedside of the veteran so that he may make his selections personally. These are likewise packaged and mailed for him.

Those privileged to serve the sick and disabled veteran in this capacity are deeply touched by their gratitude at thus being able to remember loved ones at home, many of whom would not otherwise be remembered at Christmas time. Some prefer to make cash donations to this cause. This money, too, is accepted and when the gifts on hand are exhausted, the hospital representatives from the American Legion Auxiliary buy additional gifts for any remaining veteran to send to his family.

(2) What steps should the family take when emergency leave is desired?

A. If the serviceman is stationed in the United States: The family may report the situation to the local Red Cross Chapter, which will make a verification and will submit a report of the facts to the Red Cross field director at the serviceman's station for decision by the man's commanding officer.

B. If the serviceman is stationed overseas: The family may report (Continued on Page Six)

Siebert Named To State Post By Governor

Wendell T. Siebert, principal of Eastland High School has been appointed a member of the Texas Surplus Property Agency by Gov. Allen Shivers, a press release from the Governor's office, released today, said.

Eight other members were named on the group which was designated by the 53rd Legislature as "a state agency to obtain by gifts, grants, and purchases from the Federal Government badly needed war surplus materials for the use and benefit" of various eligible public and private schools, state institutions of higher learning and public health activities.

Other members appointed by the Governor for terms expiring Oct. 31, 1955, are: C. Read Granberry, assistant to the chancellor, University of Texas; Dr. R. L. Williams, superintendent of schools, Corpus Christi; C. A. Robertson, Jr., business manager, San Angelo Junior College; Father James A. Donnelly, business manager, St. Mary's Parochial School, Lampasas; Neil C. Morris, director of the department of physician plant, Baylor; Ed Riedel, business officer, State Department of Health, Austin; O. G. Hereford, chief supply officer, Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools, Austin; and J. W. Loving, secretary, State Board of Control, Austin.

The agency first was authorized by the Legislature at the close of World War II. By the end of 1951, Texas had received more than \$147 million worth of surplus property from the federal government.

State Road Funds Tabled For County

The State Highway Commission has earmarked a portion of the funds derived from appropriations made by the last session of the Texas Legislature for work on two Eastland county farm to market roads. The work is "subject to the availability of funds and the condition that Eastland county will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the state.

The following roads are designated as farm to market roads: From end of Farm to Market Road 569 at Nimrod, south to State Highway 36, 1.9 mile south of Pioneer, a distance of approximately 15.2 miles.

From Farm to Market Road 1027 at Chuckville, east to Comanche county line, a distance of approximately 0.2 mile.

D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, said "upon acceptance of these conditions, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with construction and to assume the roads for maintenance."

Duties will be to lead programs in handicrafts, dramatics or group singing in isolated military outposts in Korea. Those accepted for the positions will take a two-week training course in Washington and then be flown to Korea.

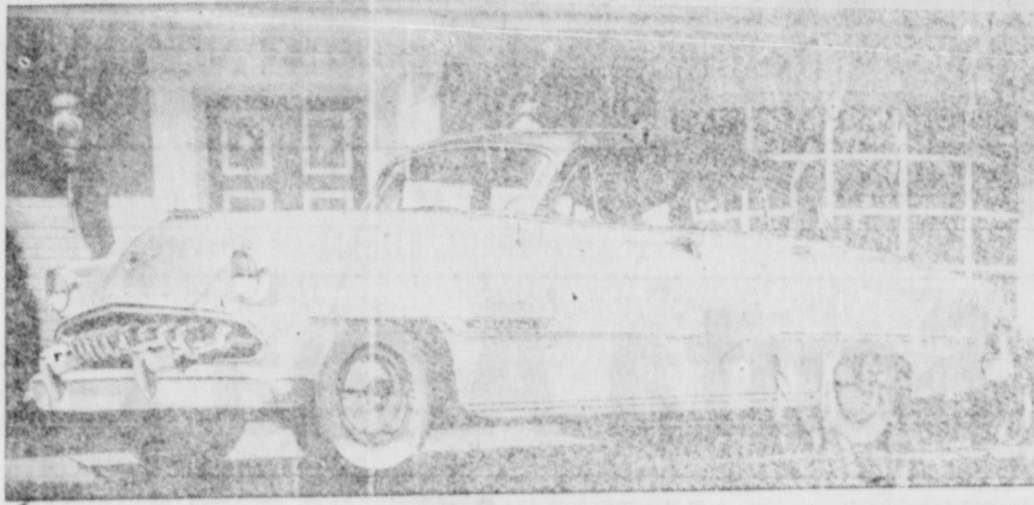
Olden Couple Return From Months Vacation

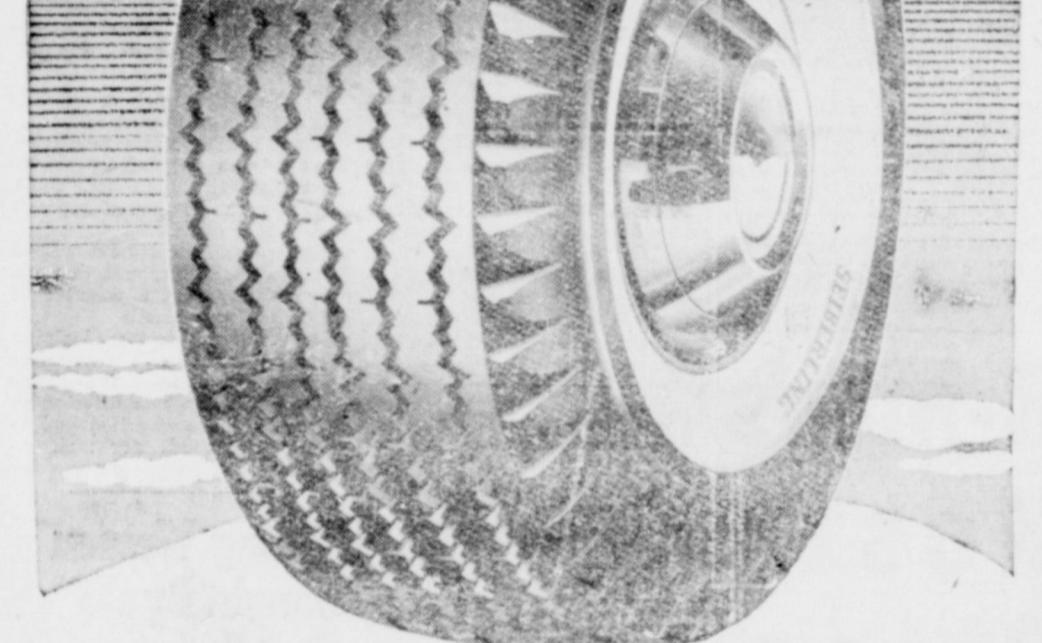



If you will drop your gift in the boxes placed in Burr's Store, The Men's Shop, Mrs. Houle's Shop and Carl Johnson's, they will be picked up and mailed or you may call 621 or 446-J who will see that the package is called for.

Suggestions for gifts are articles of clothing, well packaged toilet articles, games, etc., for Dad or Grandfather; Articles of clothing, scarfs, costume jewelry, linens, etc., for mother; for teen-agers there are the various favored articles of clothing, games, toilet articles, for both boys and girls, and costume jewelry for the girl, etc.; Also clothing and toys, games and so on for the little folks, both boys and girls and the infants. the situation to the local Red Cross chapter, which will make a verification and submit a report of the facts through Red Cross channels to the military headquarters, to a Red Cross field director overseas, or to the commanding officer of a ship, in accordance with established regulations.

(3) Does the Red Cross recommend that leave be granted or denied?

No. The Red Cross makes no recommendations. It submits verified factual reports for consideration by the military authorities.

(4) Who makes the decision? The decision is made by the serviceman's commanding officer or by the military headquarters, depending upon where the serviceman is stationed and his branch of service.

Dependency Discharges

(1) What is the present procedure regarding applications for dependency or hardship discharges?

A. If the serviceman is stationed in the United States: Both enlisted men and officers must make their own applications to their commanding officers. The family is expected to communicate with the serviceman, stating the situation at home and asking that he request discharge. Affidavits, statements, or recommendation from individuals in the community should be obtained and sent by the family to the serviceman to attach to his application.

B. If the serviceman is stationed overseas: He must make his application to his commanding officer in accordance with the procedures in A above. In the case of the Army only, the family of an enlisted man may send a request directly to the Office of the Adjutant General, Department of the Army. Attention: AGPO-XD, Washington 25, D. C. Such request should be supported by at least two affidavits from disinterested persons; certificates of death or disability should be included if either factor is involved. This procedure does not apply to families of officers.

(2) How can the Red Cross chapter help the family when discharge is being requested? If the family so desires, the chapter will advise the family of proper procedure and may assist in assembling necessary documents.

No. Red Cross chapters will, however, obtain supplementary data, after all evidence has been submitted, if military headquarters or the officer having discharge authority requests specific information. Supplementary Red Cross reports are not requested in connection with the discharge of officers.

(5) Does a Red Cross chapter recommend that the application for discharge be approved or disapproved? No. The Red Cross submits factual reports, in accordance with IV above, regarding the family circumstances. The Red Cross makes no recommendations.

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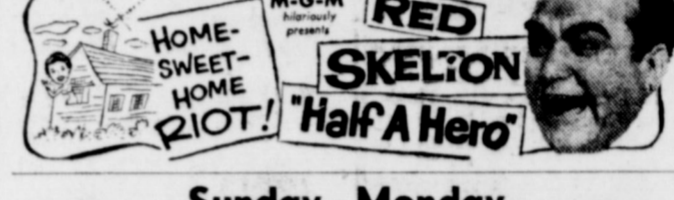

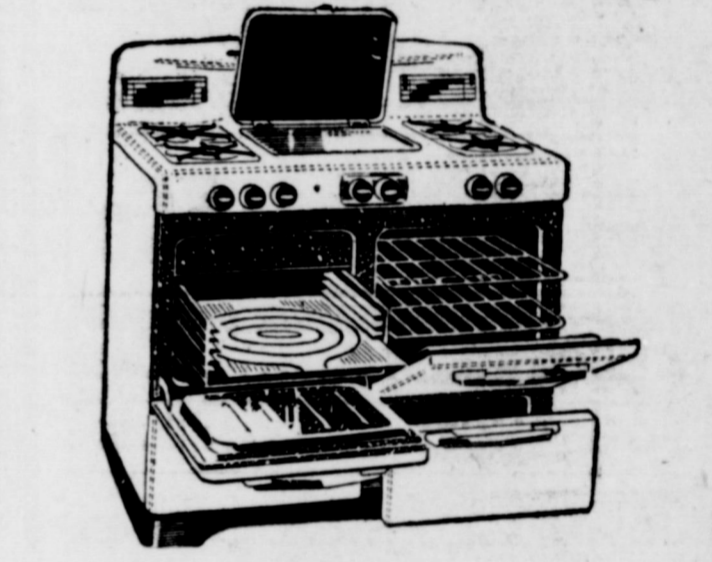

Pecan Harvest Advice Given By Hutchison

Pecans should be harvested upon maturity when they separate readily from the green husks, says John E. Hutchison, extension horticulturist.

Timely harvesting not only prevents crows, squirrels and natural deterioration from materially reducing the crop, but, points out Hutchison, prices for fancy in-shell pecans are best during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

As with other agricultural commodities, growers believe the future of the pecan industry depends upon the development of mechanical harvesting devices to eliminate expensive hand labor. Several mechanical tree shakers have been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, he says.

One such mechanical harvester is a combination huller and separator which hulls unopened nuts and separates all pecans from husks, leaves and other trash. The shaker is comparatively inexpensive to build and is especially valuable to small producers of standard varieties, Hutchison says. Some growers report reduced harvesting costs of one-third to one-half by using machines.

The tree shaker is a fairly simple device and can be built in any farm machine or blacksmith shop. Detailed plans for construction may be obtained from county agricultural agents or by writing to the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Tex., and asking for bulletin MS-851.

Home Owners Are Burning Money In Leaf Bonfires

Many home owners have money to burn this fall season, and that's just what they're doing.

When setting fire to fallen autumn leaves, they might as well be lighting dollars, according to E. I. Koebel, field representative of The Davey Tree Expert Company.

For grounded leaves are valuable assets to lawns, trees and shrubbery.

And the smoke signals sent up from leaf piles throughout the nation spell out the warning word: "Waste."

These home owners who turn over a new leaf and save their trees' discarded foliage gain one of the finest types of garden humus for nourishing the hungry soil.

Raked into a pile and developed as compost, the leaves produce a high-grade lawn and garden top-dressing and save their landlord the trouble of tending a bonfire. If compost heap is not desired, many leaves can be used as mulch around evergreens or other plants that like some winter protection. And files with power-driven leaf pulverizers may simply plow into the leaves and cut them up into tiny bits that soon add to the soil humus.

Bonfires, besides destroying potential soil humus have a way of brooding the branches of nearby overhanging trees. A bright, hot fire in the autumn twilight, but it can result in trees that are badly damaged.



Practical Counter Tops

To heat-proof clay tile, which is also stain-proof and easy to clean, makes an ideal covering for kitchen counter tops, according to the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association. It is especially useful for the working area adjacent to the gas range. Hot pots can be transferred to the tile without fear of damaging the surface, even when lifted right off the top burners or from the oven.

Tasty Fish and Onions

Quick-frozen fish makes a tasty meal either for baking in the oven of your gas range or for pan frying on the top burner. Add sliced onion rings for flavor.

Hot Water Needs

To insure an adequate supply of hot water at all times, make sure that your automatic gas water heater is the right size and has the capacity you need, advises the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association.

This will take care of the more than 140 common uses of hot water in the average home. With temperature control, which is a feature of modern gas water heaters, there will be an automatic adjustment to permit the proper degree of hot water for every purpose.

Stain Treatments

diner napkins. Soften them with cold cream and then launder as usual, the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association suggests. To remove stains on white cotton or linen, pour boiling water through the stain from a height of two or three feet. If it persists, bleach and rinse thoroughly.

Ice-Maker De Luxe

You need ice in cold weather when the heat's turned on, too, for attractive servings of fruit cup, shrimp cocktail and other appetizers. The attractive ice circles by a new automatic gas refrigerator will dress up any dish that's served on a bed of ice, the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association points out.

Coconut Macaroons

Make coconut macaroons the jiffy way. Combine 1½ cups of shredded coconut, ½ cup condensed milk, dash of salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, and ½ teaspoon almond extract. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet, pressing down ends of the mixture with spoon. Bake in the oven of your gas range for 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

Clothes Storage

Before packing away your summer "starchables" for the winter, launder them and blue the white clothes, but don't starch or iron them, say the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association. When you are ready to use them next year, add a small cake of blue wax ironing aid to each quart of hot starch. The clothes will come out fresh and sparkling after one ironing.
