His Anguish at Being Confined Prison at Fort Monroe.

## Among the multitudinous doc

 uments in the library at For Monroe there is not one of more absorbing interest than the diary of Brevet Lieut. John J. Craven, surgeon United States volunteers who was the physician in charge of the fort when Jefferson Davis was a prisoner within its walls. The diary gives a graphic ac count of the prison life of Mr Davis and contains many inci dents that reflect his devotion to the lost cause.On the morning of the 23 rd May, 1865, the proud spirit of Jefferson Davis underwent a se vere trial-a trial which was probably severer than has ever in modern times been inflicted upon that morning he was shackled Lieutenant Craven's story of the circumstances is as follows:
Capt. Jerome E. Titlow of the Third Pennsylvania artillery entered the prisoner's cell, followed by the blacksmith of the fort and his assistant, the latter carrying in his hands some heavy and Davis, feverish after a sleeples night, was reclining on his couch when they entered. His food of the day before was still lying untouched on a tin plate near him. "Well," said Mr. Davis as they entered.
"i have an unpleasant duty to perform, sir," said Capt. Titlow, and as he spoke the blacksimith took t

The prisoner leaped from his bed with flushed face, and his countenance grew livid and rigid as death.' Then recovering him self slowly, while his wasted fig are towered up to its full height appearing to swell with indignation, he said slowly and with

Capt. Titlow now fully recognized that the character of the man with whom he had to deal was such as could not be turned from what he regarded as cardi nal principles of honor by a few soft words, as the wind moves
the trees, and, determined to end the interview and put the orders which had been given him int effect as soon as possible he called in a sergeant and file of soldiers from the next room. The sergeant advanced to seize the prisoner. Immediately Mr. Davis flew at him, seized the muske and attempted to wrench it from his grasp. Of course such scene could have but one issue There was a short, determined struggle. In a moment Mr. Davi was thrown on his bed, and be fore the soldiers removed thei hands the blacksmith had done his work.
This done, Mr. Davis lay for moment as if in a stupor. Then slowly raising himself and turning around, he dropped his shackled feet to the floor, and cried "Oh, the shame, the shame!'
With his feet bound by
heavy and rudely constructed hackles. Mr. Davis lay on his shackles, Mr. Davis lay on his tray bearing food similar to the which was furnished to the hear y soldiers of the fod to thear y soldiers of the fort, a tin plate him at regular intervals each day and taken away untouched.
Dr. Graves saw that if Mr Davis remained in shackles his death weuld soon follow. His constitution was broken down, his nerves shattered and his mind burdened. Accordingly, at the earnest solicitation of the doctor the shackles were removed on the 28th of May. Washington Post.
