Texas is secure: The House Committee on Constitutional Amendments voted 5-3 on Wednesday, April 13, to bury the ERA recall in sub-committee. Rep. Joe Robbins voted with us. Write him and thank him. The Assoc. of W's lobbied him hard and heavily. He took lots of heat both at home and in Austin.

We were outnumbered at the hearings easily 3 to 1, including a sizeable group of W's from Lubbock. But our small representation was critical and very effective: Connie Marks, Susie Sappington, Martina Strobel, Shirley Wright

But the highlight was a 20-year Dallas lawyer representing business and professional women, Hermine Tobolowsky. Her knowledge of recent Court interpretation of state ERA's was a disarming blow to the absolute interpretationists. She gave the <u>coup</u> <u>de grace</u>.

The Resolution came to a vote at 10:15 p.m. with a motion to send HCR 35 back to subcommittee. Then R. Smothers substituted a move to send the bill to the full house for a vote. It was narrowly de-feated 4-3. Joe Robbins stuck with us. The final scuttle of HCR 35 in committee was definitive. We've won. The Senate could take up the matter, but it will die a natural death. Many thanks are due. Write Joe Robbins; also Sarah Weddington who organized and presented our witnesses; and Froy Salinas who was most helpful. Barbara Vackar was constantly visible and vigilant on and off the floor. Then, after you've written your thanks, breathe a sign of relief.

In 1921, Elizabeth Kemper Adams stated, while talking about twocareer households: "Woman can't adequately meet her obligations to her own children without, at the same time, meeting her obligations to other children, and young people of the community, in the school, on the playground, in the home, the store, the office and the factory."

Mother, as defined in the Oxford-English Dictionary is "a woman whi has given birth to a child." Feminist, in the same text is "an advocate of the rights of women, based on the theory of equality of the sexes." The Feminist Mother, then, I would suggest, is that woman who has given birth to a child, who advocates the equality of the sexes.

Too often, Mothering is confused with diapering, formula making, feeding, stopping fights and various task oriented occurrances of activities of daily living. It is, rather, providing models for your child. The less restraint placed on that model, the more creative life choices are open to that child. And increased freedom, by any historical perspective, though frightening and more difficult from the onset, is better. Better, in that present in the

Better, in that present in the feminist household are increased sharing between spouses with child rearing activities. Better because Fathers are closer to their children in equal households. Better because the Feminist Mother chooses to have her children, but does not build her whole life around them. And better, because the child does not feel the effects of a selfsacrificing Mama, but rather builds self-reliance because he/she sees it so activated in their world.

Self sacrifice stinks! And so it is portrayed to us through the media, with nagging, whining, complaining, snippy, catty, suspicious wife/mother so consistently ascribed to women, which occurs as a natural phenomenon whenever <u>people</u> are dependent on others in close, unequal relationships. Similar phenomena occur with soldiers in barracks, slaves in captivity, prisoners in confinement. Hence we may rule out the femaleness of the tendency, to <u>un</u>-naturalness of the settings.

1970 homemaking and mothering <u>tasks</u> are now less demanding due to labor-saving devices, mass production of food and clothes etc., and the effective safer birth control devices. Is this then what caused or at least served as the major impetus to the present era of feminism?

The smaller family is indeed more economical, and the fewer children of the Feminist Mother have undoubtedly caused economic change and a restructering of political priorities. And change, once again is met with resistance and even scorn.

A New York Times article, during the Nixon administration, stated: "Day Care can result in permanent damage to an infant's emotional development." However in the 1960's, 2/3rd's of new employees were women. And these women were and are returning to work with increasingly younger children. i.e. pre-school age. In 1966, 20% of women returning to work had children 1 year of age or younger; 40% of women returning to work had children between 1-4 years of age: and 16% of women returning to work had children of 5 years age or older.

Benjamin Spock, in the 1950's, when the cult of motherhood was truly back in vogue, counseled that Mothering, in her traditional role was <u>all</u> to the infant in way of stimulation. But how does an unstimulated mother cope with her strains and frustrations?? She "buys a new dress or gets a new image at the beauty parlor." At best, the temperment of the times could allow for a little more than low status part-time jobs which incidently, (continued on page 7)

meshed with well with the demands of the labor market during this period.

And oh how Roosevelt attacked the woman who left the home in pursuit of professionalism as "selfish." His oft-termed "large family sentimentality" then, was to be an excuse for the blatant double standard, for there is no challenge to the selfishness of men who avoid children.

Germaine Greer, speaking on the family, and to her unconceived offspring states, "My child will not be guided at all because the guidance offered him by this society seeks to lead him backwards and forwards and sideways all at once. If we are to recover serenity and joy in living, we will have to listen to what our children tell us in their own way, and not impose our own distorted image upon them in our crazy families."

Yet the crazy beat goes on. In order to stop abusing our children, we must stop abusing Motherhood. We must scream to her that the "inborn mystique" of maternalism which fails her and exploits her child and creates dependency not love on both parts, can be freed with the essences of growth nurtured bilaterally.

Peoples' attitudes have lagged behind the changing reality of women's participation in the work v force and society. Feminism crystalizes a discontent, a frightening one to the misinformed. Many feminists' groups' interest in "children's liberation" illustrates their genuine concern for their children's welfare. For example, a group from New Haven commented: "Although most of us are rejecting the Freudian notion that only fulfillment of a woman's life is her children, many of us see children as a beautiful and important part of our lives. We want to be able to provide settings which will allow our children

to grow and develop happily."

But what do we do with children left behind from increasingly suicidal mothers, pill popping mothers, powerless-penniless mother? If we supply instant identity to the woman by Motherhood, then what do we say to a thirty-two year old "retiree," with the youngest child off in school and forty years of lifetime ahead?

And what do we say to the child who's supposed to meet all needs but doesn't, to a child named Sam who likes to play with dolls, to a father who's expected to strive for success but feels no ambition? We free them.

We martyr no one. We challenge all. We make it harder for everyone. We humanize. We scare at our chang-

ing selves. But we share the scare.
