**THIS BEING** stock show time in Parmer County, we were intrigued by a story in last Sunday's edition of the Lubbock *Avalanche-Journal*.

The article points out that a professor of surgery at the Texas Tech University Health Science Center is working to perfect a derivative of cattle blood which he hopes can be used to replace human blood for transfusions.

Dr. Mario Feola is the Texas Tech professor who has been working on the project for the past ten years. He says that the hemoglobin solution has been successfully used in experimental transfusions with mice, cats, rabbits and monkeys.

In the laboratory work, the animals were bled until two-thirds of their blood supply was gone, a point at which the animals would die unless they received more blood. At this point, they were given the bovine hemoglobin solution. All of the animals recovered, according to the researcher.

Dr. Feola says that the bovine hemoglobin, when pure, does not cause an immunological reaction when injected into other animals. He points out that cattle and human hemoglobin are very similar in their molecular structure.

The Tech HSC scientist hopes to receive approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration within the coming year, to begin testing the solution on people.

According to Feola, the solution could be used in situations where no human blood was available, to transfuse to a person in critical need of blood.

The article points out that the hemoglobin can be injected into a patient, regardless of their blood type, and acts as a short-term substitute for human blood. This could keep the patient alive for a few days until their own body rebuilds the blood cells to a normal level.

If the Texas Tech researcher's project proves successful, it could solve a multitude of problems. One is the fact that there are often shortages of human blood. Another is the present scare associated with the contamination of blood by the AIDS virus, causing many people to be concerned with transfusions.

Hundreds of thousands of cattle are slaughtered in this area alone each year, making the potential blood supply almost endless. Dr. Feola says that when the hemoglobin solution is completely purified, it is perfectly safe.

Another factor favoring the use of the hemoglobin solution is the fact that it can be stored in powdered form for months, while human blood can only be stored for several weeks at the most.

In making the solution, Dr. Feola isolates the red and white blood cells from the cattle blood. These cells are then broken down to isolate the hemoglobin--a protein which carries oxygen to the body's cells.

When people die from a loss of blood, they do so because they lose the red blood cells which carry oxygen, the professor explained. "The hemoglobin of cattle will actually transport the oxygen better than human hemoglobin," he says.

One of the biggest drawbacks to perfecting his process is funding for the research.

It was pointed out that the Japanese have tried unsuccessfully to produce an entirely synthetic blood substitute. It is feared that the shortage of money for Feola's project may allow the Japanese to begin work on this project, and have it on the market while the Texas Tech HSC is still in the testing stages.

If the project proves successful, the new product would need to be produced in large quantities, and this could bring a much-needed new industry to the Lubbock area, the Tech professor points out.

## 40th Annual Show Slated

The 40th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held February 4-7 at the Community Center-Showbarn.

Between 500 and 600 animals are expected for the show, which draws entries from all over the county. Judging will be held for steers, barrows, lambs and heifers.

Weigh-in will be on Wednesday from 3-7 p.m. Classification of lambs and steers will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday.

Lambs will be judged Thursday beginning at 5 p.m. The barrow show will be held on Friday starting at 8 a.m. The steers will be judged starting at 7 p.m., followed by the heifers.

The premium sale will be held on Saturday, February 7, beginning at 2 p.m.

Terry Copley of Friona is the general superintendent of the 1987 show. Mack Heald of Farwell is assistant general superintendent. Rick Seaton of Lazbuddie is swine superintendent. Noel White of Friona is in charge of the lamb show, and Roddy Berend of Friona is head of the cattle department.

## Progress Noted On Widening Hwy. 60

Some progress was noted on the prospects of widening Highway 60 through Parmer County to four lanes this week with the signing of a contract asking the state to purchase right-of-way from the Castro County line west to Friona.

The Parmer County Commissioners, meeting in regular session January 26, approved the contract, which calls for Parmer County to furnish 10 per cent of the estimated cost for the right-of-way, and the state to pay the rest. The county's portion of this cost will be \$103,600, which will come out of its Right of Way Fund.

In other business, the court approved helping two citizens with their utility bills, but denied help to a third, who was employed at a full-time job.

The county's bill to Panhandle Community Services, for handling fees for commodities given away by the county, was approved in the amount of \$495. This amounts to two cents per pound on the items distributed.

Sheriff Bill Morgan was given approval to seek bids for a new vehicle for the sheriff's department. The bids are to be opened at 10 a.m. February 9.

A new County Historical Commission was named to serve for 1987-88. They are Hugh Moseley, chairman; Ida Jesko, Orma Flippin, Paula McBroom, Harold and Avis Carpenter, June Floyd, Allo Reeve, Grace Whitefield, Wana Brewer, Joyce

Coffman and Frances King.

Two bills were approved for work done in the Sheriff's office in connection with the renovation. They were in the amounts of \$396 and \$325, for electrical and ceiling work, both to Sherrill Lumber Co. of Bovina.

Friona State Bank was granted permission to substitute securities pledged to cover county deposits.

## Program Threatened

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts and the Parmer County Commissioners have received notification that the USDA has held up funding to the states for the commodity program, because of a presidential order.

The Department of Human Services is going to borrow enough funds for distribution of commodities to continue through March, 1987. If Federal funds remain frozen the commodity program will be discontinued after March.

Persons that are interested in the distribution of the food commodities should write their Congressmen and encourage their support in getting funds for this valuable and needed program.

There will be a food commodity distribution for Parmer County in February, to be announced at a later date.

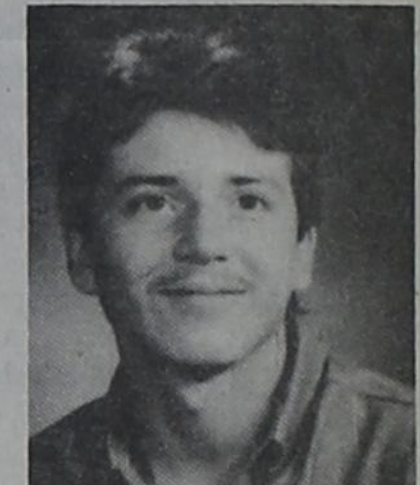

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

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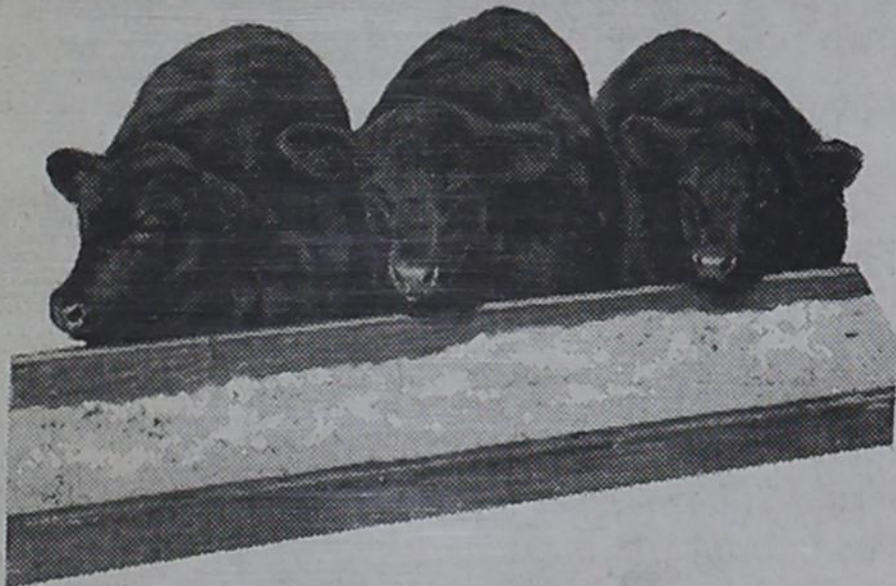

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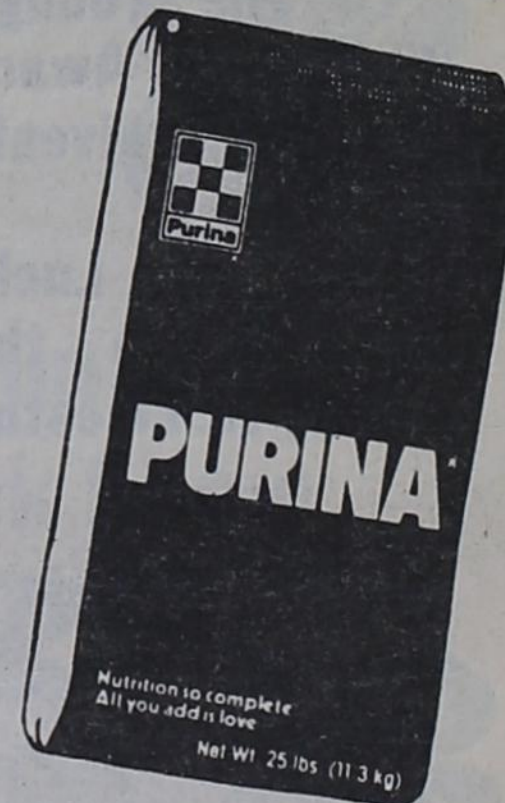

All friends and relatives are invited to attend. The couple requests no gifts, please.

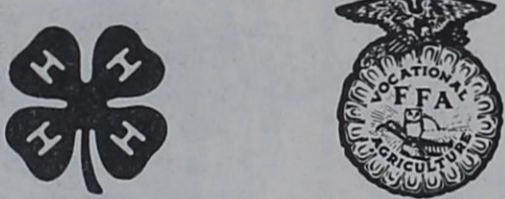
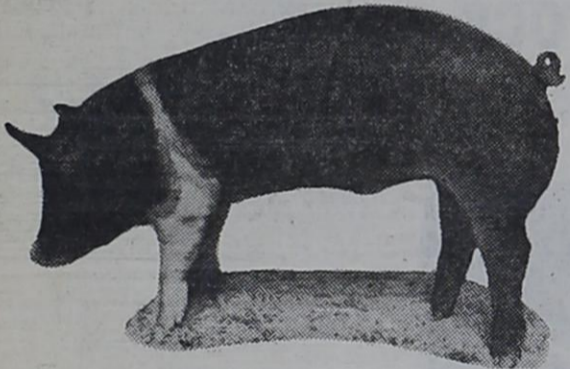

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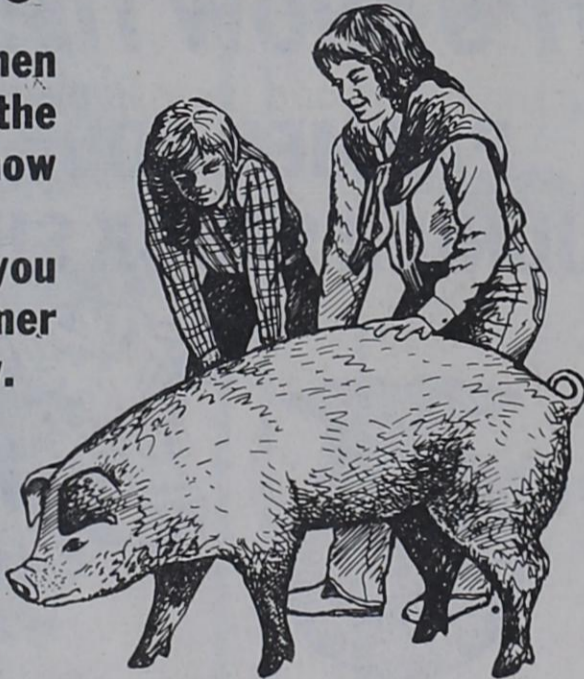

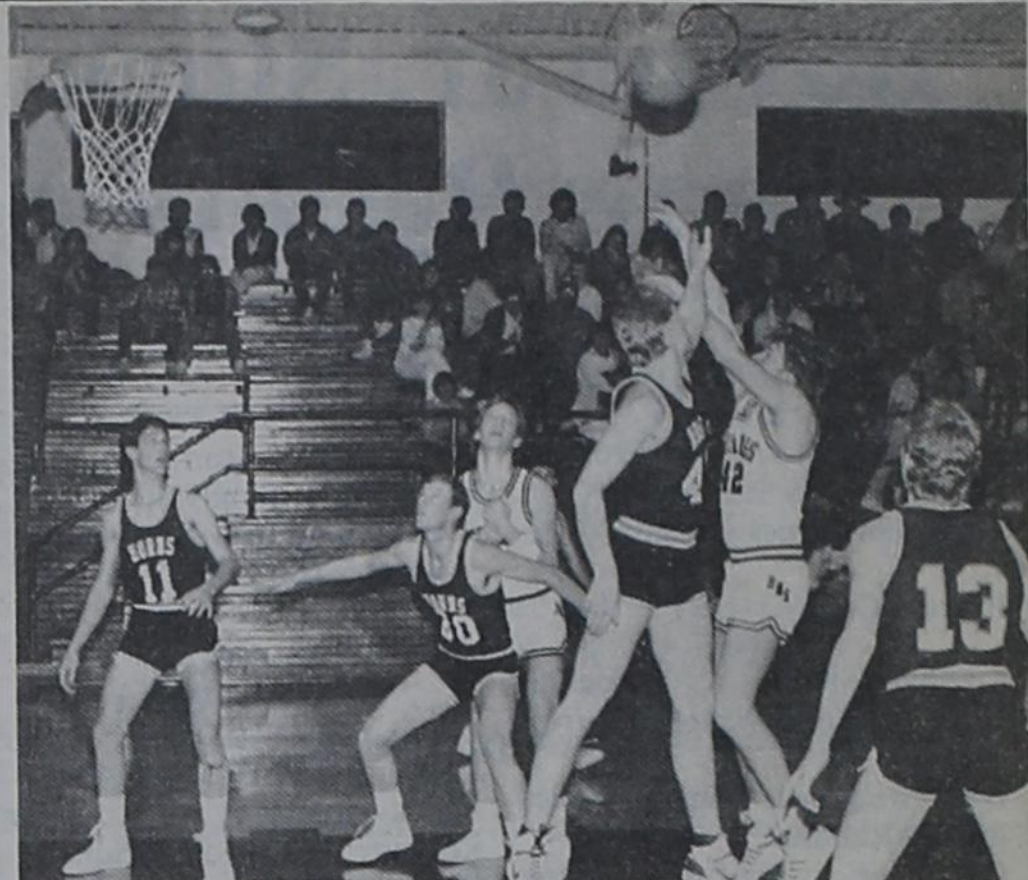

A business meeting will follow the meal and entertainment, with committee reports, and election of directors for the Credit Union's board.

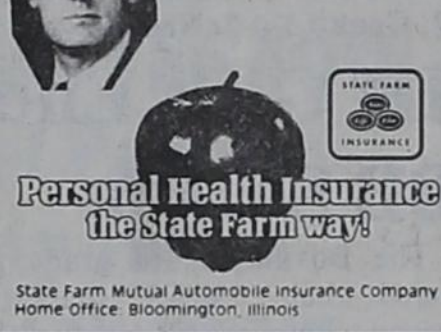

## 4-H Fills Void For Thousands Of Kids

According to a nationwide poll, 4-H makes a difference in the lives of former members.

A national poll last fall of 1,761 individuals showed that 4-H does, indeed, have a positive effect on the lives of individuals who were involved in the program as youths, says Janette Pierce, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The randomly selected sample of individuals that were polled included 710 former 4-H members and 743 members of other youth organizations. The remainder had not been involved in organized groups during their youth.

A key finding of the survey, notes Pierce, is that former 4-H members today are more active in community activities, particularly in leadership roles, than non-members.

When comparing both former 4-H members and those participating in other youth organizations with non-participants in youth groups, the community involvement aspect is particularly significant. Those who did not take part in organizations as youth are currently much less involved in adult community activities, Pierce points out.

4-H also tends to have family ties. Former 4-H members indicated that their children are participating in 4-H to a large degree (by 50 per cent more than children of non 4-H parents). They themselves also take part in Extension educational programs and activities to a significantly greater degree than former members of other youth groups as well as former non-participants in youth groups.

One reason for the greater involvement by former 4-H'ers

relates to the types of experiences they had as youths, says Pierce. Without question, the study showed that former 4-H members gave higher rankings to personal development, knowledge, leadership and coping skills experiences than did former members of other organizations.

4-H participants also felt that their overall experiences were more valuable to them than did participants of other youth organizations, adds Pierce.

The survey also found that characteristics of 4-H members, as youths, are no different from other youths across the nation who are involved in such groups as Scouts, Boys and Girls Clubs, YMCA and YWCA, church organizations, and FFA and FHA. Their backgrounds, educational attainments and incomes are generally similar.

The poll was conducted by Dr. Howard Ladewig, program evaluation specialist with the Extension Service, and Dr. John Thomas, rural sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The study was funded by a grant from the Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

4-H is an informal educational program for youth in the third grade or between the ages of 9 and 19 that is conducted by the Extension Service at the state and national level. Its objective is to provide help in the development of knowledge and leadership as well as in problem-solving and personal skills.

## Social Security Benefits Can Vary

In recent years, we have stressed the need to plan for retirement as early as possible. However, it should be noted that the earlier one plans to retire, the more planning required.

Age 65 is the age for full benefits from Social Security and is also used by much of private industry. However, most Social Security beneficiaries retire before age 65, and a recent study indicated that age 62 is the most frequent age of retirement in private industry.

Reduced Social Security retirement benefits have been available at 62 for men since 1961 and for women since 1956. Benefits are reduced for each month before age 65 a person receives retirement benefits. At 62, a person receives 80 per cent of the full benefit rate.

Reduced benefits are available at 60 for widows and widowers. Payments to widows and widowers range from 71 1/2 per cent of the deceased spouse's benefit at 60 to 100 per cent at 65.

People who work in some types of jobs--firemen, policemen, military service--may retire as early as age 55. In addition, some employers encourage workers to retire early as a means of cutting back on their payroll. This may mean several years of no earnings that could result in lowering the lifetime average earnings amount on which benefits are based. People who start a second job after

retirement, as many do, not only earn extra income to meet current living expenses, they also protect their Social Security benefits for when they finally retire at 62 or later.

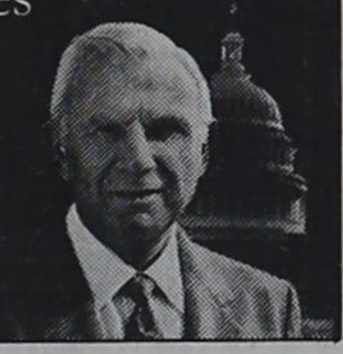
People who retire before 65 generally have to worry about what to do about their health insurance coverage since Medicare does not begin until 65. Social Security officials recommend that they retain their job-related group health insurance until they reach 65. A person may also consider joining a health maintenance organization with the provision that the coverage will be changed to supplement Medicare protection at 65.

People who decide to delay their retirement until after 65 should note that a delayed retirement credit of 3 per cent a year increases their benefit for each year after 65 they postpone retiring. The 1983 amendments provide that retirement credits will increase gradually from 3 per cent per year for workers 65 before 1990 to 8 per cent per year for workers who reach 65 after 2007.

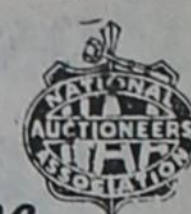

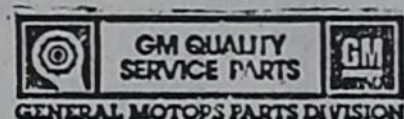

## Post Office Warns Against Fraud

Have you ever been asked to participate in a chain letter which is guaranteed to earn you lots of money with one small investment? Don't waste your money--chain letters are a form of lottery and may violate federal mail fraud laws.

The same three elements that apply to lotteries (*payment, prize, and chance*) also make chain letters illegal. The *payment* may be money or any other item of value. The *prize* is the large amount of money you are led to believe you will receive in the end if you participate. The *chance* is that the chain will break, and it must, because the chance that all participants in a chain letter will receive mail is mathematically

## Emergency Loans Tied To Crop Insurance

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for 1987 losses will need to have crop insurance if it is available, FmHA State Director, J. Lynn Futch, said today.

"All family-size farmers should be aware that a newly-effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits our making emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)," said Futch.

"Therefore, I urge every family-size farmer in the State of Texas to seriously take into account this new relationship between insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility."

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus an additional 35 specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program costs by about 50 per cent, Futch said, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the newly-required tie-in with emergency loan eligibility.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value of his crop loss is still 30 per cent or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective in January, the new requirement will affect crops planted in 1987, and thus will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple-peril, covering most forms of disaster, rather than hail-only.

The closing date for insurance sales on spring-planted crops in the State of Texas will vary. Closing date for insurance sales in the coastal and South Plains areas is February 15; East Texas and Blackland areas is March 31; and the Rolling Plains and High Plains areas is April 15. Because of these dates and the fact that a prevented-planting endorsement for eligible crops must be elected 45 days prior to sales closing, Futch urged farmers to contact their local insurance agents promptly.

Information is also available at FCIC field offices and through most county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

impossible.

For example, a typical chain letter may require participants to mail letters, containing money to six new participants, each of whom must mail six letters to six more individuals and so on. By the eleventh level of mailing, the entire population of the United States (almost three-hundred million) would be exhausted. By the 13th level, the population of the world (over four billion) would be exhausted. And remember, even if the chain letter itself is not mailed, as long as the payment or prize is sent through the mail, the entire scheme is illegal.

Some chain letters masquerade as Multi-Level Marketing (MLM) Plans. These require an original promoter to sell a product and enlist several other people to become sellers, who in turn recruit others. Most Multi-Level Marketing Plans are schemes to sell the plan rather than the product, and the fact that selling a product is involved, instead of winning money, or statements saying the plan do not violate federal law, do not ensure legality.

Do not confuse regular chain letters or Multi-Level Marketing Plan chains with prayer chains that promise good luck but require no investment. These are not illegal--they're just a nuisance. You should not be intimidated by implied threats of bad luck, personal injury, or disaster for breaking the chain. Feel free to throw the chain letter away.

Remember, you are under no obligation to participate if you receive a chain letter, and to do so may be a violation of federal law. Turn the letter in to the local post office or send it to the Postal Inspector in Charge, P.O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929.

## Crop Clinic Is Set In Knox City

If you want to learn more about how to plant, grow, and harvest plants for range and wildlife plantings, you may want to attend a clinic on the subject in February.

The clinic will be held for potential seed growers at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials center near Knox City. Since the center can only accommodate about 30 people comfortably, more than one session will be conducted if needed.

Subjects to be discussed include seedbed preparation, planting equipment, fertilizer needs, weed control, irrigation, and harvesting, drying, cleaning, testing and labeling seed.

The first thirty people to call for a reservation can attend a session starting at 9:30 a.m. February 18. The next thirty people to call may attend a second session starting at the same time on February 19. The clinics should end about 3:30 p.m.

SCS specialists experienced in planting, growing, harvesting, and cleaning seed will be on the program and will demonstrate actual equipment used at Knox City.

A registration fee of \$3.00 will be charged for attendees to handle coffee and refreshments. Lunch will be on your own. If you wish to attend, call the center before February 13. The number is (817) 658-3922.
