



The Adjutant General is also appointed by the Governor. He is paid a salary of \$2,000 a year and has an office force consisting of a clerk and a porter and armorer who are paid \$1560 a year, also the quartermaster of the frontier battalion, \$1,500.

Next to the Governor, who is commander-inchief of the State's military forces, the Adjutant ion, and the State Volunteer Guard. Under his direction these organizations are kept up, supplied and paid when called into action. When the ranger force or malitia are needed to assist the civil officers in any part of the State it is the Adjutant General who carries out the orders of the Governor in the premises and who assumes personal command when it seems necessary.

The public printer is elected by the printing board and is charged with general supervision of all printing done forthe State, it being his duty to see that all work is done according to the contracts valued for its own sake. vail with some, that to issue us and our children. bonds for the purpose of erecting a school building equal to our need, will be a horrible incubus that will sit for twenty years ose with but small means. Let's e if such could be the case.

After a somewhat careful study y the Board of Trustees, it is believed that a tax of 15 cents on the hundred dollars will be sufficient. Will this be a burden?

For example: I have 108 acres of land. Say that I assess it at \$8 per acre, \$864, and that I have other taxable property valued at \$136, total \$1,000. Now 15 cents on the hundred dollars valuation would bring my tax for said bonds to the wonderful sum of \$1.50 per year! \$30 for the entire twenty years! Will this, can this, be a burden on any one of like small means?

Suppose the highest possible tax, 4 of 1 per cent, or 25 cents on the \$100 valuation, were, levied. I would then pay for school purposes \$2.50 per year; \$50 for the entire 20 years! Pay it solely for the benefit of my children and of yours.

There are citizens, good and true men, in town, who pay taxes on residence property valued at from \$350 to \$550. The tax on said property would be from 50 cents to 80 cents per annum. Would that be a burden?

Put it as labor. 4 to 2 a day's work every year for school purposes! Who would not be willing to give that for the benefit of the children, though he have none of his own?

The erection of the proposed building will bring to both town and country immigrants of the most desirable class, and thus create a demand for every kind of labor and material. It will strengthen every church, every charitable and fraternal order and the moral tone of the community. It will enhance all values. It will increase our power and influence in the civil affairs of the county.


