The fight lasted three hours and every inch of the ground was hotly contested Resolutions, substitutes, motions to table, appeals from the decisions of the chair, balloting, wild cheering, speech making and hurrahing were the principal features of the stormiest convention the county has ever known. Hon. Fred Cockrell led the delegation which whooped 'em up for an uninstructed vote and he seemed to have the advantage in parliamentary tactics, but they were just a little too short on votes, and every blow of the opposition hit 'em below the belt. After exhausting every resource
they finally gave under, and the they finally gave under, and the
convention was at an end. The fight was precipitated by the action of the committee on resolutions in recommending that all delegates go instructed except those to the Second Supreme Judicial convention. This was obviously a move to defeat Speer. But Mr. Speer had a majority of the precinct instructions, besides many warm friends in other delegations, and the effort was defeated. Increasing Speed of Trains. Both the New York Central and Pennsylvania lines will put York and Chicago the 15 th instant. The distance over the Pennsylvania is 912 miles, and the schedule accordingly calls for average speed of 45.6 miles, hours less than the present fastest service between the two cities and eight hours less than the usual service. The fare on these trains will be $\$ 28$, or $\$ 1$ additional oo the regular rate for every re duction of one hour from the or-
dinary time of passage. Equally fast trains now run from Chicago to Denver, and it will not be long evidently before the traveler can go from ocean to ocean at an average speed, exclusive of stops, 50 miles and more an hour.
