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

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

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

AUSTIN - The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said plans have been completed for the limited experimental harvest of doe in parts of Gillespie and Mason coun-

The season is from December 1 to 15, both dates inclusive. Be-tween one thousand and eleven hundred antlerless deer have been earmarked for harvest in the two areas. The Commission is setting up the experiment allowed for taking of "anterless deer" to cover unintentional shooting of young bucks whose antlers are not visi

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said persons interested in the harvest should contact t h e Chambers of Commerce in either Fredericksburg for Gillespie County, or Mason in Mason County, nce final arrangements are strictly on the local level.

Permits which will be issued directly by land owners restrict the harvest to one antlerless deer per

The census leading up to the special season was supervised by Eugene Walker, Wildlike Biologist with the Game and Fish Commis-

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said the purpose of the entire project is primarily to reduce the overpopulation of deer in certain areas; to cut the herd losses from dieoff and to reduce damage to the ranges from over browsing.

He added that the program, properly developed, could improve the quality of the deer herds and lead to a better sex ratio in affect-

ITS THE LAW in Texas

Government of Law Is American Ideal and Practice

Nowadays we hear the term "Government of Law" from time to time. Few of us stop to think that this phrase means just what it says and that it is especially important to us as American citizens.

Judges get the law by which they decide the legal questions arising in a lawsuit from three sources: federal and state constitutions; federal and stat statutes; and from previous judicial decisions and legal writings. Previous decisions state the public standards of rights and duties in matters not covered by constitutions and statutes.

Lawyers say that if judges and juries were not bound by law and precedents—if in each lawsuit, the judge or juror could set up a private standard of rights a n d duties as a basis for deciding that case—no one would know in advance of the decision how he should have acted in a particular situation. Cases arising out of similar circumstances would not be decided on settled principles but on the personal ideas of the trial judge or juror.

Because cases must be tried and determined on established and recognized public standards of right and wrong, we call ours a government of law and not a government

Judges have access to statements of the law and know which apply to the situation involved in any lawsuit. So that justice may be done according to the law, it is imperative that the jurors in each case accept the law as the judge gives it to them. They are therefore required to base their verdict on his instructions as to the law, rather than on their own notions of what the law is, or

For somewhat similar reasons there are rules governing the way a case is to be tried in court. These rules prescribe what must be stated in the pleadings, in what order evidence must be presented, what evidence is proper, what form lawyers are permitted to argue, what is permissible and what is not permissible argument.

If it were not for these rules no one could forsee what would happen during a lawsuit. It would be mpossible to prepare properly for the trial. No one would know, un-til the judge had ruled, what he would be permitted to say or do, or in what order. Such a situation would inevitably result in confusion and injustice.

The whole purpose of laws and rules is to insure equal justice by providing a single standard of rights and duties, applicable to all persons similarly situated.


