A short time after Housn resigned his governorship of the State of Tennessee, the old Cherokee chief, who had many years before removed to this country, was surprised one day to see his old friend Sam step into his hut. Local preachers 373, members 71,341. Fifteen hundred and four infants have been baptizêd during the year and 3,383 adults have been baptized. There are 187 Epworth Leagues and 6,752 Epworth League members. The number of Sunday schools is 547 with 4,225 officers and teachers and 37,885 Sunday school schol-

The contributions for the year
are as follows: For conference claimants $\$ 8,666$, for foreign missions $\$ 11,284.42$, for church extension $\$ 3,730.32$, for home missions 11,012.48, for the American Bible Society $\$ 507$, for presiding elders $\$ 19,027.49$, for pastors $\$ 157,508.09$, for the bishops $\$ 2$,406.69.

There are 825 societies and 470 1-6 houses of worship owned by them, valued at $\$ 898,029.78$. There are 232 pastoral charges and 219 parsonages, valued at $\$ 203,935.50$. There are twelve districts and nine district parsonages, valued at $\$ 16,000$; $\$ 214$,025 insurance is carried on the church property.
There have been 15,000 additions to the church this year within the Northwest Texas Conference a nd foriy - nine new churches built.
