

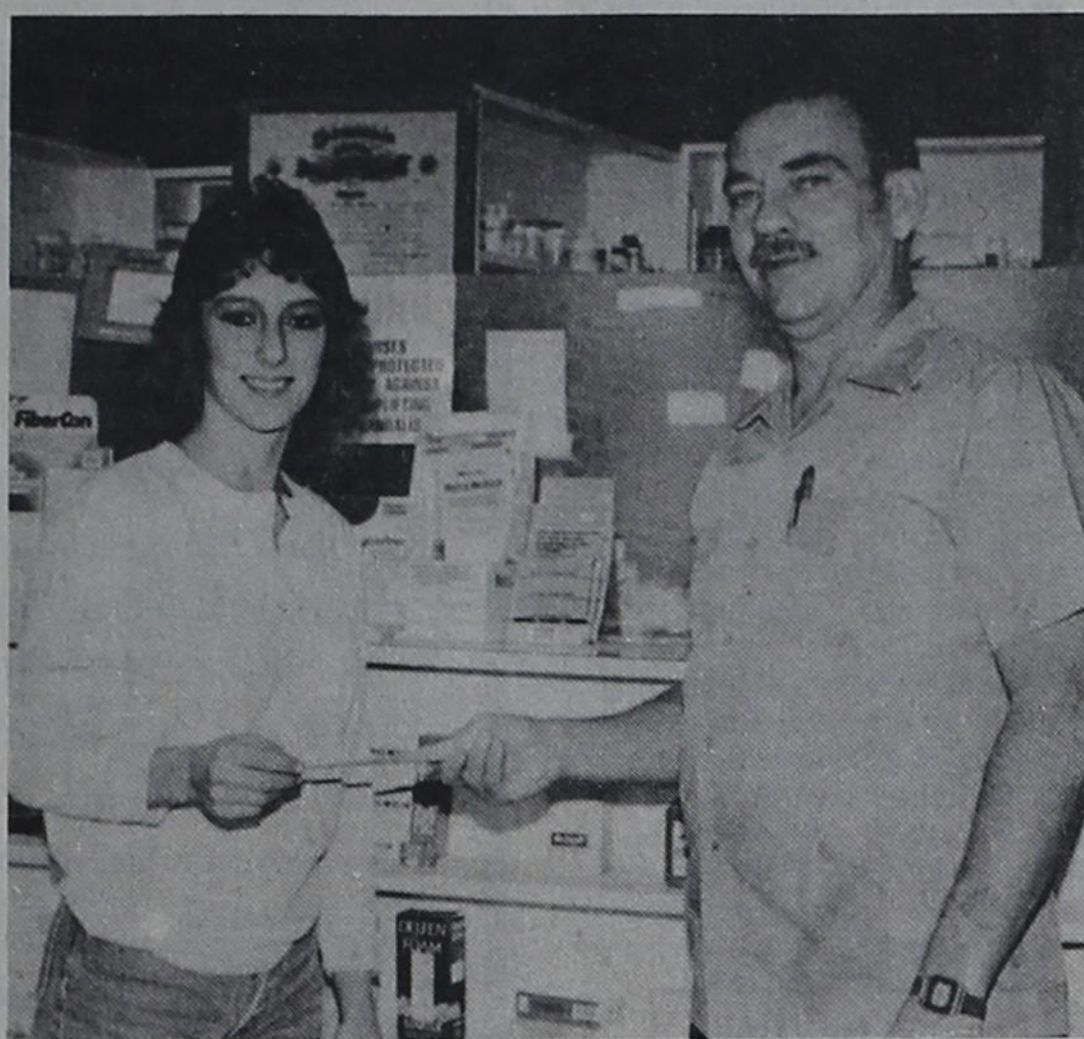
## Yearbooks On Sale

## Results Given For Tuesday's Election

Parmer County voters turned out in record numbers for an off-year election on Tuesday to vote their wishes on the 25 proposed constitutional amendments and the two referendums.

Total vote in Parmer County was 1,444. This was 37 per cent of the registered voter potential.

County voters pretty well matched the trend of voters statewide on most of the major issues.

A big exception was on the referendum proposing parimutuel wagering, voted down in the county by a big margin, 952-465. Statewide, about 56 per cent of the voters approved the issue.

In Bovina, the betting referendum was turned down, 131-81. Oklahoma Lane voters nixed the proposal, 74-25, and at Rhea it was somewhat closer, but also failed, 25-20.

County voters matched the trend on allowing bonds to finance incentives for the super-conducting supercollider to Texas. The vote there was 963 in favor to 397 opposed.

The most lop-sided vote in Parmer county was Referendum number one, denying Ross Perot's proposal to appoint members of the State Board of Education. A total of 1,157 county voters (82.6 per cent) were against this issue, to 243 favoring.

The county voted against tax exemptions for out-of-use offshore drilling equipment, proposed in Amendment 20, by almost a 2-1 margin, 833-430. That issue passed statewide by a narrow margin.

The two most popular amendments were Amendment 12, automatic transfer of community property to surviving spouse, by 1,131 to 215, and Amendment 3,

homestead tax exemption for surviving spouse 55 years of age or older, by 1,117-273.

County residents voted against proposed loans and grants to encourage economic development in the state, as put forth in Amendment 4, 760-538. The state passed that amendment by a narrow majority.

Amendment 10, exempting non-income producing personal property (boats, RVs, planes, etc.) from ad valorem taxes lost in Friona and Parmer County (684-606), but carried statewide.

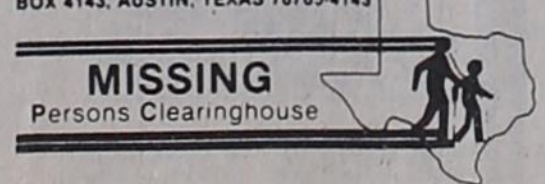
## Laney Named To Committee

## TEAM EYES PLAYOFFS

# Ponies Host Anton; Dist. Title On Line

Bovina's Mustangs host the Anton Bulldogs Friday in a battle for the district championship and the playoffs hanging in the balance.

Game time at Mustang Stadium is 7:30 p.m.

The Mustangs enter the game with an 8-1 season mark and are 5-0 atop the district standings. Anton is 5-3 and 4-1. Their only district loss was to Farwell.

Although there are several possibilities regarding the playoffs, Bovina's best formula would be to win the game, giving them the top seed in district.

With a 5-0 record, the Mustangs are a game ahead of both Anton and Farwell, who each go into their last games with 4-1 district marks, and a shot at the playoffs.

Although the Mustangs suddenly find themselves hurting due to injuries, Coach Bill Talley says he feels that the team will be all right.

"We feel good about the game. We had a good workout on

Monday. The kids realize what's at stake. We'd like to win so we can play (at least) one more week. These kids have never been at this point before. I think they'll do what it takes to win," Coach Talley said.

The Bulldogs are led by a big, 215-pound quarterback, senior Trevor Edgemon. Prior to his team's 48-13 win over Whiteface, Edgemon was the third top passer in the area for class A, averaging 116 yards per game. He had completed 52 of 95 passes, a nifty 54.7 per cent.

Coach Talley said that the Bulldog attack was about evenly divided between running and passing. They average 166 yards per game rushing. The yardage has been divided up among three starters who were back from last year: Leon Martinez, Jay Rendon and Joe Lopez.

The Bulldogs run a Wing-T formation. While they have three players over 200 pounds on their line, they aren't nearly as big and

physical as Petersburg was.

Kevin Bradley, a 165-pound end, is Edgemon's favorite receiver. Prior to last Friday, he had caught 24 passes for 363 yards, 16.3 yards per catch and 51.8 yards per game.

Edgemon has passed for nine touchdowns, so he will give the Mustang secondary a stiff workout.

Another Anton receiver ranked in the top ten in the area is Roland Cantu, with 14 catches for 333 yards.

But Bovina's signal-caller, Scott Scaff, also can throw the ball. He has completed 39 of 100 passes for 623 yards.

The Mustang backfield tandem of Bud Venable and Todd Ware have rushed the ball for 1,011 and 890 yards respectively.

Although the game will be played on Friday the 13th, the Mustangs should feel that they had their run of bad luck a week ago.

The last time the Mustangs were involved with a district title was 1972, when they tied Hart as co-champions. However, a 25-8 loss to Hart in the final game cost Bovina the playoffs that year, when only one team advanced.

This year's Mustang team has already scored one more win than the 1972 eleven, which finished 7-3 and 5-1 in district play.

Coffee shops and domino parlors are filled to overflowing with nervous farmers this week as they gather in popular loitering places and exchange worried conversations among themselves over the possible outcome of the fall crops.

# Muleshoe Hospital Reopens Its Doors

West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe opened its doors to the public on October 26.

It had been closed since November 13, 1986 when Westworld Community Health-care, Inc. closed all the hospitals it operated in Texas and other states.

West Plains Medical Center is accepting patients. Its emergency room, lab, x-ray and birthing facilities are ready for use. Drs. Allgood and Purdy are affiliated with the West Plains Medical Center. They are accepting patients.

The phone number for West Plains Medical Center is 272-4524. It is the same number that the hospital had in the past.

The hospital will be operating on a cash basis until funding can be secured. They will be paying the doctors and nurses, but many other positions will be filled with volunteers.

The members of the original Board of Directors of West Plains Medical Center, Inc. worked to regain control of the hospital. It did so in June of this year.

Then the Board of Directors began researching ways to re-open the hospital. They found out that they had to open in less than a year from the time they were closed, or

they would face being licensed as a new hospital instead of an existing hospital. New hospitals must have complete sprinkler systems and other costly capital improvements; existing hospitals can be licensed under less stringent regulations.

Studies were done with the assistance of Methodist Hospital in Lubbock which showed that Muleshoe could probably support a hospital if it was managed properly.

The Board of Directors sought out donations from the community to get West Plains Medical Center into shape for its re-licensing. The Board accepted donations of time and money. Strong community support was shown last weekend by the people who showed up to volunteer their time and energy for repairs and cleanup of the hospital.

Donations of money may be made to the West Plains Medical Center, Inc. Improvements Fund at Muleshoe State Bank.

## C. Pearson's Rites Held In Kerrville

Mrs. Christine L. Pearson, 81, of Lytle, died Wednesday in a Lytle care center.

# Scooter's Scoops

## Texas 86 Completed

Work to rebuild a 21.4 mile section of Texas 86 from southwest of Bovina to the Castro County line was completed this week, according to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The highway was widened from 22 feet to 40 feet during the construction which cost \$4.7 million. It was the first major reconstruction of the highway since it was built in 1947.

"The project improved safety for motorists in Parmer County, and revitalized a highway that was deteriorated with age," said Mel Pope, highway district engineer in Lubbock.

Construction was a direct result of improved highway funding, said Pope. "Projects like this cost money. Until the last couple of years, we didn't have the funds to make these types of improvements, no matter how great the need," said Pope.

In 1984, the legislature raised the state motor fuel tax by a nickel a gallon. It was the first hike in the gas tax since 1955.

Earlier this year, the legislature made permanent another five cent increase in the gas tax, but the tax only offset highway budget cuts in other funds.

# BHS Overcomes Odds To Beat Petersburg

## Dick Sparks' Services Held

Funeral services were held in Floydada on Monday of this week for Dick Sparks, 71, of Abilene. He died Friday, November 6 with an apparent heart attack.

Sparks was survived by one son, Bob, who lives in California.

The Bovina Mustangs had to overcome adversity, but they did so, and scored a big, 23-6 win over Petersburg here last Friday.

The win kept the Mustangs undefeated in District 2-A play with a 5-0 record, and ran their season record to a stellar 8-1. The Mustangs are vying for their first district title in football since 1972.

Prior to the game, the team had lost its starting left tackle, 180-pound senior Chad Clayton, who suffered a non-football related injury to his ankle on Halloween night.

Byron Neal, 197-pound senior, who had been the team's starting right tackle, was moved to the left side of the line replacing Clayton early in the week, with sophomore Shaun Pinkston taking Neal's place at right tackle.

On the third play of the game Friday, Neal suffered a broken arm, and Coach Bill Talley sent freshman Larry Rocha into the tackle position on short notice.

"Here we had worked all week replacing Clayton in the lineup, and then bang! We had it all to do over, except had to do it in a game condition," Coach Talley said.

The Mustang mentor praised Rocha, whom he described as a "135 pound terror," for a great performance.

"He had been sick earlier in the week and has been coughing. When Clayton got hurt, I told him he sure needed to work out, and he did. The only thing was, he had practiced all week on the other side of the line, but he came through," Coach Talley commented.

In addition, starting fullback Todd Ware played with stitches in a finger, after having a fingernail sewn back on during the week, and split end Noah Villa, who went to the hospital during the week and missed school, came back to play.

When Petersburg drove for a 6-0 lead the second time they had the ball, it would have been real easy for the Mustangs to have rolled over and quit, after their week full of adversity, adding Neal's injury at the start of the game.

But they bounced back and took control of the game, and won it in fine fashion.

"I think this was the best win

I've ever been associated with. The kids showed a lot of character by hanging in and winning the game," Talley said.

Making Bovina's assignment even tougher on Friday was the size of Petersburg's team. "Our biggest man on the line wasn't as big as their smallest," Talley said.

After Petersburg scored, the Mustangs took the kickoff and made a drive of their own. Bud Venable capped the drive with a one-yard run, and the kicked the point for a 7-6 Bovina lead early in the second quarter. That turned out to be the halftime score.

Bovina took the second-half kickoff, and again put together a scoring drive. Venable's running highlighted the drive. He had gains of ten and 15 yards, and again got the score from a yard out. His kicking was two for two, as the Mustangs took a 14-6 lead.

Neither team threatened the rest of the third quarter, but in the fourth quarter the Mustangs recovered a Petersburg fumble on their end of the field. They were not able to get into the end zone, stalling at the Petersburg 18.

Venable came on to kick a 35-yard field goal, hiking Bovina's lead to 17-6, and giving the team a little breathing room.

Later in the game, Petersburg had the ball at about their 15 with four minutes to play, and had to gamble on fourth down.

Bovina held the Buffaloes, and took over the ball at the Petersburg 17. Four plays later, Venable crashed into the end zone for his third touchdown. The kick failed, but Bovina had clinched the win.

Venable was the workhorse with 144 yards on 33 carries. Adding to the team's concern, he bruised a knee in the game, and had it in a splint at the start of the week.

Venable's performance put him over 1,000 yards gained for the season at 1,011.

Todd Ware gained 60 yards on 17 carries, and Scott Scaff completed six of 12 passes for 50 yards. Denver Riddle caught two passes for 25 yards, and Venable four for 25.

Bovina led in first downs, 19-8, and in total yards, 298-113. Scaff also had a good night punting.

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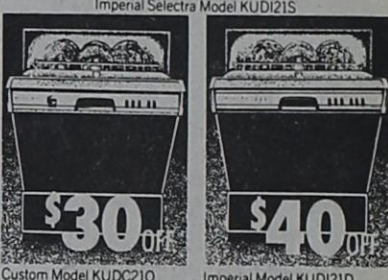

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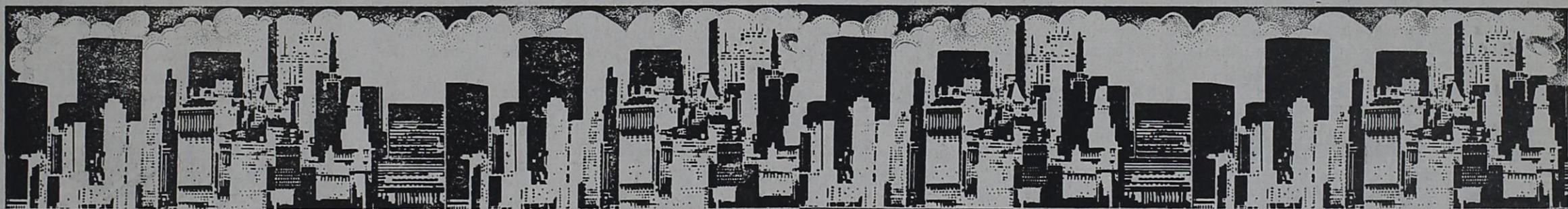

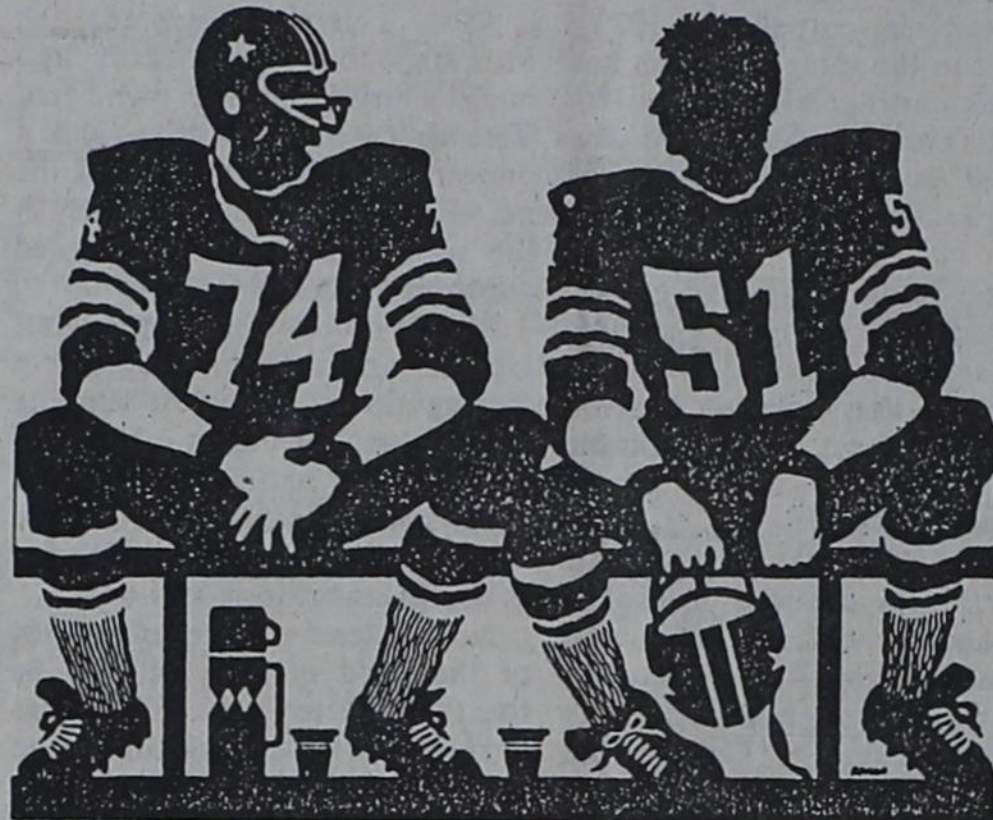
