Knowing that cotton seed in its crude state is an expensive food, we investigated authorities and present the result below The component parts are given thus.
One ton of seed weighing: $\quad 2,000 \mathrm{lbs}$ Contains dirt, trash, sand, etc.. about 100 lbs
Crude cottons seed oil, (has no nutri-
mont) about 250 lbs ment) about 250 lbs

Now, the Abilene Cotton Oil Co. makes the following provosition to the farmers:

This is particularly true in cases of whole cotton seed. How then can these valuable food constituents be utilized? It is a common question whether this is a profitable exchange for the farmer.
It is an accepted fact that the oil has no value as $r$ food. It is pure carbon, and beyond supplying a little temporary heat ha no other effect.
But undoubtedly a farmer can feed more economically in using meal and hulls than in feeding merely the raw seed.
In exchanging the seed for the meal the farmer does not the meal the farmer does not
dispose of any of the valuable elements-nitrogen, potash and phosphoric acid. The 750 lbs . of meal contains within a small fraction all the nitrogen that wa in the ton of seed.
What price, then, should cotton seed command when cotton see meal is held at $\$ 16$ per ton? The 750 lbs , of meal from the ton of seed, at 75c per 100 lbs Add 900 lbs. of hull from this ton

If called upon for an opinion we would say that it is not, from the fact that we would rather have the 750 lbs . meal and 900 lbs , of hull, either for feeding or fertilizing purposes than the original ton of seed. It is easier to adjust a ration with the separate materials. A safe and proper ration f cotton seed meal for milch cows depends somewhat on the size of the antmab. At some of the experiment stations 6 to 7 lbs . has been fed without bad effect."
Remember, the Abilene Mills gives more than the "Southern Farm"' here calculates-viz: 1000 pounds of meal and same of hulls.
Don't forget that all authorities agree that the oil, which our mill proposes to take as toll for grinding your seed, has no value as a food product.
